EAST PERTH CEMETERY: RESTING PLACE OF WESTERN AUSTRALIAN PIONEERS

FOREWORD

The Royal Western Australian Historical Society late in 1982 decided to record as comprehensively as possible data relative to the disused East Perth Cemetery. This decision derived from a motion proposed by Mrs Ray Oldham and carried unanimously during the Affiliated Historical Societies' sixteenth Annual Meeting held at Rockingham during September 1982. This project would form part of the commemoration of the RWAHS's Diamond Jubilee in September 1986 and would also be a contribution to the Australian Bicentennial in 1988.

Mrs Oldham became convener of the Society's East Perth Cemetery project. I first learned of it in March 1983 when Doris, my wife, was assisting with the documentation of lonely graves at the Society's Headquarters, Stirling House, Nedlands. Having offered a little gratuitous advice regarding mapping of the cemetery I was co-opted as Research Officer.

During our preliminary visit to the old cemetery in mid-March 1983, the Ranger/Custodian David Davies escorted us in a general inspection; pointed out grave-sites of special interest and outlined the history of the area. Since that first visit David Davies and I have systematically recorded tombstone data, monumental styles, symbolism, the state of preservation and dilapidation of sites and acts of vandalism. We have closely inspected the terrain for indications of gravesites upon which no monuments now stand. Our researches have been conducted during summer's searing heat and flies, during dry spells between winter's storms, over surfaces dessicated and disintegrating and over carpets of small flowers in the springtime. Our investigations have been greatly assisted by information supplied by visitors to the cemetery, some of them long-time residents in East Perth with memories of developments over the decades. To all these good folk we tender our best thanks; in particular to John de Boer, a nearby resident of several years, and to Ken Ross whose enthusiastic researches have revealed many data of great interest.

The document here presented records ongoing investigations spanning more than three years. It is issued conjointly under the aegis of the Royal Western Australian Historical Society represented by myself, and of the Department of Conservation and Land Management represented by David Davies.

INTRODUCTION

The sixteenth Annual Meeting of the Affiliated Historical Societies of Western Australia was held at Rockingham on 25th September 1982. Among the motions carried was the following:

"(iv) Mrs Oldham, R.W.A.H.S., moved that in preparation for the Australian Bicentenary in 1988 all Affiliated Societies should undertake the recording of (a) memorial tablets, (b) lonely graves, and (c) old cemeteries within their districts. Mrs Oldham said that the material already held at Stirling House was being consolidated. She felt that this would be a very worthwhile job which could be organized from the R.W.A.H.S. and correspondence would be sent out advising how to go about this work. When the work is complete, it will be published together with photographs for the Bicentenary. Mr Heppingstone seconded the motion. This motion was carried unanimously."

The project to document the East Perth Cemetery as fully as is now practicable was thus launched by the Royal Western Australian Historical Society with dual purposes:

- . To celebrate the Society's Diamond Jubilee on 10th September, 1986, and
- . As part of the Bicentennial Celebrations in 1988.

Fieldwork began in March 1983 and has been continued by Dr J.A. Richardson and Ranger David Davies (Custodian of the cemetery; Department of Conservation and Land Management) until the present; it is now completed. The information recorded in this volume forms part of the Society's overall research project. It incorporates monument data field under P.R. 2940 in the Battye Library, Perth, which includes the following material:

- . Anglican graves catalogued by the Rev. (now Archdeacon) Ted Doncaster in June 1952.
- . Additional mapping and recording of all denominations done by Miss Henderson of the R.W.A.H.S. during the late 1950's.

Our objective has been to document as completely as possible the wealth of historical and socio-economic data still extant in this disused burial ground. Much valuable material has been lost due to the disappearance of many grave-sites which probably had wood markers or headboards, now decayed or burnt; to the natural decay of stonework over the past century and a half; to the depredations of scavengers who removed much of the beautiful metal fencing surrounding many tombs and lead from the inscriptions; and to mindless vandalism after the burial ground was closed in 1899, shortly before Karrakatta became the main metropolitan cemetery.

It is stated that perhaps 10 000 persons were interred in the East Perth Cemetery. Currently there are some 1655 names recorded on extant monuments representing burials between 1830 and the early 1920's plus a few more recently permitted interments (including commemorative plaques of cremations) and the erection of monuments to pioneers during 'WAY 79', the State's Sesquicentennial.

There are currently 780 grave-sites with named monuments (or parts of headstones) and 24 definite sites containing remains of surrounds (corner posts, fencing, parts of brickwork etc.): the identity of most of these latter remains unknown. Ten thousand burials would have probably resulted in about 4 500 grave-sites (occupancy rate in extant sites averages just over two per site). It follows that less than 20% of the grave-sites originally in the cemetery are now preserved: a sorry commentary on the long period of neglect of this resting place of so many of Western Australia's pioneers.

Mapping has been based on a new aerial photograph of the cemetery and environs provided by the Department of Lands and Surveys, W.A. in December 1983, through the kind assistance of Mr John Hunter of the Department of Conservation and Land Management. This magnificent coloured photograph, enlarged to a scale of about 1:470, clearly depicts all gravestones excepting those obscured beneath trees and/or dense shadows thrown by their thick foliage. These hidden sites have been mapped in directly on the ground.

All existing monuments or fragments thereof have been located on the maps which accompany this report. They have been numbered systematically, starting in the north-western sector of the graveyard (Plain and Wittenoom Streets intersection) and finishing in its south-eastern sector (Waterloo Crescent and Bronte Street area). Sites are numbered consecutively along a series of lines - nos. 1 to 62 aligned approximately NNE - SSW. A rectilineal grid has also been devised thus:

- . lettered A to X from west to east
- . numbered 1 to 15 from north to south.

Graves are designated by block - line - number, e.g.

M12-31-338: John Septimus ROE, Surveyor General

This latest research project covers the following topics among others:

- historical review and chronology
- . layout of the cemetery; religious denominations
- . biodata of those buried in the cemetery as recorded on monuments
- cultural-aesthetic topics; styles of monuments, epitaphs, calligraphy, symbolism, craftsmanship of the monumental masons of the period 1830-1920's
- . statistical review of life span, deaths etc of the interred.

Recording of the monument data has presented various difficulties:

- . Inscription completely lost on one slate headstone of which the entire face has spalled off.
- . Inscriptions legible with great difficulty or being partly illegible due to serious erosion, fretting and flaking of stonework and to the excessive growth of mosses and lichens within incised lettering.
- . Inscriptions (almost palimpsests) on some headstones barely visible and only discernable during limited periods when the sun's angle is just right.
- Inscriptions near the base of headstones often obscured by thick vegetation and/or by accumulated soil and debris (a few such inscriptions were literally unearthed).

. Details of masons responsible for the monuments are not infrequently recorded in some obscure nook, e.g. minutely along the top or side edges of headstones.

The project has involved various members of the Society, other organizations including the Battye Library of W.A. History, the Genealogical Society, religious denominations, some Asian cultural groups and the Department of Conservation and Land Management (C.A.L.M.). In addition much valuable information has been contributed by descendants of pioneers and by other persons interested in the cemetery and appalled by reports of vandalism contained in the local press (1984 & 1985); also by various visitors to the cemetery who, as long-time residents in the vicinity, can recall many episodes of its history. The Society's best thanks are tendered to all those who have assisted in the project.

Maps 2 and 3 included in the present document are "working maps" in "operational", not finally drafted form. The RWAHS hopes eventually to publish the aerial photograph upon which they are based, suitably sectioned together with transparent overlays showing the gravesites.

New items of interest accrued periodically to this ongoing investigation after most of the monument data had been recorded during 1983 and 1984. The section on "Statistics - Mortality Rates" was finalised by end 1984. The balance of the text plus Appendices were finalised early in 1986 and details of monuments have been updated to April 1986.

HISTORICAL REVIEW

A despatch dated 30th December, 1828 from Sir George Murray, the then Secretary of State for the Colonies, to Captain Stirling, R.N. contained instructions for the establishment of the settlement at the Swan River; it included instructions concerning the provision of burial places. This directive was acted upon during November and December, 1829; allotments in Sections L and M of Perth Townsite were marked as burial grounds.

Town Lot R1 was allocated to the Anglican Church in April 1842 (Map 1). Town Lot T39 was granted to the Independents, Lot T40 to the Wesleyans, and Lots T41 and T42 in 1849 to the Roman Catholics (Fig. 3). In 1847 the then burial grounds were gazetted as a Public Cemetery.

Perth Roll Map, Sheet 6 (Map 5) shows the following lots as burial grounds: E 69 unspecified; E70 and E71 assigned to the Presbyterians and E72 to the Jews. E73 was proposed as a burial place for 'promiscuous' interments and perhaps also for felons but it apparently was not gazetted as a burial ground. Additionally Town Lots T43 and T44 were granted to the Roman Catholics in 1876. After 1867 the eastern portion of Lot T28, bounded by Bronte, Horatio and Wickham Streets, was assigned to the Presbyterians.

Eventually what became known as East Perth Cemetery, comprised the following burial grounds (Maps 4, 5, 6):

Formerly the cemetery was approached via the old Forrest Avenue, a sandy way (long resumed) which led from Perth Townsite north-easterly up to Cemetery Hill; entrance was in Bronte Street.

By order of Council dated 12th July, 1899 burials in East Perth Cemetery were discontinued except in vaults and in other cases where the permission of the Governor was obtained. Consequently, after 1899 relatively few interments were made in this old cemetery but it continued to be used into the early 1920's. However, after 1900 most burials were in Karrakatta which was opened during that year.

After its formal closure in 1899 East Perth Cemetery became increasingly neglected; graves were vandalised and its historical and cultural values became virtually forgotten. By 1925 its ruinous and abandoned condition had become a public scandal and prompted an article in "The Western Mail" (March 1925), "The Forgotten Dead" with horrifying photographs of desolation in the cemetery.

The cemetery was vested in the State Gardens Board in 1934; taken over by the National Parks Board in 1957 and now administered by the Department of Conservation and Land Management into which the National Parks Board was integrated during 1985.

