

# Draft Environmental Protection (Swan Coastal Plain Wetlands) Policy and Regulations 2004







#### **Environmental Protection Policies**

An Environmental Protection Policy (EPP) is prepared under Part III of the *Environmental Protection Act 1986* and has "the force of law as though it had been enacted as part of this Act", on and from the day on which the policy is published in the *Western Australian Government Gazette*. The *Environmental Protection Act* is binding on the Crown. Accordingly, all government departments and agencies are required under law to comply with both the *Act* and EPPs prepared under the *Act*.

#### An EPP establishes:

- the boundaries of the area and the portion of the environment to which the policy applies; and
- the basis on which the environment in this area is to be protected, or pollution is to be prevented, controlled
  or abated.

#### In addition, an EPP may:

- identify and declare the beneficial uses of the environment to be protected under the policy;
- specify the environmental quality objectives to be achieved and maintained under the policy;
- set out the indicators, parameters or criteria to be used for measuring environmental quality in the policy area:
- make statements relating to any activity directed towards the protection of the environment, including the discharge of waste;
- create offences and penalty provisions; and
- establish a program for the achievement and maintenance of the environment quality objectives within the policy area and may specify, among other things, measures designed to:
  - i. minimise the possibility of pollution;
  - ii. protect the environment; and
  - iii. achieve and maintain the beneficial uses to be protected.

This document has no legal status. It is published to assist in understanding the requirements of the draft Policy and Regulations and the way in which it is intended to administer them.

#### **Foreword**

The Environmental Protection Authority (EPA) is an independent statutory authority and is the key provider of independent environmental advice to the Minister for the Environment. The EPA's objectives are to protect the environment and to prevent, control and abate pollution.

An Environmental Protection Policy (EPP) is a tool to achieve environmental protection. The *Environmental Protection (Swan Coastal Plain Lakes) Policy 1992* has helped to protect the environmental values of lakes on the Plain to date. Since that Policy's review in 1999, the EPA has been involved in the development of an EPP to protect wetlands as well. Based on advice from the State Solicitor's Office, the previous revised draft Policy, released in 2000, was remitted to the EPA by the Minister for the Environment in late 2003.

The EPA has since that time developed a draft *Environmental Protection (Swan Coastal Plain Wetlands) Policy 2004* and is releasing this Policy for public inspection and review under section 26 of the *Environmental Protection Act 1986*. This EPP, prepared by Parliamentary Counsel, contains a Policy Order, Policy and Regulations.

An Explanatory Document has been prepared to assist you in your review of this EPP. A draft wetlands register has also been prepared to depict proposed wetlands for protection under this Policy. These may be viewed on the EPA's web site. Copies may be obtained from the EPA (see address below) or Department of Environment offices on the Swan Coastal Plain (tel: 9222 7000 or 9378 0300).

The EPA is concerned that over 80 per cent of the wetlands on the Plain have already been lost to land development pressures, which are ongoing. The Policy and its proposed wetlands register are designed to protect the environmental values of the most important Swan Coastal Plain wetlands, which constitute less than 15 per cent of the remaining wetlands, while continuing to protect the Swan Coastal Plain lakes.

The approval for the *Environmental Protection* (Swan Coastal Plain Lakes) Policy 1992 is revoked.

# Environmental Protection (Swan Coastal Plain Wetlands) Policy 2004

Approved by the Minister under section 31(d) of the Act.

# Part 1 — Preliminary

### 1. Citation

This policy may be cited as the *Environmental Protection (Swan Coastal Plain Wetlands) Policy 2004.* 

### 2. Purposes of policy

- (1) This policy establishes the basis on which
  - (a) the environmental values of certain wetlands of the Swan coastal plain are to be protected as an intrinsic part of the natural hydrology and the surface and groundwater system of the Swan coastal plain; and
  - (b) pollution of, and environmental harm to, those wetlands are to be prevented or controlled.
- (2) The environmental quality objectives of the policy are —

- (a) the protection of the ecosystem health conditions of wetlands in the Swan coastal plain that meet the environmental quality criteria and of certain other wetlands, including the protection of the ecological structure, ecological function and ecological processes of those wetlands; and
- (b) the protection of the beneficial uses of those wetlands, including the use of the wetlands for study, education, recreation, aesthetic enjoyment and the benefit of the public generally.
- (3) The policy, in conjunction with the regulations, establishes a programme for achieving the environmental quality objectives by
  - (a) setting out criteria for measuring the environmental quality of the wetlands of the Swan coastal plain;
  - (b) providing for the identification and registration of wetlands that meet the environmental quality criteria and for the registration of certain other wetlands;
  - (c) providing for identifying and recording, for each registered wetland, the particular environmental values of the wetland that are to be protected; and
  - (d) providing a basis for the regulations to identify activities that cause, or have the potential to cause, material environmental harm or serious environmental harm to a registered wetland.

### 3. Relationship of policy with regulations

This policy is to be read with the *Environmental Protection* (Swan Coastal Plain Wetlands) Regulations 2004 as if the policy and the regulations formed a single instrument.

