

Introduction

This document summarises submissions to the Draft Management Plan (DMP) for CALM's South Coast Region. The Draft Plan was released for public comment in April 1989, by the then Minister for Conservation and Land Management, the Hon Ian Taylor, MLA. The Plan was available for comment for a period of five months to August 1989, however if the Department had been notified before the closing date, late submissions were accepted.

The Plan was distributed to a large number of Government agencies, tertiary institutions, conservation and recreation groups, Local Authorities, and individuals. In addition, copies of the Plan were available for purchase from Departmental offices. Copies could also be viewed at local libraries, Shire offices and offices of the Department.

After release of the Plan, advertisements were placed in the Government Gazette as well as local and state newspapers, advising that the Plan was available for public comment. In addition, articles featuring aspects of the Plan appeared in several newspapers and television and radio coverage was given to the Plan. Letters advising of the Plan's availability were also sent direct to numerous individuals and organisations.

Number and Origin of Submissions Received

A total of 166 submissions was received (Submittors are listed in Appendix 2). All of these were substantive submissions, two being petitions with 128 and 12 signatures respectively.

A breakdown of submissions is as follows:

Review of Public Submissions

Submissions to the South Coast Region Draft Management Plan were reviewed in three stages:

- (A) As submissions generally commented on more than one Section of the Draft Plan, the comments were summarised and allocated to the relevant Sections of the Plan. (Comments on land use proposals in Chapter 3 are treated separately in Appendix 1).
- (B) The summarised comments were analysed according to a set of criteria.
 - 1. Changes were made to the Draft Plan if the submissions:
 - (a) provided additional information on physical, biological or geographical features of direct relevance to management;
 - (b) provided additional information on affected groups or on social, economic and cultural resources of direct relevance to management;
 - (c) clarified or indicated a change in Government legislation, management commitment or management policy since the Draft Plan was released;
 - (d) proposed improved or additional strategies that would better achieve management objectives;
 - (e) indicated omissions, inaccuracies or lack of clarity in the existing strategies, information or Plan presentation.
 - 2. Changes were not made to the Draft Plan if:
 - (a) there was clear support for the Draft Plan or change was not sought in the submission;
 - (b) submissions made recommendations which addressed issues beyond the scope of this Plan (Where possible, such recommendations will themselves be summarised separately and brought to the attention of the relevant decision-makers);
 - (c) points made were already in the Plan or are covered by existing policies;
 - (d) existing strategies appeared the most practical where submissions were strongly polarised or where Departmental resources are limited.

The analysis process is illustrated in Figure 1 which also indicates what action was taken in cases where the comment did not lead to a change in the Plan i.e. criteria 2(a), 2(b), 2(c) and 2(d).

(C) The DMP was amended where necessary. Minor editorial changes were also made.



APPENDIX 1

LAND USE PROPOSALS

Comments on the land use proposals in the DMP were treated separately to those in the body of the plan. These comments were reviewed in three stages:

- 1. Comments were summarised and listed under each land use proposal (or group of proposals)
- 2. The comments were analysed according to the action required to address the concerns expressed (if any) and a code from 1 to 8 allocated.
 - (1) The proposal was supported or concerns about the proposal were not expressed or were not specified.
 - (2) Concerns expressed are addressed by the existing proposal.

Concerns could be addressed by:

- (3) developing suitable management prescriptions after implementation of the proposal;
- (4) strengthening the proposal;
- (5) reducing the area of the proposal;
- (6) changing the purpose of the proposal;
- (7) "downgrading" the tenure of the proposal.
- (8) Concerns could only be addressed by allocation of the area of the proposal to an alternative landuse.
- (9) Concerns could not be addressed by modification of proposal.
- 3. One of four recommendations was made for each land use proposal (or group of proposals) in the light of action required to address the concerns expressed. These were:

CALM will pursue implementation of the proposal now.

CALM will pursue implementation of the proposal now and will make further contact with affected parties about the views expressed here.

CALM remains committed to the proposal, however further contact will be made with affected parties before implementation is pursued.

CALM will not pursue implementation of the proposal at this time but will consider seeking further public comment at a later date.

For most land use proposals (or groups of proposals), the recommended action is the most conservative necessary to address the concerns expressed (ie. the action equating to the highest code allocated to each proposal).

This relationship is illustrated in Table 1.

Where a range of comment types (codes) was received on one proposal (or group of proposals), or where concerns could be addressed in alternative ways, compromise recommendations have sometimes been made. Where a comment referred only to a part of a proposal (or group of proposals), the designation "(pt)" has been added to code. Additional justification for some proposals has been added to the final plan.

Implementation of certain "EPA Red Book" proposals affecting the South Coast Region is occurring independently of the regional planning process as outlined in the Government's "Resolution of Conflict" document released in 1990.