During the later 1940's/early 1950's all monuments in the cemetery lots west of Plain Street (E69 to E72) were bulldozed, carted away and mostly dumped; many records were thus irretrievably lost. Remains were excavated. It is reported that some few tombstones were re-assembled in the cemetery lots east of Plain Street. A P.W.D. map dated November 1951 (Drawing No. 1 in File No. 355/51) outlined plans for restoration of the East Perth Cemetery. These proposals included:

- . renovations of existing picket and open fences
- erection of a new fence along part of Plain Street and around the boundaries of Lot T28(West)/805, at that time listed as a Public Park
- . Those portions of Wickam Street east of Plain Street and of Horatio Street north of Bronte Street to be closed (These became Lot 830 within which a small portion was allocated to the Jews; the closed portion of Horatio Street was granted to the Presbyterians).
- Laying of a network of asphalt pathways through the cemetery. These would result in the removal of various gravesites. A somewhat different pattern of pathways was subsequently constructed and some gravesites were thus obliterated (e.g. No. 7-39, Britnall et al.)
- . A considerable portion of Anglican Lot Rl (eastern) and a strip along the northern sectors of Roman Catholic Lots T41 to T44 were to be grassed.
- Four 9ft (2.8 m) gates were to be erected, one at each corner of the cemetery; these were not built.

Lots E69 to E72 were officially excised from the cemetery in 1952 (vide Reserves Act 56 of 1952).

The present-day East Perth Cemetery now occupies about 5 hectares (ca. 12 acres), listed as Class A Reserve 21054, bounded thus (Map 2):

- . north : by Wittenoom (formerly Stokes) Street
- . west : by Plain Street
- south: by Bronte Street
- east : by Waterloo Crescent.

It comprises areas allocated to the following religious denominations:

- . Independents (Church of Christ)
- . Wesleyans
- . Roman Catholics
- . Jews
- . Presbyterians (Congregational)
- Anglicans (Church of England)

Today this Pioneer Cemetery is a haven of peaceful tranquility, well tended and aesthetically pleasing. Large trees cast grateful shade and small shrubs and bushes are dotted here and there. Views across the burial ground are pleasant and the Darling Range is visible eastwards across the plain. This old burial ground is a rich repository of socio-economic data and of cultural treasures.

As our study/survey of the cemetery has progressed we have comprehended at least something of the many tragedies terminating in the numerous interments within its several denominational sectors. The interred range from the most eminent of Western Australia's pioneers to the obscure; from persons of great achievements to the still-born who did not even breathe in this world.

East Perth Cemetery is truly a resting place of Western Australia's pioneers.

THE EAST PERTH CEMETERY

GENERAL LAYOUT




FIGURE 2: Derived from Hillmen's 1845 map of Perth:

Burial lots were laid out in Perth Townsite, Sections L and M during November and December 1829. Thereafter lots were allocated to various religious denominations. The East Perth Cemetery was in continuous use as the main metropolitan burial ground until 1899 shortly before Karrakatta was opened in November 1900. Thereafter interments continued on a much reduced scale until the early 1920's. The layout of the cemetery according to religious denominations is tabulated below (Table 1, Figures 1, 2).

Originally there were at least four (possibly 5) burial lots located west of Plain Street between Bronte Street and Wittenoom (formerly Stokes) Street. All monuments within these blocks have been bulldozed and the areas have been resumed for urban development. These are Blocks E69, E70, E71, and E72 and E73 (?).

The cemetery as currently defined comprises lots T39-T44, T28 $\frac{1}{2}$, 830 and R1. Lot 28 (west), now renumbered Lot 805, was originally a public park: it was never used as a burial ground. Boundaries are:

North Wittenoom Street
South Bronte Street
West Plain Street
East Waterloo Crescent

A portion of Wickham Street (resumed) separated lots T39-T44 from lots T28, $T28\frac{1}{2}$ and R1 and a section of Horatio Street (also resumed) separated the Presbyterian (lot $T28\frac{1}{2}$) and Anglican (R1) sectors. At present lines of Presbyterian graves occupy part of the old trace of this resumed section of Horatio Street. Note: Lot 830 covers the resumed portions of Horatio and Wickham Streets.

Layout of gravesites by denominations is summarised in Table 2. Numbers of located graves, recorded names of the interred plus data regarding unlocated graves are given in Table 3. Details of empty sites are listed in Appendix I.

A guestimate of potential gravesites within East Perth Cemetery has been prepared (Table 4). Dimensions of vaults and brick graves as stated in Roman Catholic records and as shown on the 1845 Anglican map (Map 1) have been used for designated areas. Elsewhere, an average overall dimension of 77 ft 2 per site has been used: this represents a single standard grave of 7ft x 4ft with interspacings of 4ft (EW) and 3ft (NS). In practice some sites are double or triple standard size.

⁽c) Roman Catholic records indicate that at least 310, possibly 320 gravesites allocated by name and presumably occupied by assignees and/or relatives cannot be located in the Catholic burial ground. This implies that there is now no record of some 320 persons who were probably interred in Lots T41-T44.




Average numbers of interred per site is just over two (Table 2). It follows, that, if as stated, more than ten thousand persons were buried in East Perth Cemetery, around say 4 500 to 5 000 graves would have been required. The computations in Tables 4 & 5 indicate that the burial ground would have been amply large enough to accommodate more than ten thousand burials (Note: originally cemetery lots were in use west of Plain Street: resumed ca. 1950).


Several parts of the cemetery contain few monuments or none. Potential numbers of standard graves 7ft x 4ft (77 $\rm ft^2$ overall) which could be accommodated within these areas are listed in Table 6 (Figure 5).

Memorandum for the Hon. Surveyor General:

The corner in the burying ground allotted to the Church of England, in which felons have hitherto been buried, is now filled up, and any other interments of a like kind will have to be made in ground that has just been cleared and fenced in at the expense of the Church. This ground has been cleared for the purpose of interments of bodies of members of the Church of England and great objection would be felt to the bodies of felons being placed in this ground.


As it is very desirable that some spot should be defined for the interment of felons (and that it should be prepared at public expense seems reasonable), I beg the Surveyor General will be good enough to submit for the consideration of H.E. the Governor some small space of ground that he would recommend should be reserved for this purpose.

RELIGIOUS DENOMINATIONS: BURIAL GROUNDS

Independent Body of Christ: Lot T39

Lot T39, bounded by Plain, Wittenoom and Wickham Streets and by the Wesleyan Lot T40 in the east, was assigned to the Church of the Independent Body of Christ (Fig. 1). The layout of this burial ground is summarised in Table 7.

Mr Brian Rose, 25 Chaffers Street, Morley WA 6062, supplied the following data (phone 10 Sept. 1984 to JAR):

Mary Ann LEONARD (nee ROSE), wife of Rev. Charles LEONARD, first Pastor of the Independent Church in WA, was buried in Lot T39. Her sister ROSE, died February 1855 and was buried in this cemetery lot by the Rev. Charles North. Neither site is now identifiable.

Wesleyan: Lot T40

The Wesleyan sector of East Perth Cemetery (Fig. 1) occupies lot T40 bounded on the north by Wittenoom Street, on the west by Lot T39 (Independent Church) and on the east by Lot T41 (Roman Catholic). Its southern boundary was part of the old Wickham Street (now resumed as Lot 830).

Gravesites within this sector are summarised in Table 8.

The Archivist of the Wesleyan Church has provided the Society with a list of 177 burials dated 1859-1885. 166 burials were of persons resident in, or near, Perth (Crawley, Grove Farm) or brought to Perth for burial (one man from Geraldton, died in Perth). Two deaths (one each in Wannaroo and Canning) may also have been interred in East Perth Cemetery making a possible total of 168 Wesleyan interments there. Nine deaths were of persons resident in York, Yongerton, Northam and Peninsula (Guildford) and presumed to have been interred locally.

The surviving monuments contain the names of 39 persons listed in the Church records; 23.2% of the total. In addition, three DYSON infants may be among the fourteen unnamed children listed on headstone No. 13-74 and Louise INKPEN may be interred in site No. 12-67: basal part of headstone is badly eroded and illegible. Thus possibly 43 persons (25.6%) are represented. Data provided by a relative relate to Robert READHEAD (REIDHEAD) buried in Lot 40 but whose grave is no longer marked.

Persons recorded in extant monuments are listed in Table 9. The complete index is presented in Appendix II.

Roman Catholic, Lots T41-T44

The Roman Catholic burial ground occupies lots T41-42 granted in 1849 and lots T43-44 granted in 1876. The sector is bounded by Wittenoom and Wickham Streets and Waterloo Crescent: it adjoins Wesleyan Lot T40 in the west.

The layout of this sector is summarised in Table 10 and Figure 3.

Apparently Lots T41 and T42 originally extended farther north over what is now Wittenoom (formerly Stokes) Street. A plot 45 feet square located centrally to T41 and T42 was assigned for the burial of clergy. Entrance to the lots was evidently from Wickham Street in the south.

Data regarding the layout of the Roman Catholic cemetery lots have been supplied by Fr. Burke, Archivist (1984). Cemetery plots were available in three categories:

- Family vaults, 12 ft x 10 ft superficial (First Class) Cost £ 3-10-0 Interment £ 0-10-0
- . Family brick graves, 8 ft x 6 ft superficial (Second Class) Cost £ 2-5-0 Interment £ 0-7-0

Family brick graves, 8 ft x 5 ft superficial Cost & 2-0-0 Interment & 0-7-0

Free grave sites, (Third Class): various charges for ceremony. Paupers buried gratis.

Family Vaults: Dimensions: at ground level 12 ft long by 10 ft wide. Interior 8 ft by 6 ft. Walls 9 inch brick with good mortar and space of 2 ft 6 inches between the side walls to be filled up with well rammed earth. Depth of vaults 8 ft or 10 ft at option of parties.

Brick Graves: Dimensions: 13 sites adjacent to the vaults, 8 ft by 6 ft. Others to be 8 ft long by 6 ft wide allowing for a single brick grave up to $6\frac{1}{2}$ ft by 3 ft and 10 ft deep. Walls 9 inch brick with good mortar. Double brick graves may be allowed within the same limits.

Free Graves: Space for each grave 7 ft long by 4 ft wide; 10 ft deep at first in double rows.