# 4. Terms used in this policy

(1) In this policy, unless the contrary intention appears —

- "Environmental Protection Plan No. 2" means a hard copy of the map entitled "Environmental Protection Policy Map SCPSEP03", being a hard copy kept in the Department and marked in red to show the boundary of the Swan coastal plain;
- "environmental quality criteria" means the criteria set out in clause 6;
- "owner", in relation to a wetland, means the owner of the land in which part or all of the wetland is located;
- "registered", in relation to a wetland, means registered in the Swan coastal plain wetlands register in accordance with Part 3;
- "regulations" means the Environmental Protection (Swan Coastal Plain Wetlands) Regulations 2004;
- "Swan coastal plain" means the area described in clause 5(1);
- "Swan coastal plain wetlands register" means the register established and maintained by the Authority under clause 11(1);

#### "wetland" means —

- (a) an area of seasonally, intermittently or permanently waterlogged or inundated land on the Swan coastal plain, whether natural or otherwise, and includes a lake, swamp, marsh, spring, dampland, tidal flat or estuary; or
- (b) part of such an area.
- (2) A term used in this policy that is given a meaning in the Act or the regulations has that meaning in this policy unless the contrary intention appears in this policy.

# 5. The Swan coastal plain

(1) The Swan coastal plain is the area that —

- is shown outlined in red on Environmental Protection Plan No. 2, a representation of which is shown in Schedule 1 of this policy; and
- is bounded by the boundary defined in Schedule 1 of the (b) regulations.
- If there is any discrepancy between the boundary of the Swan coastal plain as defined in the regulations and the boundary of the area shown outlined in red on Environmental Protection Plan No. 2, the definition in the regulations prevails.

#### **6.** The environmental quality criteria

For the purposes of this policy, a wetland meets the environmental quality criteria if —

- the wetland is recognised internationally, nationally or regionally as provided in regulation 5 of the regulations;
- the wetland has at least one of the significant natural (b) attributes referred to in regulation 6 of the regulations; or
- the wetland has at least 2 of the environmental values (c) listed in regulation 7 of the regulations.

#### 7. Public and local government access to plans and records

- (1) The Department must make the information recorded on the Swan coastal plain wetlands register and a copy of Environmental Protection Plan No. 2 available for inspection by members of the public during normal office hours at each of the Department's head office in Perth and each of its regional offices situated on the Swan coastal plain.
- (2) The Department must also provide the information recorded on the Swan coastal plain wetlands register and a copy of Environmental Protection Plan No. 2 to each local government whose district is wholly or partly within the Swan coastal plain.

# Part 2 — Registration of the wetlands that are to be protected

#### 8. Registration of wetlands that meet environmental quality criteria

The Authority may, on its own initiative, register a wetland that is within the Swan coastal plain if the wetland meets one or more of the environmental quality criteria.

#### 9. Registration of wetland at owner's request

- The Authority may register a wetland within the Swan coastal (1) plain on the application of the owner of the wetland.
- An application must be in writing and must include the (2) following
  - particulars of the name and address of the applicant; (a)
  - (b) evidence of the ownership of the wetland;
  - a map of the wetland of a sufficient scale to identify the (c) wetland clearly at an individual lot level;
  - an assessment, as far as practicable, of the extent to (d) which the wetland meets the environmental quality criteria:
  - any other relevant information that the Authority requires in the particular case.
- If 2 or more persons own the wetland, the application (3) must include
  - the name and address of each owner; and (a)
  - (b) written evidence that the application is made by, or with the agreement of, each owner.

# 10. Public consultation about registration of wetlands

Before the Authority registers a wetland under clause 8 or 9, or amends the registered particulars of a wetland that was registered under clause 8 or 9, or cancels the registration of a wetland that was registered under clause 8 or 9, the Authority must take reasonable steps to consult persons who could be materially affected by the registration, amendment or cancellation.



# Part 3 — The Swan coastal plain wetlands register

# 11. The Swan coastal plain wetlands register

- (1) The Authority must establish and maintain a register called the "Swan coastal plain wetlands register".
- (2) The register must be in the form of an electronic database.

# 12. Registration procedure

A wetland is registered by entering in the register —

- (a) the name (if any) and location of the wetland;
- (b) particulars of the boundary of the wetland area
  - (i) as shown on a 1:2000 scale map that includes the wetland; and
  - (ii) as defined by straight lines connecting the Map Grid of Australia coordinates (Geocentric Datum of Australia 1994) for zone 50;
- (c) particulars of the ownership of the wetland;
- (d) a summary of the grounds on which the wetland is registered;
- (e) a summary of any additional information known to the Authority about the condition of the wetland; and
- (f) any other information that the Authority thinks relevant.

### 13. Amendment of particulars of registration

- (1) The Authority may amend the registered particulars of a wetland in accordance with this clause
  - (a) to increase or decrease the registered area of the wetland;
  - (b) to reflect a change in the condition of the wetland; or
  - (c) to reflect a change in ownership of the wetland.

