
Kathleen said the meeting resulted in an appreciation of the benefits of crossdepartment initiatives such as the family trail in Pinjar.

Mike added that this working arrangement was a pilot project which would serve as a model for other regions. He praised the creativity of DEC landscape architect, and the DEC construction teams.




Teams dovetail