Site for Interment of Clergy: A piece of ground 45 ft x 45 ft is set apart in the centre of the cemetery (lots T41, T42) for the sole interment of the clergy and for the erection of an obituary chapel (this was not built).

Five or more feet of ground surrounding this plot will be reserved for the greater extension of the chapel if so required.

The original cemetery, Lots T41 and T42, was subdivided as follows (Figure 3)

- . Family Vaults: ground from the southwest boundary to the centre of the cemetery.
- . Family Brick Graves: ground from the southeast boundary to the centre of the cemetery.
- . Free Graves: From the centre of the cemetery to its northeast boundary.
- . Interment of Innocent Children: from the centre of the cemetery to its northwest boundary for children under eight years of age.

Allowing for the following spacings between graves of say 4 ft EW and 2 ft NS, for family vaults and brick graves, and say 3 ft EW and 2 ft NS for free graves, the areas within Lots T41 and T42 assigned for these categories of graves could provide sites as follows (Table 11):

Roman Catholic Archives list assignees of gravesites within the old (Lots T41, T42) and new (Lots T43, T44) sectors of the cemetery. These lists have been compared with names recorded on monuments still extant within the East Perth Cemetery. Many assignees are recorded by SURNAME only. In addition some names (e.g. KELLY, MURPHY, RYAN, SMITH) appear several times in the records. Position of site, whether in the old or new section, provides some clue regarding identity.

Results of comparing listed names with names recorded on gravestones are summarised in Table 15.

Of gravesites assigned less than 20% of these names appear on existing monuments; almost 80% of all listed names are not found in the cemetery as now preserved. It may be presumed that a majority (? all) of those persons who acquired gravesites were eventually buried in the cemetery: assignees or perhaps relatives (?).

Thus at least 310 names (possibly 320) assigned to sites do not appear among the monuments preserved in the Roman Catholic burial ground.

Presbyterian: Lot T28½ and part of Lot 830 (Resumed sector of Horatio Street)

The Presbyterian sector of the East Perth Cemetery occupies Lot T28½ bounded by Wickham Street (resumed) in the north, includes Horatio Street (resumed) in the east, and is bounded by Bronte Street in the south and by the Public Park Lot T28 in the west (Fig. 1).

Inscriptions on surviving headstones are written in Hebrew Script with some bio-data in English. One headstone, KOTT No. 18-119, contains an inscription in Hebrew on the east face plus masonic symbol of set-square and compass: an English translation is inscribed on the west face. The headstone of SEELIGSON No. 18-120 contains an inscription wholly in Hebrew.

Anglican: Lot Rl

The Anglican burial ground occupies the large Lot RI bounded by Wickham and Horatio Streets (resumed), Bronte Street and Waterloo Crescent. After the resumption of Wickham Street (Lot 830) the area was, in effect, extended northwards to the southern boundary of the Roman Catholic Cemetery. Lot 767 which contains St Bartholemew's Church and approach road was excised from Lot R1.

St Bartholemew's Anglican Church is located between lines 37 (west) and 40 (east) (Lot 767).

A map dated 1845 (Map 1) depicts the layout of vaults, brick graves and free sites covering about two thirds of Anglican Lot Rl. No sites were shown on the easterly third (i.e. between Bronte Street and Waterloo Crescent) as of that date. This master plan provided for the following sites (Table 20) of which many had been purchased.

Those portions of the Anglican burial ground not subdivided into gravesites (1845) include that section of Wickham Street, later resumed, and an area bounded by Wickham Street (now resumed), Waterloo Crescent and Bronte Street. None of the Free Sites shown on the 1845 map carried a name. The disposition of the many existing gravesites still marked by monuments east of Line 8 in no way conforms to the base plan of Free Sites. Many of these graves are occupied by influential personages, e.g. Sir Thomas Cockburn Campbell, Bart.

Several empty spaces occur along the lines of vaults and brick graves. These may be occupied by persons listed on the Anglican 1845 Map as assignees and/or by their relatives as stated below (Table 22).

A large area within the eastern sector of Lot R1 now contains few headstones. Mr Brosen, who has resided near the cemetery for more than 60 years stated (3 May 1986) that during the late 1920's-early 1930's many coffins were exhumed from this area: they were transferred to and re-interred in Karrakatta (Appendix X).

A trial of Ground Impulse Radar by the Police Department, W.A., made in 1982 by "Ground & Scientific Equipment" in this Anglican area revealed disturbed subsurface: this was interpreted as gravesites (information from Graeme Batt, Police Department, W.A.; Appendix X).

SURVIVAL AND DESPOLIATION

General

Burials began in the East Perth Cemetery in the very early 1830's and continued there until the mid-1920's. Subsequently a few additional interments have been made under special licence up to recent years.

There are supposed to have been between 9 000 to more than 10 000 burials in the cemetery. If this estimate is approximately correct, then there would probably have been between 4 500 to more than 5 000 occupied gravesites based on an average occupancy of about two per site (based on extant data, Table 2).

Valuable data relating to the cemetery were supplied to J.A. Richardson (C/-RWAHS) during late 1984 after acts of vandalism in the cemetery had been reported in the "West Australian" and the "Sunday Times" (Appendix X). Mrs Phyllis Tilt (Phone 10 Sept. 1984 to J.A.R.) stated that she, together with her four sisters, played in the cemetery during the period 1943-1948. During that period graves extended to the edge of the main roads. There were graves also west of Plain Street, many of them Asian. These were bulldozed ca. 1948-1950 (?). There were many simple graves, just piles of earth, marked by small wooden crosses (just two pieces of wood nailed together). Very many of these crosses marked the graves of typhoid victims (1895-1897 approx.). Mrs Tilt revisited the cemetery in 1980 (having moved away from Perth after 1948): she stated that in the 1940's there were at least three to four times as many graves as in 1980.

Currently (1986) there are 780 sites with monuments and 24 identified sites without monuments (total 804). Names on monuments total 1 655 representing an occupancy of just over two per site. The implication from estimates of total burials and Mrs Tilt's information is that there were formerly more than 3 200 gravesites. So, as of 1985, less than 20% of the gravesites occupied and of the monuments set up (however simple these may have been) have survived. This means that more than 80% of socio-economic and cultural data originally contained in East Perth Cemetery has been lost.

Disappearance of Gravesites

During the earlier decades of its existence a high proportion of Perth's inhabitants were poor. This sector of the population would include day-labourers, destitute and probably many of the elderly (frail-aged) and others. It follows that many burials would have been of the simplest type, namely a heap of earth marked by a two-piece wooden cross, perhaps by a jarrah headboard or even a chunk of rock as marker (?) or even nothing at all.

Ian Berryman in his book "A Colony Detailed: The First Census of WA 1832", discusses the horrific death rate from scurvy, dysentry and malnutrition among the earliest settlers in the colony on the Swan River. In particular the infant mortality rate was high. An inventory of deaths 1829-1832 is included (Table 24).

It is reasonable to presume that most of the 51 persons stated to be domiciled in Perth who died between 1829-1832 were buried in East Perth Cemetery: only one, Louisa JONES (No. 32-360), features on an original headstone. A breakdown of the civil status of the deceased follows (Table 25).

There can be little doubt that at least some of the above persons would have been buried in the simplest graves with no ostentatious headstone: perhaps a simple wooden cross. Excepting Louise Jones (headstone), no trace of the other 50 now remains.

The Wesleyan Church register of burials 1859-1885 lists 177 of which 9 were outside Perth. Of the 168 burials in Perth only 39 names (23.2%) appear on extant monuments in East Perth Cemetery.

Jarrah headboards were evidently widely used as gravesite markers. Ranger David Davies reports that half a jarrah headboard still stood on site no. 71-111 in 1978: it has since disappeared.

Mrs Edna Kelly (nee Green), 51 The Esplanade, Nedlands, W.A., reported (letter 12 Nov. 1984 to J.A.R.) that the jarrah headboard of the grave of the family GREEN was removed from the site after serving as a marker for sixty years (from ca. 1834-35) and sent to the Paris Exhibition, France, ca. 1894-95 to demonstrate the durability of W.A. jarrah. Upon return to Perth, it was donated to the Museum of Western Australia where it still remains. The original headboard was replaced by a marble headstone and this was later set up in Karrakatta. No sign of the original grave remains in East Perth Cemetery.

There is little doubt that some jarrah headboards and crosses were destroyed by bushfires: others were burnt in campfires by the many bums and derelicts who infested the cemetery during the middle decades of this century (at least into the 1960's and 1970's (?)).

Mrs Phyllis Tilt (phone call, 10 Sept. 1984) as a young girl recalled that many graves were simple piles of earth marked by small wooden crosses: just two pieces of wood nailed together. At one period many of these wooden crosses had been uprooted, heaped together and burnt: an official (municipal) operation!

Ranger Trevor Earl (C.A.L.M.), in October 1984 informed me that several years previously, there had been many graves in the Anglican sector marked by simple wooden crosses: none remains. They were apparently located in the ostensibly empty area where only a few headstones remain.

Archdeacon Ted Doncaster (then Reverend), during a survey of the Anglican cemetery in 1952 recorded the presence of many unmarked graves (earth mounds etc.).

It seems very probable that many of the simple earth mounds have, over the decades, succumbed to the influence of torrential rain (run off) and wind scour, and have simple levelled out. Some have probably been flattened during landscaping, grassing and grass-cutting.

Some of the rectilineal patterns, discernible with difficulty on the aerial photograph of the cemetery, almost certainly represent gravesites. Some (e.g. 14-798, 14-799, 15-800, 16-801) are confirmed by portions of brickwork marking the outline of graves (Wesleyan, Lot T40).

Photographs in the Battye Library show a few gravesites/monuments which have subsequently disappeared:

- SCHOALS: site 34-803. Large chest of cement-rendered brick (Photo 21283P). The chest has disappeared. The site is visible.
- DOLLERAR (DOLLBER?): site 34-797. Large turretted chest (Photo 21282P). This site is No. 77 indicated on the Anglican map dated 1845 as having been assigned to Mrs Dollerar (possibly misspelling for DOLLBER?). The chest has disappeared. The large site is still visible and the presence of substructure has been found by probing by D. Davies and J.A. Richardson.
- . UNKNOWN: site 34-804. Shown as site enclosed by a cast-iron railing ca 1934; the railing has disappeared.