- (2) The Authority may, on its own initiative, amend the registered particulars of a wetland that was registered under clause 8.
- (3) The Authority may, on the application of the owner of a wetland that was registered under clause 9, amend the registered particulars of the wetland.
- (4) An application under subclause (3) must be in writing and must include the following particulars
  - (a) the name of the applicant;
  - (b) if the ownership of the wetland has changed since the wetland was registered — evidence of the ownership of the wetland;
  - (c) details of the proposed amendment and the reasons for it:
  - (d) any other relevant information that the Authority requires in the particular case.
- (5) If 2 or more persons own the wetland, the application must include
  - (a) the name and address of each owner; and
  - (b) written evidence that the application is made by, or with the agreement of, each owner.
- (6) The Authority must not amend the registered particulars of a wetland that was registered under clause 9 unless the application for the amendment is made or agreed to in writing by each owner of the wetland.

# 14. Cancellation of registration

- (1) The Authority may cancel the registration of a wetland that was registered under clause 8 if the wetland does not meet or no longer meets at least one of the 3 environmental quality criteria.
- (2) The Authority may cancel the registration of a wetland that was registered under clause 9 if an application for the cancellation is made or agreed to in writing by each owner of the wetland.

- (3) An application must be in writing and must include the following
  - (a) particulars of the name and address of the applicant;
  - (b) evidence of the ownership of the wetland;
  - (c) a map of the wetland of a sufficient scale to identify the wetland clearly at an individual lot level;
  - (d) an assessment, as far as practicable, of the extent to which the wetland currently meets the environmental quality criteria;
  - (e) any other information that is likely to be required by the Registrar of Titles for the purposes of Part 4;
  - (f) any other relevant information that the Authority requires in a particular case.



# Part 4 — Notices for purposes of land titles register

# 15. Notification of Registrar of Titles

- (1) When the Authority registers a wetland, amends the registered particulars of a wetland, or cancels the registration of a wetland, the Authority must give notice of the registration, amendment or cancellation to the Registrar of Titles.
- (2) A notice must be in a form approved by the Registrar of Titles under regulation 9 of the regulations.
- (3) A notice must include or be accompanied by the following
  - (a) particulars of the location of the wetland;
  - (b) for a notice of registration or amendment, where the wetland forms only part of the land on the relevant certificate of title a plan, in a form approved by the Registrar of Titles, showing the part of the land that constitutes the wetland;
  - (c) particulars of the ownership of the wetland;
  - (d) particulars of the date on which the wetland was registered under this policy, or on which particulars of the registration under this policy were amended, or the registration was cancelled under this policy, as the case requires; and
  - (e) any other information required by the Registrar in a particular case.

### 16. Notification of interested parties

When the Authority gives a notice to the Registrar of Titles under clause 15, the Authority must give a copy of the notice to each of the following persons or bodies —

- (a) each owner of the wetland referred to in the memorial or notice;
- (b) each mortgagee of the land in which the wetland is located;

- the Western Australian Planning Commission; (c)
- the local government of each local government district (d) in which any part of the wetland is located.




**Schedule 1** Swan coastal plain as shown on Environmental Protection Plan No. 2

# **Environmental Protection (Swan Coastal Plain Wetlands) Regulations 2004**

Made by the Governor in Executive Council.

#### 1. Citation

These regulations may be cited as the *Environmental Protection* (Swan Coastal Plain Wetlands) Regulations 2004.

# 2. Relationship with Swan Coastal Plain Wetlands Policy

These regulations are to be read with the *Environmental Protection (Swan Coastal Plains Wetlands) Policy 2004* as if the regulations and the policy formed a single document.

# 3. Terms used in these regulations

(1) In these regulations, unless the contrary intention appears —

### "land titles register" means —

- (a) in relation to land registered under the *Transfer of*Land Act 1893 the register kept for the purposes of that Act: or
- (b) in relation to land registered under the *Registration of Deeds Act 1856* the register kept for the purposes of that Act;

### "Registrar of Titles" means —

(a) in relation to land registered under the *Transfer of Land Act 1893* — the Registrar of Titles; or

- (b) in relation to land registered under the *Registration of Deeds Act 1856* the Registrar of Deeds and Transfers;
- "policy" means the Environmental Protection (Swan Coastal Plains Wetlands) Policy 2004;
- "registered wetland" means a wetland or part of a wetland that is registered in the Swan coastal plain wetlands register under Part 3 of the policy;
- "vehicle" has the same definition as it has in the *Road Traffic*Act 1974;
- "wetland" means a wetland in the Swan coastal plain.
- (2) If a term used in these regulations is defined in the policy, the term has that definition in these regulations unless the contrary intention appears in these regulations.

# 4. Boundary of the Swan coastal plain

For the purposes of these regulations and the policy, the boundary of the area of the Swan coastal plain is defined in Schedule 1.

### 5. International, national or regional recognition of wetlands

- (1) For the purposes of the policy, a wetland is recognised internationally if the wetland is an important feeding, breeding or resting site for birds listed under either or both of the following agreements
  - (a) the China-Australia Migratory Bird Agreement (CAMBA), being the Agreement between the Government of Australia and the Government of the People's Republic of China for the Protection of Migratory Birds and Their Environment 1986, Australian Treaty Series No. 22, Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade, AGPS, Canberra, 1988;
  - (b) the Japan-Australia Migratory Bird Agreement (JAMBA), being the *Agreement between the*

Government of Australia and the Government of Japan for the Protection of Migratory Birds in danger of extinction and Their Environment 1974, Australian Treaty Series No. 6, Department of Foreign Affairs, AGPS, Canberra, 1981.

