- ✓ Join in community water quality monitoring in your local area
- Get your school to join the Ribbons of Blue/Waterwatch WA program
- Ask your school or sports club to organise a river care day with the Swan River Trust
- Make sure that you and your family are not adding nutrients to the river system

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

### CAUSES OF WATER POLLUTION

"Pollution prevents people from using and enjoying the water for recreation."

"There are so many causes of pollution in the rivers it would take around ten pages to name them. I'm just going to name a few."

- X Industrial wastes
- X Oil and chemical spills
- × Sewage spills
- 🗶 Litter washed into drains by rain
- 🗙 Animal wastes
- Fertiliser and agricultural chemicals washed or blown from farmlands
- X Rubbish thrown into our rivers
- Excess nutrients especially nitrogen and phosphorus that make algae grow

## WHAT YOU CAN DO

"Ways to help the environment in your day to day activities."

- Don't tip paint or chemicals down the drain they can end up in the river and kill fish and other wildlife
- ✓ Find out from your local Council where to recycle and dispose of wastes properly
- Use biodegradable materials and phosphorus free detergents
- Check that your septic tank does not have a leak
- Don't put hazardous chemicals in the bin
- ✓ Dispose of rubbish carefully, especially plastic it could become a trap for wildlife
- Keep garden plants, clippings and aquarium plants away from rivers and wetlands - they could become invasive weeds
- ✓ Use slow release fertiliser too much fertiliser encourages the growth of algal blooms
- Wash your car on the lawn it saves water and stops detergents and chemicals going down the drains
- ✓ Use less water on the garden and water early in the morning
- Use local plants that belong in the area where you live – natives grow best and provide happy habitats for local birds and other animals
- Put a frog pond in your garden frogs eat the bugs, and you can cut down on pesticide usage
- Pick up rubbish around the river and from the water
- Pick up your dog poo and put it in an appropriate worm farm or in your rubbish bin