Mr Brosen (Appendix X) supplied the following information (2 May 1986): Around the late 1920's-early 1930's many coffins were exhumed from the eastern portion of the Anglican burial ground (where few headstones now remain). They were transferred to and re-interred in Karrakatta.

Possible Gravesites

D. Davies and J.A. Richardson made a ground search of the cemetery during 1985 for possible gravesites which are no longer marked by monuments (vide Appendix XI; Map 3). This was augmented by detailed inspection of the aerial photograph of the cemetery.

Grave size outlines are faintly visible in some portions of the cemetery; some of them between sites with headstones, some in open areas. They are the more readily discernible during damp weather; the vegetations tends to be somewhat better nurtured in these slightest of hollows.

Resumption of Areas

Of the twelve town lots (nos. E69, E70, E71, E72, E73 (?), T39-T44, T28 $\frac{1}{2}$ & R1) originally allocated as burial grounds (Table 1) five, Nos. 69, 70, 71, 72 & 73 (?) have been resumed for municipal development. Data concerning these old burial sites located south of Stokes (now Wittenoom) Street and west of Plain Street are scanty. They are reported to have contained Asian burials, Jews and some Caucasians. It is noteworthy that within the cemetery as presently defined there are very few non-Caucasian burials.

One might have expected that when these cemetery lots were resumed, the headstones could have been set up in another sector of the cemetery (even if they were closely spaced). One might also have expected that the skeletal remains, if exhumed, might have been stacked in "Beinen Hausen". Not so. A workman who was a member of the workforce who dismantled these old burial grounds during the late 1940's (or possibly early 1950's), provided Ranger David Davies with the following information (ca. 1978 or 1979):

- . The headstones were bulldozed, piled in heaps, loaded into trucks and removed. They were apparently dumped in a Departmental yard and presumably have since disappeared.
- . The contents of the graves were bulldozed and heaped. Apparently some may have been re-interred elsewhere (?). Most were dumped and have disappeared.

Information from other sources is appended. Mrs D.B. Edwards, Flat 39, "Elanora", Bunbury, WA 6230, wrote to me as follows: letter dated 10.9.84:

"About 35 years ago (ca 1949?) I lived fairly near there (the cemetery) and for some reason a large part of the cemetery was bulldozed and the graves therefore destroyed. There was a public outcry at the time but nothing was done about it. School children crossing near the cemetery came across a skull and another time bones".

Mrs Phyllis Tilt of 43C Morgan Way, Girrawheen, WA 6064, supplied additional information by telephone (she is a fifth cousin descendant of Sir John Forrest). There were Asian graves west of Plain Street. About 1948 these were bulldozed flat; all monuments were destroyed. The RTA building and a girls school now occupy the former cemetery sites (phone 10 Sept. 1984 to JAR).

Mr Peter Bridge supplied the following information on 12 September 1984. About year 1959 skeletons were dug up under the playground near East Perth Cemetery (as now defined). The remains were thought to be from unmarked graves.

Mrs S.M. Adams, 22 Puttenham Street, Morley WA, reported by phone on 5 October 1984 that Hukam Khan who died on 28 March 1903 was buried in East Perth Cemetery presumably in a plot west of Plain Street.

Mrs D. Champion, 133 Eudoria Street, Gosnells WA, reported (letter 25 Sept. 1984 to JAR) that various of here relatives were all buried in a small cemetery opposite the existing burial ground (i.e. west of Plain Street). She wrote: "It has been bulldozed now and part of same is a carpark. There was also another smaller plot for Chinese people".

The four members of her family interred were:

HAMILTON George 78 yrs, died 4 May 1890 (grandfather)
HAMILTON Christina 84 yrs, died ca 1909 (his wife)

HAMILTON Mrs George (son's wife)

HAMILTON (Infant son of George)

Mr Ken Ross (2 May 1986) told me that in ca. 1950, he remembered skeletal remains being unearthed at the site of the R.T.A. building. Mr Brosen (2 May 1986) also recalled Chinese burials west of Plain Street (Appendix X).

Reorganization of the Cemetery: A P.W.D. plan of the cemetery as now defined (Fig. 1) dated 1951 shows the proposed layout of asphalt pathways to be constructed there. In addition the plan purports to depict the extant gravesites as of that time. Some of the numbered sites on this plan are accurately located. However, very many are incorrectly placed. Incidentally, not a single gravesite in the cemetery carries a number plaque. The master plan developed from a coloured aerial photograph taken by the Department of Lands & Surveys in December 1983 depicts the current layout of pathways and location of all extant monuments (Map 2).

A number of asphalted pathways were indeed constructed subsequently. They do not coincide with the 1951 master plan but follow it in principle. However, the development of these pathways led inevitably to the destruction of many monuments and the ensuing obliteration of gravesites. Many of those interred now lie beneath these pathways: names and sites lost from records.

Mrs Ruth T. Jackson, 25 Victoria Avenue, Claremont WA, supplied the following information in September 1984. Her ancestors, BRITNALL, came out to Western Australia on the third ship to arrive from Britain. She happened to visit the cemetery during construction of the new pathways. A large heap of headstones had been uprooted in the Independent Section (T39) to make way for a path (this lies just south of Wittenoom Street). Among the debris she found the

dismembered headstone of her ancestor's grave. Compassionately, the workforce reassembled it and reset the gravesite immediately south of the pathway. Site is BRITNALL No. 8-39. The interred (nine names recorded on the headstone) lie beneath the path.

Monuments in East Perth Cemetery

As of mid 1985 there are still 853 monuments remaining on the 804 sites so far identified in the cemetery, 780 sites with stonework and/or fenced. The total includes footstones, as well as headstones, plus multiple monuments in several gravesites.

A survey of the state of all monuments still existing in the cemetery was made by Ranger David Davies and Dr J.A. Richardson during the first half of 1984 (report dated 26 June 1984 to RWAHSoc.). Results of the survey are summarised in Table 26, amended to include damage by vandalism mid-1984 to July 1985.

Most of the masonry monuments erected in East Perth cemetery have been exposed to weathering for at least a century: some of them for at least 135 years. The many materials used in their construction (pp.) have reacted variously to the onslaughts of Perth's climate: hot, dry, windy summers and cold, wet winters. Reactions of the masonry materials are summarised in Table 27.

In general the marble monuments have not been very seriously weathered. A notable exception is the DOUGLAS headstone (No. 27-225), a very poor piece of strongly fractured stone totally unsuitable for monumental masonry. It is now seriously fragmented by erosion and loss of cohesion along the many natural fissures.

Monuments made from limestones, sandy limestones and calcareous sandstones and those of Portland Oölite generally show some or all of the following effects of weathering to a greater or lesser degree:

fretting and pitting by acid attack ($\mathrm{H}_2\mathrm{CO}_3$) in rain. erosion, grooving along colour banding and current-bedding of the rock.

honeycomb weathering particularly in the lower sections of headstone slabs due to water run-off, and soakage from wet soil.

wind and sand (dust) scour over the western side of standing slabs.

rather widespread growth of mosses & lichen leading to serious discolouration and obliteration of inscriptions on some stones.

The slate headstones are very sensitive to weathering along their cleavage (fissile) planes. The effects of wide variations in seasonal and diurnal temperatures plus dry and wet periods leads to extensive opening up of these planes and eventually to progressive flaking and spalling off of layers of rock. This occurs as fragments, flakes and sheets. Anglican monument No. 45-587 (unidentified) has lost its entire inscription: not a trace remains.

The lead insert lettering commonly used for monument inscription has suffered considerably over the decades. Much of the lead work has become discoloured by the development of carbonate (PbCO,) films due to atmospheric weathering. On many headstones parts of the lead in-fill is missing: it has either loosened due to weathering or has been deliberately removed (vide vandalism).

Many grave sites are enclosed by a cast iron rail, or ornamental fence work set on cement stumps, or on surrounds of cement or cement-rendered brickwork. Parts of such metalwork is missing on some graves. There is little doubt that much metalwork has been removed for sale as scrap metal (vide vandalism).

Vandalism

Burials in East Perth Cemetery were greatly reduced after 1899 shortly before Karrakatta was opened, into the mid 1920's. A photograph in the Western Mail, March 1925, shows the lamentable state of the cemetery at that time. accompanying article "Our forgotten Dead/Pioneers", was a real cri de coeur for immediate protective action by Government authority. Nothing was done. So, for several decades thereafter, at least into the 1950's-1970's the cemetery was a hangout for bums and riff raff. Vandalism was widespread. Metalwork fencing and wrought iron spiral railings were removed for sale as scrap metal. The original fencework and gates of the cemetery disappeared. Lead was prised out of the monument inscriptions and converted into shot (information from one perpetrator, now deceased) for catapaults etc.

Headstones were thrown down: not much physical strength is needed to dislodge most slabs from the base block to which they are cemented. Many were thus broken. Small decorative crosses were broken off from elaborate monuments (e.g. BOLADERAS No. 25-210). At least 34 slabs are lacking the crosses which formerly surmounted them. They have obviously been deliberately smashed: the crosses have disappeared.

Massive chests (masonry, cement-rendered brickwork, concrete) have vanished (Schoals etc.). Their materials have presumably been used as "fill" on various projects.

Vaults have been entered and the coffins of some have been smashed. The latest incident occurred in the SHENTON vault (No. 15-94) during the night of 11-12 July 1985 (West Australian, page 2, 13 July 1985). There are eleven names on this Shenton vault (eight Shentons; three Cousins). On 12 July 1985 three coffins were visible plus the remains of one other which had obviously been smashed. A few pieces of skull and parts of leg bones were all that remained of the skeleton which this coffin had contained. Where are the others - coffins and skeletons? (Observations by Jim Maher & David Davies, C.A.L.M., and J.A. Richardson).

Ranger David Davies has recorded 66 headstones damaged (thrown down and/or broken) during the period 1977-85 during his custodianship of the cemetery. In addition during 1984-1985, there have been several incidents during which the slabs over vaults have been displaced. A few were shifted sufficiently to allow access to the vault below. Several headstones have been thrown down and vaults tampered with during 1986.