- (2) For the purposes of the policy, a wetland is recognised internationally, nationally or regionally if it is recognised in one or more of the following publications
  - (a) A Directory of Important Wetlands in Australia, 2<sup>nd</sup> edition, Australian Nature Conservation Agency, Canberra, 1996;
  - (b) Conservation Reserves for Western Australia, Vols 1-6, Environmental Protection Authority, Perth, 1976;
  - (c) L. Pen, A Systematic Overview of Environmental Values of the Wetlands, Rivers and Estuaries of the Busselton-Walpole Region, Water Resource Allocation and Planning Series, report no. WRAP 7, Water and Rivers Commission, Perth, 1997;
  - (d) Le Provost, Semeniuk and Chalmer, *The Environmental Significance of Wetlands in the Perth to Bunbury Region, Western Australian Water Resources Council*, WRC 4/87, Perth. 1987;
  - (e) *Perth's Bush Forever*, Government of Western Australia, Perth, 2000;
  - (f) the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organisation Convention on Wetlands of International Importance Especially as Waterfowl Habitat 1971, Australian Treaty Series No. 48, Department of Foreign Affairs, AGPS, Canberra, 1975.

#### 6. Significant natural attributes of wetlands

For the purposes of the policy, a wetland has a significant natural attribute if —

- (a) it supports protected flora as defined in section 6(1) of the *Wildlife Conservation Act 1950*;
- (b) it supports fauna specified in a notice in operation under section 14(2)(ba) of the *Wildlife Conservation Act 1950* as fauna that is likely to become extinct, or is rare, or otherwise in need of special protection;
- (c) it supports vegetation in "good, very good, excellent or pristine condition" as described by B J Keighery in *Bushland Plant Survey. A Guide to Plant Community Survey for the Community*, Wildflower Society of WA (Inc), Nedlands, Western Australia, 1994;
- (d) it supports an ecological community listed as "threatened" in Category 1, 2, 3 or 4 as described by V J English and J Blyth in—
  - (i) "Identifying and Conserving Threatened Ecological Communities in the South West Botanical Province", (Project N702) published in Final Report to Environment Australia, Department of Conservation and Land Management, Como, Western Australia, 1997; or
  - (ii) "Development and application of procedures to identify and conserve threatened ecological communities in the South West Botanical Province of Western Australia", published in *Pacific Conservation Biology* No. 5, 1999, at pp. 124-38, Surrey, Beatty and Sons, New South Wales, 1999;
- (e) it is a wetland of a natural wetland type that is part of a natural wetland group of which fewer than 30% of wetlands of that type in that group are represented in the conservation estate on the Swan coastal plain, according to the wetland type and geomorphic classification system in Hill, AL, Semeniuk, CA, Semeniuk, V and Del Marco, A, Wetlands of the Swan coastal plain, Volume 1: Wetland Mapping, Classification and

Evaluation — Main Report and Volume 2: Wetland Mapping, Classification and Evaluation — Wetland Atlas, Water and Rivers Commission and Department of Environmental Protection, Perth, Western Australia, 1996;

- (f) it is a significant habitat or refuge for native or migratory fauna; or
- (g) it supports a concentration of a species of native or migratory fauna.

### 7. Other environmental values of wetlands

For the purposes of clause 6(c) of the policy, the following environmental values are listed —

- (a) the wetland is a significant site of pollen records, unusual sediments (as indicators of historical change), unusual geomorphology or hydrology for the scientific community;
- (b) the wetland is a public resource for water-based and land-based recreation;
- (c) the wetland is a significant archaeological or historical heritage site;
- (d) the wetland is an Aboriginal site as defined in section 4 of the *Aboriginal Heritage Act* 1972;
- (e) the wetland is a significant field study site for educational purposes.

#### 8. Definition of environmental harm

- (1) The alteration of a registered wetland by any of the following activities is a prescribed alteration of the environment for the purposes of paragraph (d) of the definition of "environmental harm" in section 3A(2) of the Act
  - (a) filling in the wetland with soil or any other material;
  - (b) dumping soil, waste or any other substance or thing in or on the wetland;

- (c) carrying out mining operations as defined in section 8(1) of the *Mining Act 1978*, or carrying out any other excavation, on or in the wetland;
- (d) discharging water into, or taking water from, the wetland to an extent that results in environmental harm to the wetland;
- (e) taking groundwater from beneath the wetland;
- (f) removing, killing or destroying native vegetation in the wetland;
- (g) severing or ringbarking the trunks or stems of native vegetation in the wetland;
- (h) burning native vegetation in the wetland, or in any other way clearing native vegetation from the wetland;
- (i) directly or indirectly disposing of or discharging waste material from industrial premises into the wetland;
- (j) having or using a vehicle or a boat with a motor in the wetland;
- (k) bringing any fauna into the wetland except
  - (i) fauna of a species indigenous to the wetland or its immediate surroundings;
  - (ii) fauna of a migratory species some of which migrate to or pass through the wetland or its immediate surroundings from time to time; or
  - (iii) flora of a species indigenous to the wetland or its immediate surroundings;
- (l) taking from the wetland
  - (i) fauna of a species indigenous to the wetland or its immediate surroundings; or
  - (ii) fauna of a migratory species some of which migrate to or pass through the wetland or its immediate surroundings from time to time.

