## THE WESTERN AUSTRALIAN MARINE TURTLE PROJECT: 1996/97

Beachwork programs of the Western Australian Marine Turtle Project able to maintained for the 1996/97 nesting season were again limited by restriction of operational funding that could be secured in the first instance, with execution of considered viable work programs further disrupted for the Pilbara locations by the active tropical cyclone season this year.

Loss once again after only one year resumption of Commonwealth core funding via ANCA for the main project operations was a particularly severe blow. The good news was that BHP Iron Ore joined the project as a supporter for the flatback turtle work at Mundabullangana, and the Japan Wildlife Centre, Tokyo, made an additional donation to assist with the North West Cape and Muiron Islands work in association with their wildlife film project.

Additional assistance from CALM Gascoyne and Exmouth Districts, and the Pilbara Region, plus supplementary support from CALM SI Division meant that work programs for most established study sites could be considered. Continued Commonwealth World Heritage Management Program funding supported the Dirk Hartog Island loggerhead turtle work. Apache Energy also funded a work experience program which allowed the hawksbill turtle work at Varanus Island to be revived. Unfortunately, the Lacepede Islands work program could not be attempted - this was the major loss for 1996/97.

Tag and release and remigrant observation data for the 1996/97 season beach work programs are summarized below. Apart from the spectacular result from the Dirk Hartog Island work, the results for other sites generally reflect the interaction of the restrictions already noted above, and the coincident low nesting abundance of green turtles at the Pilbara study sites this summer, in contrast with 1995/96. Barrow Island volunteer work was also limited in consequence of restructuring of WAPET's oilfield operations.