Possible reasons for such acts appear to be:

- deliberate destruction as a recreational pleasure
- search for possible trinkets, gold teeth fillings
- necrophilic activities. Jim Maher (April 1986) reported evidence of witchcraft activities in the cemetery.

As of 1986 it appears that less than 20% of the gravesites and monuments which once stood in the cemetery have been preserved. It is certain that a great deal of information of socio-economic and cultural value has been irrevocably lost.

STATISTICS

Mortality Rates 1830-1923

It is uncertain how many people were interred in the East Perth Cemetery since it became operational in 1830: probably more than ten thousand.

Two surveys of the cemetery were made prior to the present investigation (1983-1985). These were:

- June 1952: Anglican graves recorded by the Rev. (now Archdeacon) Ted Doncaster, Archivist, Anglican Church. Recorded the existence of many unmarked graves.
- . <u>Dated 1960</u>: All denominations by Miss Henderson, R.W.A.H.S. et al., within the cemetery as now defined (sites west of Plain Street had been obliterated at that time).

Gravesites in East Perth Cemetery have been resurveyed by Dr J.A. Richardson and Ranger David Davies, aided part-time by Mrs D.M. Richardson during the period March 1983 onwards. Results of this investigation are summarised below (Table 28).

Alphabetical and numerical indices of persons interred or commemorated in East Perth Cemetery have been compiled. These combine data still extant from the 1983-1986 survey plus additional data from the 1952 and 1960 catalogues. Supplementary data have been assembled from information supplied by descendants of pioneer families following publication of articles concerning the cemetery in the "Western Australian" (25th August, 1984, P. 12) and the "Sunday Times" (9th September, 1984, p. 48). Data currently available are summarised below (Table 29).

It must be stressed that the graphical and tabulated "statistics" presented are "skewed" due to:

- small numbers of gravesites and paucity of data for the period 1830-1870.
- impermanence of earth mounds and wooden markers of so many of the impoverished whose relations could not afford to erect more durable masonry monuments.
- . loss of so many graves and markers by natural decay, by vandalism and removal to Karrakatta.
- . declining use of E.P.C. after its formal closure in 1899.



EAST PERTH CEMETERY: PERCENTAGES OF TOTAL DEATHS RECORDED 1830-1920, BY QUINQUENNIALS




EAST PERTH CEMETERY: DEATHS BY QUINQUENNIALS 1830-1920 PERCENTAGES MALE AND FEMALE











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



Inscriptions on the Monuments

The amount of information recorded on the monuments still preserved in the East Perth Cemetery varies considerably. It comprises data relative to some or all of the following categories:

- Biodata of the deceased
- . Expression of affection introductory to the epitaph
- . Religious comment.

Biodata

Some headstones record complete biodata: full name, age and date at death; sometimes date of birth and occasionally cause of death. On many headstones data are incomplete. Of extant monuments the status of biodata is summarised below:

Several monuments carry more than one inscription. SHENTON vault No. 19-142 carries "Sacred to the memory of" four times: site no. 35-412 carries "In Memoriam" three times for SNOOK and WIGGLESWORTH.

Epitaphs (Appendix VII)

The epitaphs preserved record typical Victorian and Edwardian sentiments. They closely resemble those which can be found in many graveyards in the United Kingdom of the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. There is a preponderence of religious sentiments. Epitaphs record a widely held belief in the resurrection; of the eventual reunion of the living with the deceased in a better world; of the pleasure experienced in leaving this "vale of tears". Many epitaphs express a virtually fatalistic acceptance of God's will, which, despite the trauma experienced by the living, was nevertheless all for the best in the long run.

Some inscriptions indicate that the still living are unwilling or unable to accept that a loved one really has died. Many indicate that the deceased is certain of a happy future in heaven with God and the angelic hosts: to rest there for ever more. One particularly pro-religious epitaph is recorded on a glorious Celtic Cross thus:

QUINLAN No. 22-175 (Roman Catholic)
"The Celtic cross raise o'er me
And the ivy round it twine
'Twill tell to the world that bore me
That the dear old faith was mine"

There are references that God periodically needed additional angels in heaven so he took a little child. And the pathos of some simple records of multiple child deaths! Several inscriptions contain the sentiment that "the life of the deceased was craved, but that God denied"; in that despite the families love for one of its members God, in his infinite wisdom and compassion thought it best to take the loved one 'home'.

There are several epitaphs relating to the inadequacy of medical remedies during what was the terminal illness, e.g.:

READ No. 9-45
"Afflictions sore long time I bore
Physicians all in vain
Till death did seize me and so did
please to ease my pain".

(A similar verse is quoted in "A Grave Look at History", p. 164 by Lionel Gilbert - from an old English grave).

There are also sentiments welcoming death as a sort of reward - a release from sorrow, sin and pain and freedom from every care in this worst of all worlds (OSBORNE No. 20-158).

Reading the hundreds of epitaphs and memorials still extant in East Perth Cemetery one obtains a sense of the religious biases of the period 1830 to the early 1920s. Whether the reality was truly as recorded perhaps remains conjectural. I recall a sapient epigram penned by a realist (cynic?):

"If you think you can never change the past You've never read an obituary".

I raised the matter of the validity of epitaphs with Fr. Burke, Archivist of the Roman Catholic Church (until late 1984). His reply: "If the sentiments expressed were true for even a short while, then they are justified". I wonder!

Monument inscriptions range from the laconic to the inordinately lengthy. Typical short statements include:

Among the longer inscriptions is the description contained on Site No. 36-445, a record of pioneers murdered by aboriginees, and the longest epitaph in the graveyard comprising eight quatrains would perhaps now be described as twee (WHITEHEAD No. 32-374). Both are recorded by Lionel Gilbert in "A Grave Look At History".

Site 32-374

A tall Gothic monument by Wilson, Gray & Co. of St Georges Terrace, Perth, with symbolic cloud, hand and garland, bears an epitaph remarkable for both its length and its Victorian sentiments:

Eliza Whitehead, 47 years, 13 February 1898

Come hither Dearest Husband, And take this hand of mine, I'm going to that Country Where other Seasons shine.

The stars are beaming brightly And hushed is every strain: The played the Silver Moonbeams Upon the crystal pane.

And in the tranquil lustre, Stood spirits, robed in white, And on each shining forehead Was set a Crown of Light.

Then sang they of that Summer That brings not Winter's shade, Of love that knows not sorrow, Of flowers that never fade.

Dearest Husband! let not the Teardrop glisten Nor mourn the absent one. The flowers are ever saying God's Holy Will be done.

There runs through every Eden A stream of mortal woes, The stately oak is dying, And death awaits the rose.

Then round this simple structure Let Speedwell gather root. Place at my head the Kingcup, And Daisy at the foot. And let the Weeping Willow, Wave o'er this sacred spot, With the Lily of the Valley, And the sweet Forget-me-not.

THEY WERE MURDERED, apparently whilst alseep in the night by ABORIGINAL NATIVES with whom, as there is every reason to suppose, THEY BELIEVED THAT THEY WERE ON FRIENDLY TERMS.

The Colonial Government, J.S. HAMPTON being the GOVERNOR, took upon itself the task of interring them in this place, and erecting this monument.

MAITLAND BROWN was the leader of the little band of brave men who risking their own lives, found and brought back for Christian Burial the bodies of their deceased friends.

Many of the cemetery's epitaphs are listed in Appendix VII.

Headstones on Jewish graves contain basic data in English plus inscriptions in Hebrew: one contains a complete English translation on the west face of the headstone (KOTT 18-119) and another has the entire inscription in Hebrew (SEELIGSON 18-120).

Seven Japanese graves contain inscriptions in beautifully executed characters without English translation: basic biodata are recorded in English. These lie in the Presbyterian section. One Chinese grave has the entire inscription in hieroglyphics with no English re biodata: also Presbyterian.

There is one Spanish grave in the Catholic section:

45-585 PUJALS-Y-MORELL: Aqui descansan los restos de Jose PUJALS-Y-MORELL, nacional de Vila Seca, Provincia de Tarragona (Espana). Fallecio el 13 de Agosto de 1897 a los 16 años de edad.

The inscription is recorded also in English.

Two Anglican sites carry inscriptions in German:

48-643 WALKEMEYER: Hier schläft unser Liebling Emilie WALKEMEYER, Geb. 8 Oct. 1898, Gest 9 Juli 1899. Ruhe Sanft.

"Here sleeps our darling...... Born 8 Oct. 1898, Died 9 July, 1899. Sleep peacefully".

58-730 SASSANOWSKY: Christus ist mein leben. Und der sterben ist mein gewinn.

"Christ is my life. And death is my reward".

One Presbyterian site carries an elaborate monument containing a family shield with the following inscription in Spanish:

28-261 BARRETT LENNARD: "La bondad para la medra".

The precise meaning is uncertain. A reasonable translation is: "Prosperity through kindness".

EPC Monumental Masonry

The cemetery is a treasure-house of fine, imaginative masonry: the craftwork of many monuments is superb. They are divisible into two groups:

- . Vertical: headstones, footstones, some shields, a few metal plaques and one metal pyramid.
- . Horizontal and Tilted: ledgers, altars, tables, chests, books, wedges, some shields and two small copper plaques.

Many of the headstones now lie flat over the grave top, fallen due to failure of the cement bond to base, or, more usually the result of vandalism. Many are cracked or split asunder and a few are shattered. Some of the broken slabs have been stabilised by setting them in a cement bed flat on the grave top.

In general, the horizontal and tilted monuments have suffered less damage but some have been vandalised. Slabs over some vaults have been shifted and the vaults have been entered and disturbed/ransacked. A few slabs have been split apart.

Some gravesites are marked by headstone and footstone, usually of identical masonry style. Some graves have more than one headstone. Others combine two types of monument, e.g. headstone plus ledger or altar. One site No. 13-76 comprises a slate ledger (HOWLETT) surmounted by a slate altar (SUMMERS). Some monuments display multiple motifs, e.g. ledger surmounted by scroll or wedge.