- (2) However, an alteration of a registered wetland by an activity referred to in subregulation (1) is not a prescribed alteration as mentioned in that subsection
  - (a) if the activity is carried out in accordance with
    - (i) a proposal that has been or is being implemented in accordance with Part IV Division 2 of the Act following a referral to the Authority under section 38 of the Act; or
    - (ii) an assessed scheme that has been or is being implemented under Part IV Division 4 of the Act following a referral to the Authority under a scheme Act;

or

(b) the activity constitutes clearing that is done as mentioned in Schedule 6 of the Act clause 10, 11 or 12.

# 9. Registration of notices in land titles register

- (1) The Registrar of Titles may
  - (a) give approvals for the purposes of clause 15 of the policy; and
  - (b) require the Authority or the owner of a wetland to give to the Registrar any relevant information required for the purposes of registering a notice in the land titles register.
- (2) The Registrar of Titles, on receiving a notice under clause 15 of the policy in the approved form and any fee payable, must register the notice in the land titles register.
- (3) However, if the Registrar requires further information, the Registrar does not have to register a notice until the information is given.

# Schedule 1 — Boundary of the Swan coastal plain

[r. 4]

#### 1. Terms used in this Division

In this Division —

"coordinate" means a Map Grid of Australia coordinate (Geocentric Datum of Australia 1994) for zone 50;

**"Table"**, followed by a number, means the Table to this Division having that number.

### 2. Offshore islands and inland estuaries included

- (1) All islands off the coastline are taken to be within the boundary defined in clause 3.
- (2) All inland estuarine areas along the coastline are taken to be within the boundary defined in clause 3, except the Swan-Canning Estuary as specified in clause 3(4).

# 3. Boundary definition

(1) The Swan coastal plain boundary begins at a point near Dunsborough on the first coordinate specified in Table 1, then generally follows the Darling Scarp to a point on the Moore River by extending along straight lines connecting the coordinates specified in Table 1, from the first coordinate to the last coordinate.

The *Draft Environmental Protection (Swan Coastal Plain Wetlands) Policy 2004* is being released for public review and inspection for a 10 week period under section 26 of the *Environmental Protection Act 1986*.

Briefings will be held for key stakeholders. A revised draft EPP will be produced afterwards, for transmission to the Minister for the Environment, taking into account public comments (see the Statutory Process for an EPP, Figure 4).

To better protect and conserve the remaining wetlands of high ecological value on the Swan Coastal Plain, the Environmental Protection Authority (EPA) has developed a *Draft Environmental Protection (Swan Coastal Plain Wetlands) Policy 2004* (EPP) under section 26 of the *Environmental Protection Act 1986* (the Act). This decision follows the statutory review of the *Environmental Protection (Swan Coastal Plain Lakes) Policy 1992* in 1999 and the Government's endorsement of the 1997 State *Wetlands Conservation Policy for Western Australia.* 

# The aims of this **Explanatory Document** are to explain:


- the draft EPP for the Swan Coastal Plain Wetlands;
- administrative procedures for this Policy and how this Policy could be implemented; and,
- the development of the wetlands register.

On 22 October, 2003, the Minister for the Environment remitted the revised draft *Environmental Protection (Swan Coastal Plain Wetlands) Policy* to the EPA under section 31(c) of the Act. This was done because proposed amendments to the policy are sufficiently different from the revised draft EPP of December 1999 that it is necessary for the EPP process to recommence at the point of public consultation. The EPA has redrafted the EPP and is releasing it under section 26 of the Act, together with an explanatory document and draft wetlands register, for a 10 week public comment period.

The Policy and its proposed implementation plan are designed to protect the environmental values of the most important Swan Coastal Plain wetlands. The boundary of the policy area is shown in Figure 1. This explanatory document has been written to provide some details on the protection of these wetlands.

The issues involved with the conservation of wetlands on the Swan Coastal Plain are complex – on scientific, stakeholder and community levels. They involve many interested and affected groups, complex ecosystems, ongoing scientific evaluation, and changing community attitudes. To achieve the best outcome for the environment and all stakeholders, the EPA encourages debate and comment on this draft Wetlands EPP.

Copies of the documents referred to are available on the web site of the EPA, at www.epa.wa.gov.au, with printed copies available at the Department of Environment's (DOE) main offices in Perth, and in its regional offices on the Swan Coastal Plain. The draft wetlands register, which identifies landholdings that could be affected, can be viewed at the EPA's web site. If you do not have access to the Internet, the draft register can also be accessed at DOE main offices, the Swan Catchment Centre in Midland, and at most local government offices and/or their libraries. The EPA recognises that there may still be adjustments needed in the database of this draft register, and invites public input so that any potential inaccuracies can be considered and corrected by the EPA as appropriate.