Very many styles of headstone slab are represented: simple oblong with bevalled corners, norman, gothic, combined norman/gothic, many variations on anthropomorphic patterns, and peaked slabs. Many graves are marked by crosses, Calvary on a three or four tiered base; Celtic (Gaelic; Ring Cross), Latin, rustic and a number of unusual designs. Many of the headstones are now broken and the formerly surmounting cross is missing. There is a considerable variety of "massive" monuments comprising pedestals, obelisks, tapered columns, pyramids, blocks, a "tree" and a gabled stone.

The types of monument recorded during the 1983-85 survey are summarised in Table 36, illustrated in Plates 1-81, Photographs DD 1-20; J.A.R. A 0-37, B 00-B37, C 00-C36, and itemised in Appendix XII.

The cemetery contains a very extensive variety of monumental forms (Plates 1-81; Appendix XII). All the standard types of slabs are represented: simple oblong, peaked, anthropomorphic, norman and gothic (Plate 1). There are numerous variations on the basic designs. Simple gently rounded, bevalled, chamfered, and modestly stepped slabs occur (Plates 2, 3, 4). Many designs of peaked slab are represented ranging from a simple design (type 6), slightly rounded (type 6A), with stepped and scalloped corners (types 29, 111, 185, 198), to an elaborately gabled (type 15) (Plates 4, 5, 6, 7, 73).

DYER 5-23 (type 4, Plate 55) is a massively gabled monument with corinthian columns: in addition, elaborately carved acanthus leaves decorate the gable. Formerly it was surmounted by a cross (or urn?), now lost. MEARES 56-710 is of unusual design with the peak surmounted by a small stele decorated with a diamond pattern (Plate 79).

A wide range of anthropomorphic slabs is preserved (Plates 4, 8, 56).

There are many simple norman arches (type 1), particularly effective in dark grey slate or white marble, e.g. Edwards No. 3-10 (Plate 12). Others are decorated, e.g. WOOD 13-73 with a crescent of roses/poppies over the arch; REGAN 20-148 with a beautifully wrought sash around the arch (Plate 33) and GRIGSON 44-582 with a pair of fern fronds and fleur-de-lys surmounting the slab (Plate 34).

The considerable range of styles of norman arches on slabs is shown in Plate 67. A few headstones combine peaked and norman designs, e.g. DYSON 13-78 (Plate 71). WOOLLEY 27-229 is a simple norman arch with an elaborate floral decoration over its cap and a beautifully sculptured, tasselled ropework sash on the face (Plate 74).

Gothic slabs are prevalent and they appear in many styles ranging from simple to highly complex (Plates 9-12, 68). O'KEEFE 28-253 (type 8, Plate 12) represents the basic design. Highly ornate and unusual types are illustrated on Plates 9, 10, 11, 12. A few monuments are of ogee design (or modified Gothic), e.g. WADA 14-91, ADAMS 47-627 and TURNER 60-752 (Plate 11).

Some gothic slabs combine two or more styles, e.g. PLANT 13-82 (Plate 71) and HERDSMAN 45-594 (Plate 77). The basic design resembles type 52, an arch over squared shoulders. Decoration within this form includes a simple arch (type 8) and a "shouldered arch" (type 23). LEE 28-254 (Plate 75) represents a particularly elaborate gothic slab surmounted by beautifully carved acanthus leaves and formerly by a cross (or urn?), now lost. WHITEHEAD 32-374 (Plate 63) is a simple arch (type 8) adorned with carved flanges on the shoulders.

There are many Celtic crosses (Plates 13, 14, 15, 16), including solid types e.g. BROWN 21-163, WHELAN 2-6 and HILL 56-706; hollow forms e.g. ADKINSON 30-306; TOMLINSON 40A-507 and WHEELER 30-294 constructed of concrete with reinforcing iron bars (now vandalised and smashed). Unusual decorations include four small spheres in each quadrant - RYAN 22-173 (Plate 14); resurrection dawn (four spikes in each quadrant) - NOWLAND 47-622 (Plate 15); bevel-ended cross plus an aeolian harp - HAYES 30-289 (Plate 16); spiked ends to cross (avellan) - ADKINSON 30-306 (Plate 13).

Unusual types of Celtic cross include CHIPPER 36-446 (Plate 54) and BULLEN 35-407 (type 149, Plate 47), a spear-ended cross. Three Celtic crosses, CONNOR 22-175B, QUINLAN 22-175A (Plate 62) and KELLY 39-485 have miniature lych-gates surmounting the cross: they are beautifully shingled.

Calvary and Latin crosses appear on many graves (Plates 17, 18, 19). Some of the Calvary crosses are mounted on three or four blocks but many of them surmount stepped slabs, commonly of white marble, e.g. DALZELL 34-385 (type 97, Plate 18), YOUNG 55-702 (type 32, Plate 19, 49) and NELSON 19-141 (type 7, Plate 54). There are in addition many simple crosses mounted on rounded slabs, e.g. STONE 62-775 (Plate 18; tapered slabs, "LITTLE ERIC" 28-271 (Plate 19) and LAMBERT 49-468 (Plate 17). Unusual designs are represented by STEWART 46.603 (Plate 17), O'CONNELL 48-638 (Plate 17) decorated with rising sun motif, and ENGLAND 30-298 (Plate 18) with what appear to be angel's wings on the slab (cross is missing).

A few Rustic crosses occur, e.g. CLAFFEY 26-214 (Plate 20). There is one modified quadrate cross, MARTYN 27-238 (Plate 20), a formee cross, FERGUSON 30-316 (Plate 21), and a few forms of unusual design, e.g. THOMAS 30-317 (Plate 20), WRIGHT 60-755 (Plate 21).

Shields of many designs are shown on Plate 22. Scrolls are fairly common both as the main component of the monument, e.g. BAKER 47-626, INEZ 18-25 (Plate 23), and within decorative panels, e.g. SASSANOWSKY 58-730 (Plate 34), STONE 10-48 (Plate 36).

A few graves are marked by an open book, e.g. the huge example at STRICKLAND 28-266 and the simple form on JACOBY 57-717 (Plate 23). A few monuments contain an open book within a panel on the headstone, e.g. MILFORD 45-597 (Plate 35).

Unusual monuments include:

CLULEE Dora 44-576 DOWER Tommy 57-716 A simple block of black basalt; rough cut A massive block of grey granite: weight about one tonne. In addition to the original gravesite monuments preserved in the cemetery there are four modern additions:

HESTER Sophia & Thomas 36.452

A memorial slab erected by descendants during 'WAY 79', 1979.

MORGAN Abraham

36-451

A memorial slab erected by descendants in 1978.

STIRLING Capt James

A granite stele with bronze plaque commemorating the landing of the founder of the Swan Colony.

KYLE Lady, wife of the then Governor of W.A.

Plaque commemorating the planting of a tree on June 3, 1979.

Monuments and Materials

A wide range of monumental types is still preserved in the East Perth Cemetery despite the loss of very many gravesites and stones. They are summarised in Table 38.

Metamorphic rocks, comprising marble and slate comprise over 75% of all the monuments. Sedimentary rocks, sandstones and limestones amount to 8.64%, igneous rocks only 2.45%; composites almost 3% and metals 0.8%. Monuments composed of two or more materials make up about 10% of the total. However many monuments (mono-component) are attached to bases of composite materials, e.g. grouted into a cement slab or slotted into cement-rendered masonry.

Most of the monumental material, marble, slate, Portland limestone, granite and syenite, was imported from Europe and Britain; only a small proportion of the gravestones are composed of local materials, some sandstones, limestones (including Fremantle stone), "composites", metals and granites.

Some 77% of all monuments were executed in marble or marble plus one or more materials. The marble is mostly white or white flecked with grey: a few headstones are made of darker grey-white marble. In general, the marble monuments have withstood the effects of weathering without undue erosion. Many are broken and some shattered, the result of deliberate vandalism. Some show erosion along textural and/or colour banding and also leaching and cracking along joints.

The Douglas headstone (No. 27-225) is the only monument in the cemetery in which extreme disintegration has occurred along a series of closely spaced fractures in a very poor quality marble.

Limestone (mostly Portland Oölite plus some coastal limestone — aeolinite and sandy shelly limestone) and sandstone (mostly Donnybrook plus various other calcareous sandstones) make up about 10% of the surviving monuments. Several of them show advanced erosion over the west face and also over the lower portion of the east face (due to wind-scour and water runoff). Parts of some inscriptions have already been lost and parts of others are almost unreadable.

Slate, generally black, very dark grey or brownish-grey, is the third most common material used in the cemetery (6.2%): "Slate" as herein designated includes strongly indurated slaty siltstones. It has withstood weathering fairly well but some headstones are eroded along fissile planes. These open up under the influence of temperature changes so that the slate flakes and spalls off. Many of the headstones show moderate to severe spalling on their western sides (exposed to winter rains and gales), others show various degrees of spalling on the east face: consequently some inscriptions are endangered. Only one slate headstone has lost its entire inscription (No. 45-587): not a trace of the lettering has survived.

Igneous rocks used (ca. 2.5%) in the monuments include pink, dark red and grey granite, a pale microgranite, dark grey speckled syenite and apparently basalt. In addition to headstones, ledger and altar slabs and massive block grave surrounds, granite has been used as the base for several headstones of marble, limestone and sandstone. All the igneous rock monuments show no significant weathering. Some of the rock used is truly beautiful (e.g. Nos. 27-248 & 27-249).

A few headstones and most of the chests and peaked chests are constructed of composites which have generally survived with only minor surficial erosion. Concrete or cement-rendered masonry was commonly used as base for headstones (usually marble), as supports for altars, walls for chests and as under-slab for ledgers. Several gravesites have cement tops.

Five gravesites are marked by small iron plaques which display a considerable range of elaborate decor. They are generally well preserved and, currently, all are painted black. Two have been somewhat damaged, presumably by vandals.

Relatively recent interments of cremation ashes are marked by small copper plaques on cement/terrazo base blocks on gravesite Howard (No. 19-145).

The elaborate pyramidal monument to Goldwyer, Harding, Panting and Maitland Brown (No. 36-445) is metal upon a masonry base.

The distribution of materials among the several types of monuments is summarised in Appendix VIII.

Monumental Masons

359, almost 42% of the existing grave monuments in East Perth cemetery, carry the names of the masons who fashioned them. In many monuments the mason's name is prominently displayed: they certainly can be proud of their creations. On others, the name has been recorded almost "surreptitiously", e.g. in very small letters on the back of a slab, down one side, along the top edge, or at the extreme foot where, when the local vegetation is lush during the wet season, the name is hidden. Ranger David Davies and friend John De Boer have assisted me during 1985 in compiling a comprehensive list of monumental masons who have produced the monuments. Almost 90% of the signed monuments still preserved in the cemetery were carved by masons resident in the Perth metropolitan area. Seven masons have signed headstones without indicating locality; twenty monuments were made in the Eastern States and ten in the United Kingdom.

Masons represented in the cemetery are summarised in Tables 40 and 41 and listed in Table 42.

MONUMENTS: SYMBOLS AND DECOR

Ranger David Davies and Dr J.A. Richardson made a systematic survey of existing monuments in the East Perth cemetery during 1986. Its purpose was to record the wealth of symbolism and styles of decorative monumental artistry still preserved (Plates 1-81, Appendix IX).

Symbolism is represented in the cemetery by:

- . a wide variety of monumental styles (Plate 1).
- . many decorative devices: figures, florals, geometric patterns etc.

243 of the grave monuments do not feature special symbols, e.g. florals (Table 47) and devices (Table 46).

Design of the Monuments

The East Perth Cemetery monuments are summarised in Table 43 (details in Table 36).

The very wide range of monumental styles still preserved in East Perth Cemetery is illustrated in Plates 1-81 and listed in Appendix XII.

Additional to headstone crosses many monuments are embellished with panels in which are inscribed small crosses. These decorative devices include the following small crosses, often combined with simple or elaborate floral patterns, angels and anchors (Plates 24, 25).

O'CONNOR 22-176 features a simple chamfered cross within a circular panel (Plate 24) and STEWART 46-603 contains a trapezoid plaque on the grave top: this shows a celtic cross filled with sea shells (Plate 25). DARCH 43-556 features a small cross within an elaborate panel: daisies decorate the cross and their stems are threaded through its arms (Plate 27). ROBINSON 31-324 features a latin cross on rocks within a panel encircled by willow fronds. In addition each shoulder of the peaked slab is embellished by a sunrise device comprising two sets of thirteen rays (Plate 25).

Many headstones are decorated by insert panels, e.g. GWYNNE 43-563 rounded oblong slab, type 13 with insert norman panel, type 1 (Plate 69, 70). COCKRAM 41-535 is a simple norman slab decorated by a three-fold panel, type 105 (Plate 70). SOWDEN 44-581 (Plate 71) is an ogee/gothic slab decorated by a decorative panel. BENNETT 10-54 (Plate 4, 54) a peaked/anthropomorphic slab, carries a small light-house on each shoulder and panels with 4-point stars within circles. SMITH 34-384 (type 183, Plate 10, 30) carries a small latin cross on each shoulder and a central panel showing a sunrise of resurrection and IHS below a small cross.

Many types of shields are represented including one decorated by elaborate ropework, WOLFF 29-784 and CAPORN 20-152 designed as a huge ivy leaf (Plate 22). Five gravesites are marked by scrolls including some very elaborate types, e.g. BAKER 47-626 carved from a large marble block simulating a rock-mass (Plate 23). In addition many monuments feature a scroll, commonly small, placed in a panel high on the headstone. Many of these contain words "At Rest", "Gone Home" etc. Book monuments are few: they include the massive slab covering the STRICKLAND vault 28-266. Various designs on monuments are illustrated by Plates 24-27.

Non-Floral Symbolism

The great variety of monumental and non-floral symbolism in the cemetery is listed in Table 44.

Obelisks: There are three broken obelisks; NESBIT 4-18 stands on rocks and a spiral inscription ascends the column: "Till the day breaks and the shadows flee away". The monument is beautifully executed in granite. The CLARKSON and KEY 20-151 broken obelisk is decorated by what appears to be stylised flame. The CAMPBELL and LACEY 14-86 monument comprises a tapered obelisk surmounted by a Grecian urn and standing on a four-tiered base (Wesleyan pastors). The obelisks of GRANT 27-248 and LACEY 43-552 are decorated with scroll work.

Animals: There are only two monuments featuring griffons. BARRETT-LENNARD 28-261 (Plate 7) features a griffon on a shield inscribed "La Bondad para la Medra" ("Improvement through Goodness"), with dolphins top and bottom of the shield. There is a very elaborate floral decor on the headstone featuring lily, rose, daisy and leaves. In HAMERSLEY 28-267 (Plate 48) a griffon holds a cross on a shield. A griffon on a closed visor of a helmet stands on a shield with three rams. A sash carries the inscription "Honore et amore" ("Honour and love").

WRIGHT 60-755, grave of an 18-month-old child contains a kneeling lamb within a decorative panel (Plate 24, 26).

Angels: Are featured on twelve monuments. CASS, BIGNELL, KRUGER 13-81, 0'KEEFE 28-253 (Plate 59) and ARMSTRONG 17-112 both show an angel clinging to a Latin cross on rock base. MEWS 13-79 (Plate 66) features clasped hands and angel on both sides holding a wreath. In the MONGER monument 19-142 an angel draped by a garland is strewing flowers on the grave. In HILLS 47-629 a cherub holds a bunch of flowers and is strewing them on the grave. In SNOOK & WIGGLESWORTH 35-412 the angel is strewing roses. In LILLIS 42-541 an angel standing on rocks is holding on to an anchor and pointing urgently to heaven. SPRATT 35-405 is an avellan cross with two angels within a circular panel. JONES 32-360 features a symbolic cloud, angels' wings and acanthus decor with an hourglass (the only one in the cemetery).

Anchors: Seven monuments feature anchors usually with a chain or rope, e.g. COUTTS 27-223, mariner (Plate 59). RICHARDS 39A-484 shows a circular panel with anchor and entwined ivy and STUART 43-558 has a scroll with Latin cross and anchor, surmounted by a dove, now broken (type 102, Plate 53).

Cloud Symbol: Six monuments feature clouds associated with a hand. The hand holds a broken chain in McCANN 13-83 (Plate 66), HILES 22-180 (Plate 63), and FLETCHER 36-434 in which the hand is pointing down. In McGRATH 41-522 the stylised cloud is associated with a scroll showing clasped female and male hands and acanthus decor. In WHITEHEAD 32-374 (Plate 63) a hand protruding from a cloud holds an elaborate wreath.

Crown of Thorns: KNIGHT 36-455 (Plate 49) features a panel with a beautifully executed crown of thorns, the only one in EPC.

Doves: AVERY 55-693 (Plate 11), FOSTER 41-534 (Plate 48), and STUART (43-558 (Plate 53) all feature doves on the monument.

<u>Dawn of Resurrection</u>: is figured on ROBINSON 31-374 (Plate 25, 28): a thirteen ray sunrise is shown on each shoulder. O'CONNELL 48-638 (Plate 57) shows a sunrise within the quadrants of a latin cross: each quadrant contains four long and three short rays.

Eye of God: appears on a few headstones, e.g. MORONEY 46-604 (Plate 25) within a patee cross.

Freemason's Signs: Compass (dividers) and set square occur on four graves, FEIN 19-137, KING 30-314, BULLEN 35-407 (in a circular panel on a celtic cross) and HASLUCK 60-754.

Grecian Urns: Twenty-five grave sites feature urns, some with handles, some without. Most of the urns stand upon an altar cloth complete with beautifully executed sash and tassels. Many are draped with a garland of flowers, often roses (PHILLIPS 41-530). Two graves feature a child directly associated with the urn. In GLOVER 15-107 the child is holding flowers over the urn; LEIGHTON 54-680 is a cast-iron plaque on which a child wearing a long head veil is squatting before the urn and blessing it. The BARRY 20-159 iron plaque features a crown with the urn; GIBBS 28-256 shows the urn with shroud standing on a bible above a tasselled altar cloth. McCORMACK 51A-669 features a flame decor with the urn. One of the most poignant memorials in the cemetery is PEARSON 31-335. This is a chest monument with urn and shroud in memory of a young woman. Statues of her husband and small daughter both in attitudes of deep grief and despair are posed at the front of the monument. It is featured in Lionel Gilbert's book "A Grave Look at History" (p. 105).

Hands: Thirteen monuments feature the human hand. KOTT 18-119, Jewish, shows a pair of hands praying. Twelve headstones show clasped hands, female with beautifully wrought lace sleeves on the left, male with cuffs and links on the right. Ancillary symbols include angel MEWS 13-79, shamrock HOYNE 39-486, McGRATH 41-522 with scroll and a cloud. The hands shown on monuments WALKER 58-732 and BLENCOWE 58-734 have an extra thumb joint.

Floral symbolism and decoration on the East Perth Cemetery monuments ranges from a few simple willow leaves indicative of sorrow to very elaborate multi-floral bouquets, garlands and panels (Table 45). Many headstones carry pairs of willow leaves (salix babylonica, the weeping willow) set among the lettering. The ROBINSON 31-324 peaked slab carries a central circular panel featuring a Latin cross framed by a willow garland. Willow, either alone, or

in combination with other plants, is shown on some 162 monuments and is by far the most widely used symbol.

Lilies, specifically the Madonna lily, is the next most widely used floral symbol in the cemetery. It is used alone in panels, e.g. WHELAN 2-6 and HILL 56-706 (Plate 14), BROWN 15-100 within a gothic panel (Plate 9); FFARRINGTON/LONGBOTTOM 29-286 in a circular panel (Plate 16); PLANT 13-82 (Plate 71) in a gothic panel.

Roses have been incorporated in many monuments as bouquets and garlands, as decorative devices within panels and capping headstones. SMITH 40-492 (Plate 6) is a peaked slab carrying a crescent of roses over the apex. TAYLOR 30-299 IPlate 9) carries four- and five-petal roses associated with fleur-de-lis, and CRESSWELL 32-367 (Plate 10) has a row of small roses on both shoulders of an acute gothic arch. TURNER 60-752 (Plate 11) is a modified gothic slab decorated with 9 roses spaced over crest and shoulders; they contain 5, 6 or 7 petals.