#### The Background

Wetlands on the Swan Coastal Plain are coming under increasing pressure, mostly due to urban development and changes in rural land use. Since European settlement, it has been estimated that more than 80 per cent of the original wetlands on the Plain have been either lost or seriously degraded due to filling, clearing and other land use impacts (see Balla, 1996). The loss of wetlands is continuing, making it important to protect those wetlands that remain, especially those that are still in good condition. A recent decline in annual rainfall in the southwest has put further pressure on these wetlands.

The Wetlands Conservation Policy for Western Australia was released in 1997 and recognises the importance of conservation and wise management practices to retain and, at times, restore the environmental condition of the State's wetlands. Through this Policy, the State Government is committed to identifying, maintaining and managing wetlands for the long term benefit of the people of Western Australia. Its principal objective is:

To prevent the further loss or degradation of valuable wetlands and wetland types and promote wetland conservation, creation and restoration.

Under this objective is an action item to:

Provide for a statutory environmental protection framework under the Environmental Protection Act 1986 for the conservation of important wetlands on private and public lands throughout Western Australia, and assist the EPA in the development and review of statutory environmental protection policies.

#### and to

Promote, implement and monitor the effectiveness of wetland environmental protection policies and associated regulations.

The purpose of the draft Wetlands EPP in this regard, as set out in clause 2 of that EPP, is to protect wetlands by:

- protecting the environmental values of certain wetlands on the Swan Coastal Plain as an intrinsic part of the natural hydrology and the surface and groundwater system; and.
- preventing and controlling the pollution of and environmental harm to those wetlands.

There is often concern expressed over the definition of a wetland, especially that the definition is too broad. Such concerns are acknowledged by the EPA. However, the following definition, based on the definition in the Act, is endorsed by the EPA:

An area of seasonally, intermittently or permanently waterlogged or inundated land on the Swan Coastal Plain, whether natural or otherwise, and includes a lake, swamp, marsh, spring, dampland, tidal flat or estuary.

Methodologies for identifying management objectives for wetlands on the Swan Coastal Plain were first published through EPA Bulletin 374 in 1990, which were then updated in Bulletin 686 in 1993. The methodologies in these Bulletins focused on wetlands with open water bodies, such as lakes. In 1996, the Water and Rivers Commission, in conjunction with the Department of Environmental Protection, published the first comprehensive mapping of wetlands on the Plain (Balla, 1996). Wetlands were mapped, classified according to wetland type and evaluated into one of three management categories, namely *Conservation, Resource Enhancement* or *Multiple Use* (Hill *et al.*, Volume 2b: in Balla, 1996). Recent work undertaken by the DOE has updated this database. Note that the majority of wetlands on the Plain are evaluated as Multiple Use (80%), 5% as Resource Enhancement and 15% as Conservation, with this last group also known as Conservation Category Wetlands (see Appendix 1).

Prior to the development of the draft Wetlands EPP, *Bush Forever* has helped to protect some, but not all, of the Conservation Category Wetlands in the Perth metropolitan area. However, because Bush Forever addresses remnant vegetation and not specifically wetlands, many Conservation Category Wetlands have been left unprotected in both the metropolitan area and beyond it on the coastal plain. The Conservation Category Wetlands that are proposed to be registered constitute a small proportion of the total land area on the Swan Coastal Plain.


The EPA is proposing that all wetlands of high ecological value on the Swan Coastal Plain, including those that occur along watercourses (but not the watercourses themselves), be placed on a register of wetlands and protected through an EPP. This covers wetlands that occur on both private and Crown lands. Also, under proposed amendment procedures for that register, a private landowner could nominate a wetland (of any type) that he or she owns to be added to the register.

The proposed regulations for the draft Wetlands EPP defines a *registered wetland* as one that has been placed on the register. Initial areas considered by the EPA to be placed on this register were:

- 1. the Swan Coastal Plains Lakes, already protected under the 1992 EPP; and,
- 2. all Conservation Category Wetlands on the Swan Coastal Plain, but not watercourses *per se*, identified by the Department of Environment as at 6 February 2004.

The total area and number of wetlands for the proposed register is shown in Figure 2. The datasets for the 1992 Lakes EPP and Conservation Category Wetlands were first amalgamated and were then edited to improve their accuracy. The resultant area for the draft register is approximately 46,000 ha. Of this total, about half of the wetland area is in private land, and half in Crown land. There is also a proportion of this land that is already under some form of protection.

And so, the final figure for the draft register does not equal the number that would be arrived at by simply adding these two datasets. However, the figure constitutes a small but environmentally significant proportion of the Swan Coastal Plain. Despite the editing that has already been done, the EPA is aware that there still could be inaccuracies in the draft register and encourages any potential errors to be forwarded as part of public submissions on the draft EPP.

Wetlands which possess high ecological value will have statutory protection through the EPP, unless otherwise authorised, via the *environmental harm* and *unauthorised land clearing* provisions<sup>2</sup> contained in amendments to the *Environmental Protection Act 1986*. Environmental harm means an "alteration of the environment to the detriment or degradation of the environment or any environmental value". Provisions on land clearing relate to protecting native vegetation against unauthorised removal, destruction, or damage. Any proposal to remove native vegetation would be assessed against various environmental principles, such as "vegetation should not be cleared if it is growing in, or in association with, an environment associated with a watercourse or wetland". Proposed regulations under the Act for unauthorised land clearing will clarify these provisions.

In summary, the proposed changes to the 1999 revised draft Wetlands EPP aim to achieve the protection of Conservation Category Wetlands by changing the new draft Wetlands EPP to include the immediate registration of Conservation Category Wetlands, as well as retaining the Swan Coastal Plain Lakes (from the 1992 Lakes EPP).

# The draft Environmental Protection (Swan Coastal Plains Wetlands) Policy 2004

The EPP process to date:

- The Environmental Protection (Swan Coastal Plain Lakes) Policy 1992 (the Lakes EPP) was gazetted in 1992;
- The Environmental Protection (Swan Coastal Plain Lakes) Policy 1992 (the Lakes EPP) was reviewed in 1999 by the EPA;
- The Review of the policy and a (new) Draft Environmental Protection (Swan Coastal Plain Wetlands) Policy 1999 was released for public comment by the EPA in November 1999;
- Following public comment, the EPA produced the Revised Draft Environmental Protection (Swan Coastal Plain Wetlands) Policy 1999 for transmittal to the Minister for the Environment;
- The Minister released the revised draft and the EPA later released the
   Environmental Protection (Swan Coastal Plain Wetlands) Policy 2000 –
   Administrative Procedures. These documents were available for public comment
   for 3 months until December 2000;
- Proposed changes to the Revised Draft Environmental Protection (Swan Coastal Plain Wetlands) Policy 2003 were considered to be such that the policy should be remitted by the Minister to the EPA for further public consultation. The Minister subsequently remitted the policy to the EPA on 22 October 2003; and,
- The (new) *Draft Environmental Protection (Swan Coastal Plain Wetlands) Policy 2004* is released for public comment by the EPA in July 2004.

#### **Major Components of the Draft EPP**

#### 1. The Wetlands Register

The draft Wetlands EPP requires (in clause 11) for the EPA to establish and maintain the wetlands register following the gazettal of the EPP. The register would have within it all registered wetlands on the Swan Coastal Plain, which (shortly after gazettal) would consist of:

- 1. the Swan Coastal Plains Lakes, protected under the 1992 EPP; and,
- 2. all Conservation Category Wetlands on the Swan Coastal Plain (but not part of watercourses *per se*), identified by the DOE as at 6 February 2004.

Wetlands that are nominated by landowners, whether for private or Crown land (and subsequently approved by the EPA), would also be added to the register. The register thus shows the specific areas where the EPP's provisions would apply. The Lakes EPP 1992 would be revoked when the draft Wetlands EPP is gazetted.

The draft register is available on the EPA web site to assist landowners, stakeholders and other members of the public in seeing which areas are proposed for protection under the EPP. For legal clarity, polygons (with corresponding grid references) have been drawn around each wetland.

#### 2. Amendments to the Register

An amendment process has been included in the draft Wetlands EPP to facilitate corrections to the register. Amendments are considered by the EPA when an error in the database has been identified and then verified by the DOE. The proposed process is detailed in the EPP and outlined in Figure 3.

In this process, potential amendments would be verified against the environmental quality criteria, which are listed in clause 6 of the EPP and detailed in the proposed regulations for this EPP (in clauses 5 through 7). These criteria are derived from those listed in the 1999 revised draft Wetlands EPP.

The wetland mapping database has been kept as up—to—date as possible. However, it is recognised that the maintenance of such a large database has inherent difficulties, and that a proportion of the mapping may be out of date. For example, recent land development approvals may not have been entered into the database since the date of aerial photographs (most of these are from early 2003). The EPA would welcome advice regarding potential inaccuracies so that these can be considered.

Prior to the EPP being gazetted, corrections may be made to the database, where warranted, in a formal process overseen by the EPA. This process will involve the re-evaluation and verification of wetlands in question against the environmental quality criteria, and will be administered by the DOE. Public input that identifies errors in the data base will be used to assist in correcting it.

#### 3. Private Landowner Involvement in Wetland Registrations

After the wetlands register is established, additional wetlands may be added to the register. Any new wetlands would need to meet the environmental quality criteria. Landowners, as well as others who could be materially affected by the registration, would have to be consulted by the EPA.

Through the amendment process (Figure 3), detailed in clause 13 of the draft EPP, landowners can request the EPA to review either the removal of wetlands from the register or to amend the boundaries of a registered wetland. This review will only be undertaken if it can be demonstrated to the EPA that the wetland(s) or portions

#### 4. Voluntary Changes to the Register

Clause 9 in the draft EPP details the process for landowner(s) to voluntarily submit new wetlands to be added to the register through an assessment process overseen by the EPA (Figure 3).

#### The Program for Protecting Wetlands

#### 1. Prohibited Activities

The primary threat to the conservation of wetlands is further loss through: filling in, excavation or mining, discharge or disposal of effluent, the construction or alteration of drainage systems or unauthorized clearing. These activities were prohibited in the 1999 revised draft EPP. Offences are listed in clause 8 of the proposed regulations for the 2004 draft EPP, with penalties derived from those listed for environmental harm in the Act (note that penalties for environmental harm are to be proclaimed once regulations for unauthorised land clearing have been finalised).