Ivy has been widely used. In McBRIDE 21-171 (Plate 9) ivy is entwined around an inclined latin cross (sloping N to S) within a gothic panel. SPEED 43-551 (Plate 10) has a similar device with the cross inclined S to N. Lilies and ivy decorate the gothic slab REECE 33-379 (Plate 11). Ivy, laurel and fleur-de-lis embellish JAMES 27-234 (Plate 12), a particularly beautiful headstone. The LEAKE 30-304B (Plate 46) scroll shows beautifully carved climbing ivy.

Shamrock has been used to decorate many Catholic Irish monuments. MORRIS 50-656 (Plate 9) and MURPHY 45-583 (Plate 11) both carry a small cross with shamrock-shaped arms. O'KEEFE 28-253 (Plate 12) carries a gothic panel with an angel clinging to a latin cross. The panel is enclosed on both sides by ascending shamrocks. NAUGHTON 21-161 (Plate 19) carries a beautifully wrought "IHS" in which the S is greatly extended and terminates in a group of shamrocks. WOLFF 29-784 (Plate 22) is a shield embossed with an avellan cross entwined with shamrocks.

Acanthus leaves decorate several monuments, e.g. McNEE 27-240 (Plate 4) with elaborately carved designs over the arch. PUSEY 45-595 (Plate 10) is a gothic slab with panel containing clasped hands with ancillary acanthus leaves as decor. ENGLAND 30-798 (Plate 18) shows acanthus leaves (or possibly angel's wings?) adorning the slab: its cross is missing.

Daisies of many varieties are widely used either alone, or as components of floral motifs. DARCH 43-556 (Plate 27) shows three daisies on stems threaded through a cross within a headstone panel.

The passion flower is a widely used component of floral panels, e.g. GUILFOYLE 27-217 depicts passion flowers and leaves on three arms of a Calvary cross and a vine engraved on its upright. LAMB 62-778 (Plate 70) contains a panel with passion flowers enclosing small crosses.

Sashes, often elaborately carved, are fairly abundant, generally associated with garlands or bouquets of assorted flowers. Decorative panels of flowers are widely used on the shoulders and within panels on headstones: there is a very wide variety of such devices.

Calligraphy on the Monuments

I.H.S. (In Holy Sacrament) appears on many monuments, particularly among the Roman Catholic graves. Some are engraved in simple lettering: many are very elaborate. McELHATTON 41-523 (Plate 13) and O'CONNELL 48-638 (Plate 17) have simple styles. PURCELL 57-664 (Plate 13), NAUGHTON 21-161 (Plate 19) are highly decorative: in the latter the curves of the "S" are greatly extenuated and terminate in sprays of shamrock leaves. HOYLE 19-143 (Plate 24) shows a beautiful I.H.S. fashioned with a wrought-iron plaque: the "I" and "H" both have fourchee ends. RANFORD 30-310 (Plate 26) shows "IHS" within a panel comprising nine circles (a good-luck number). LILLIS 42-541 (Plate 29) features a particularly elaborate and beautiful "IHS": highly decorative. TOBIN 47A-781 (Plate 34) shows "IHS" on a scroll set on an Avellan cross with ivy leaves.

The monuments in East Perth Cemetery are characterised by a very wide range of styles of calligraphy. These range from basic roman block lettering to very highly ornamental scripts. Examples are shown on Plates 26-30, 33. Various of the words "Sacred to", "In Memory of" etc. are decorated with curlicues or with willow fronds. DEARDON 22-303 (Plate 26) depicts "of" within a broken circle and McMAHON 24-211 (Plate 26) shows "of" within a panel decorated with fleur-de-lis. McARDLE 35-401 (Plate 30) shows a highly elaborate "in" within a pattern of curlicues decorated with ivy fronds. GATWOOD 30-297 (Plate 28) shows "Sacred" in beautiful lettering above "to" engraved within crossed willow fronds.

Fencing-work Surrounding the Monuments

The cemetery shows a wealth of variety among the wrought-iron fences which enclose many of the gravesites. Some are simple spiral rails on plain supports embedded in cement stubs: these are widely used. Fences copmrising wrought-iron hoops with palings capped by fleur-de-lis, e.g. MORRISON 36-461 (Plate 31) are plentiful. Some of the spiral railings are supported by verticals containing elaborately wrought fleur-de-lis, e.g. CLAY 18-126 (Plate 31).

Very elaborate iron fences enclose some gravesites, e.g. MONGER 13-75 with beautiful fleur-de-lis and SUMMERS/HOWLETT 13-76 with a curlicue design (Plate 32).

The fencework around Lt. Col. Andrew CLARKE's grave is decorated with battle axes, beautifully wrought (28-274).

EAST PERTH CEMETERY: POSSIBLE GRAVESITES

David Davies and J.A. Richardson made a search for additional possible gravesites in the cemetery during September and October 1985. A few probable sites are indicated by brickwork or by corners of brickwork visible when vegetation has died off.

Many of the spaces separating graves still marked by monuments were obviously occupied by graves, now unmarked. They are indicated by:

- perceptible elongated depressions roughly the size of single or multiple gravesites. Several large vault sites are presented now by such "hollows".
- elongated patches of markedly greener grass and other plants, evidently nurtured by soil and subsoil which has been deeply dug. This feature is very obvious as elongate strips extending eastwards from still-standing headstones of graves whose perimeters are otherwise unmarked.
- rectilinear shadows show up in several areas of the cemetery on the coloured aerial photograph of December 1983. Several of these sites correspond closely to indications noted "on the ground".

A total of 443 possible additional sites has been mapped (Map 3) of which 434 seem to be reasonably definite and 9 somewhat speculative (Appendix XI).

A breakdown according to religious denomination is given in Table 47.

- Gothic, norman and miscellaneous slabs (oblong and variants, peaked, gabled, anthropomorphic) are most popular in all six denominations.

These groups of slabs and crosses together account for between 75% and 96% of all monuments in East Perth Cemetery. The remaining 5% to 25% of monuments comprise massive types (chests, pedestals, obelisks, columns, pyramids), ledgers and altars, and generally smaller structures (scrolls, books, plaques and shields).

There is an enormous variety of forms within each category as illustrated in Plates 1-81 and Table 55.

The materials used in the monuments are summarised by denominations in Table 56 and Graphs 13 and 14.

White marble alone or in combination with other materials (composites, sandstone, granite and basalt) is the most widely used material in all denominations: ranging between 58% (Independent) and 100% (Jewish). Average is 77%. Slate, limestone and sandstone account for between nil (Jewish) and 40% (Wesleyan): average is 16.47%. Igneous rocks (granite, syenite, basalt) range from nil (Jewish) to 6% (Independent): average is 2.57%. The remaining monuments are constructed of composites (concrete, cement-rendered brick; some containing slabs of the above materials) with a few metal plaques (iron and copper) plus one iron/masonry pyramid (36-455).







RELIGIOUS DENOMINATIONS: INSCRIPTIONS ON MONUMENTS

A wide range of commemorative phrases was used on the monuments in East Perth Cemetery between 1830 and the mid-1920's. They are summarised in Table 57 and Graph 15 and detailed by religious denomination in Tables 58-63. By far the most popular overall were:

- . In loving memory of
- . Sacred to the memory of
- . In Memory of

ranging between 62.5% (Jewish) and 78.74% (Anglican).

Variations in usages among religious groups are listed below:

- . "In loving memory of" most popular among adherents of the Independent Church, Roman Catholic, Presbyterian and Anglican.
- . "Sacred to the memory of" used most among Wesleyans.
- . "In loving remembrance of" popular among Presbyterians.
- . "In memoriam" popular among Wesleyans.

Introductory phrases found on Roman Catholic graves include (Table 60):

- . Glorium in Excelsis Deo
- . Of your charity pray for the soul of ...
- . Here lieth the remains of
- . Aqui descansan los restos de (Here rest the remains of)
- . Pray for Urban J.S. Fox

Phrases found on Anglican graves include (Table 63):

- . Underneath this tomb are interred the mortal remains of...
- . Worthy citizen and a true gentleman
- . In the vault under this tomb the body of J.A. Leake awaits the resurrection to eternal life.

In all denominations except the Jewish, some gravestones contain no introductory phrases; some recording only name with no bio-data are laconic in the extreme:

- e.g 40.494 Michael Ryan
 - 13.84B Bennett (scratched on a cement slab)
 - 27-227 Donald MacKenzie rests here

Some of the brief inscriptions are tender and poignant; they express heart-ache:

- e.g. 22.192 Our little Evelyn
 - 18.125 Inez, our little pet
 - 38-472 Waterman: my dear wife
 - 4-12 Allen: our darling Dulcie

Much insight into the nineteenth and early twentieth century beliefs and formalised expressions of grief can be derived from studies of the East Perth Cemetery monuments.



After the East Perth Cemetery was officially closed in 1899 and Karrakatta was opened, several headstones were removed from the old to the new burial ground. Reason: possibly better supervision and security — several such sites are identified by the wrought iron surrounding rail or fencing which still exists.

Other unidentified sites are indicated by remains of cement/concrete corner posts (for railings now vanished), by parts of brickwork tops to graves still visible during dry weather when obscuring vegetation has mostly disappeared.

Several sites were located by Ranger David Davies by probing with a metal rod. This indicated masonry and/or brickwork structures at depths of up to 0.5-0.6m below the present ground surface.

In 1982/83 the Police Department, Perth tested out a system of Ground Impulse Radar (GIR) provided by "Geophysical & Scientific Equipment", in a part of the Anglican burial ground. The area selected lies north of Bronte Street where no gravesites are indicated at surface level (no headstones, railed enclosures or corner posts etc.). The objective of the operation was to evaluate the efficacy of the method for locating disturbed ground which may contain murdered corpses and/or loot. We are indebted to Ranger David Davies who advised me of the project and to Sgt. Graeme Batt of the Perth Police for donating a copy of the radar record. This indicates gravesites.