It is not the intention of the draft EPP to invoke environmental harm for ongoing land use practices in registered wetlands, such as grazing by livestock. However, the EPA would expect to see an improvement in the management of these wetlands over time through such activities as improved fencing.

#### 2. The Role of Public Authorities

Relevant public authorities, both State and local government, must make decisions and take actions that are consistent with the protection of registered wetlands. Public authorities need to manage their own Acts so that activities are controlled that could have a negative impact on these registered wetlands (see also the Implementation Plan, below).

#### 3. Schedules

The draft Wetlands EPP includes a *Schedule* which shows the boundaries of the EPP area (Schedule 1 of the proposed regulations). The Policy Area shown in Schedule 1 is the same area that was shown in the 1999 revised draft EPP and in Figure 1 of this Explanatory Document.

#### 4. Mandatory Review of the EPP

Under statutory provisions in the Act, after the EPP is gazetted, it will be reviewed by the EPA every seven years. This review will give due consideration to changes over that period, especially in the wetland register, the environment on the Swan Coastal Plain, scientific understanding and stakeholder feedback. The review is published by the EPA as part of a statutory process under section 36 of the Act, together with a revised draft EPP, which is transmitted to the Minister.

#### Implementing the EPP

#### 1. Approval processes of Government Agencies

The roles of government agencies in the conservation of wetlands are spelt out in the *Wetlands Conservation Policy for Western Australia* (1997). The present Government has endorsed this *Wetlands Conservation Policy*, but the names (and in some cases the activities) of principal agencies involved in wetlands conservation have changed over the past 7 years. The principal agency charged with implementing the wetlands EPP is the DOE. The use of the draft register in the EPA's environmental assessment process is detailed below.

#### 2. Incentives Available to Private Landowners

A guide to Biodiversity Incentives has been prepared by the Government (Government of WA, 2004), as part of the Swan Coastal Plain Wetland Conservation Program, under the direction of the Minister for the Environment. This guide will assist landowners in protecting and managing wetlands and other biodiversity on the Swan Coastal Plain. Direct assistance to landowners is detailed through listings of current programs that are available via Government and other organizations. It will also be periodically updated.

#### 3. Use of the Wetlands Register in the Environmental Assessment Process

The EPA currently assesses any development proposal that has the potential to impact a wetland (that is categorised as a Conservation Category Wetland) or a lake protected under the existing 1992 Lakes EPP. A checklist is available from the EPA to guide proponents on whether their proposal requires such a referral. Under the referral process, the potential impacts of a proposed development are assessed to determine the appropriate outcome for both wetland protection and development.

Recent referrals have been assisted, in part, through the EPA's Guidance Statement No. 10 on natural areas in the System 6 region. This document outlines how proposals that would result in the direct loss of wetlands, or have significant impacts on key conservation values, will likely undergo a formal environmental assessment at the Project Unlikely to be Environmentally Acceptable level, unless proposals can be redesigned to avoid direct losses or significant impacts with regard to wetlands.

Once the wetlands EPP is gazetted, any future proposal likely to impact on a protected wetland will be subject to approval by the EPA. The protected wetlands will be those that are listed on the wetlands register. There is a presumption against actions that would cause environmental harm to these wetlands.

And so, as part of the EPA's advice on appropriate land use near wetlands, developments should be planned and management undertaken to protect wetland values, as identified in the EPP. This may include having an appropriate buffer for that wetland, which can vary on a case by case basis due to the conditions of local hydrology and native vegetation.

#### 4. Moving from a draft Register to a Register

The maps shown on the draft register are based on sets of maps that depict the 1992 Lakes EPP and the Conservation Category Wetlands . The Lakes EPP dataset has been reviewed to correct spatial inaccuracies and to combine these lakes with Conservation Category Wetlands where appropriate. The legal boundaries are determined from a set of map coordinates, so that these can be checked on the ground by surveyors, if necessary.

The EPA recognises that there still will be inaccuracies in the database (for the draft register), including for a small number of properties where there has been a degree of rural land development. Wetlands have been identified through reference to geomorphic categories (i.e. with particular reference to their landforms and soils). And so, in a superficial assessment, areas may not seem to be 'wetland' *per se* because of the dry conditions which have persisted over the past 25 years in southwestern WA. Nevertheless, these areas would normally still support wetland ecosystems, given average climatic conditions.

Once the EPP is gazetted, the draft register (as adjusted following the EPA's consideration of public submissions through the consultation process) will be approved as the Register by the EPA. Once this has been done, any further adjustment of wetland boundaries, deletions of wetlands or additions to the register will be administered by the EPA through the formal amendment process, as set out in the EPP. The EPA will also make the Register publicly available.






# **Location Map**

# **History of the Wetlands EPP**

In 1999 a statutory review of the Environmental Protection (Swan Coastal Plain Lakes) Policy 1992 was required under Part III of the Environmental Protection Act 1986. As part of this statutory process a Draft Environmental Protection (Swan Coastal Plain Wetlands) Policy 1999 was released for public comment.
