At my request Paul Brennan has collated and compiled an extensive summary of data pertaining to Swan Region. A copy is attached for perusal and comment.


The aim of the document is to provide an accurate and convenient source of information about resources and activities in the Region. The data could be used to prepare papers or presentations in referring to specific or more general facts.

### DEPARTMENT OF CONSERVATION AND LAND MANAGEMENT SWAN REGION

(Note: Areas for main tenure groups as 1992/93 Annual Report  
Refer Appendix 2 for comparison current and proposed)

CALM's Swan Region extends from the Moore River south along the eastern boundaries of Northam and Wandering Shires and west through Lane Poole Reserve and Peel Inlet. The western boundary follows the ocean and includes Garden, Carnac and Shoalwater Islands and Shoalwater and Marmion Marine Parks. Eastwards the boundary extends inland to take in the towns of Northam, York and Boddington.

The values and management of Swan Region are strongly influenced by Metropolitan Perth and large towns such as Pinjarra and Mandurah. Its boundaries include 2,154,179 ha of land (and sea) of which 694,943.7 ha (32%) is managed by CALM. Excluding the metro area, the region includes 21 local authorities, either in whole or in part, indicating the variety of interests in the land and waters. (Appendix 1)

The Region's management responsibilities include protection and nature conservation, community education, providing for public recreation, and sustainable production of timber and other natural resources, such as wildflowers and honey. Its lands vary considerably in purpose from nature reserves and national parks with a focus on conservation and recreation to State Forest where multiple uses include catchment protection, recreation, nature conservation, timber production and mining.

**State Forests** constitute the bulk of CALM managed lands ~~as proposed~~ (509,504 ha, or Appendix 2). Timber Reserves amount to 20,454.1ha. The guiding principle is "sustainable management of all values". Major uses and activities include:

- Water catchment for Perth and some country areas.

Approximately 90% of the region is within gazetted water catchment areas.

- Mining. Approximately 15 million tonnes of bauxite are mined from about 400 ha annually in state forest at Jarrahdale, and Huntly as part of Alcoa's mining operations. To the end of 1992, 4674 ha of rehabilitation was established at Jarrahdale and Dwellingup (Huntly and Del Park minesites) as follows:

The Region's lands support the largest bauxite mining operation in the state with important economic implications.

The gold mines at Boddington are operated as open cut, with an area cleared of approximately 237 ha (combined area Alcoa and Worsley). Removal of approximately 3 million tonnes of ore commenced in 1987. At this time the ore reserves were estimated to be capable of sustaining this level for about 15 years.

All mined lands must be rehabilitated with native species to the satisfaction of CALM.

- In the 1991/92 year, approximately 4100 ha of the jarrah forest was cutover, producing about 63,500m<sup>3</sup> of first grade and 30,200m<sup>3</sup> of second grade sawlogs (Appendix 3), to supply 13 major sawmills. CALM staff supervise 7 major contractors who supply this sawlog material to the mills and powerpoles to the SEC (Appendix 4). State Forests also cater to a heavy demand for domestic firewood (8,400t in 91/92) and products such as honey, fencing timbers, and wildflowers. There are numerous commercial firewood operators.
- Pine plantations cover 26,186 ha, being mainly *P. pinaster* on the coastal plain at Wanneroo and Yanchep (Appendix 5). In 1991/92 a single contractor (App.4) harvesting these plantations supplied almost 110,000m<sup>3</sup> of roundwood to 5 metropolitan mills from an area of 1841 ha (Appendix 6). There is potential for further increases in supply to the reconstituted board-and-chip industry. *cut out*
- Hardwood plantations, established under sharefarming arrangements, consist predominantly of *E. globulus* (Bluegums). To the end of 1992, approximately 1005 ha have been established, but there is potential for around 80,000 ha to be established in the region, mainly on the Swan Coastal Plain in the Peel-Harvey catchment (Appendix 7).
- Natural and planted forests are a valuable recreation resource with many popular picnic spots and walks, which are heavily used on fine weekends; eg Mount Dale, Gooralong, Blue Rock and Lane Poole, to name a few.

National Parks cover 34,141.2 ha in the Region and protect very significant conservation and recreation assets (Appendix 8). Several new National Parks and extension to existing parks are proposed.

The similar category, **Conservation Parks**, cover some 41,681.7 ha (Appendix 9) (5g reserves - 11,874 ha).

- Yanchep National Park has the heaviest visitation in the state with important historic links as well as prime recreation facilities.
- Other parks such as John Forrest, Walyunga, Avon Valley and Serpentine are popular and subject to considerable visitor pressure. It is important to strike the right balance between public use and conservation and CALM aims to achieve this balance primarily through its management plans.

**Nature Reserves** currently 50,315.2 ha (Appendix 10) although the System 6 "red book" plan for the Region proposes additional increases in land set aside for conservation purpose. These lands are set aside for management of flora and fauna values.

(Note: Other small reserves - buildings, seed orchards, etc. - Appendix 11)

**Marine Parks** currently 16,350 ha at Marmion, Shoalwater and Swan Estuary.

### **Protection**

The Region has the overall responsibility of protecting its land from damage. Considerable effort has been directed in fire control and reducing the spread of dieback disease, with an increasing commitment to minimising conflicts associated with potentially damaging recreation activities on the conservation estate. In recent years, more funding has been allocated to redevelop recreation facilities to provide for increased usage by the public.

The Region's staff of 235 (Appendix 12) are trained in fire control and supported by fire detection aircraft at Mundaring and Dwellingup, a fleet of water tankers; communications and heavy equipment for fire suppression. The important technique for minimising large severe fires has been strategic prescribed burning - (over approximately 57,600 ha in 1991/92 H/wood 45,200, S/wood 2897, 9476 NP and NR) - to reduce the heavy litter fuel build-up which is the necessary prerequisite for such fires to develop. The average total area burnt under prescribed conditions per annum for the period 1985-6 to 1991-2 was 56,530 ha (Appendix 13).

Wildfires over the period 1987-88 to 1992-93 burnt out an area of approximately 7550 ha per annum, during the summer months (Appendix 14). (Range 1989/90: 1966 ha; 1988/89: 16180 ha). These fires are very costly to suppress and put many lives and property at risk.

The Department's dieback policies were last reviewed in 1992 and are applied by the districts to all operations in susceptible vegetation types from the forested hills to the woodlands and heaths of the coastal plain. Criteria for risk and impact on the vegetation are assessed, and the

necessary dieback hygiene requirements are identified for all activities such as mining, harvesting, roading and recreation sites (through the 7-Way Test).

There are also programs for control of weeds and feral animals which could be justifiably increased with a larger budget.

## ADMINISTRATION

The operations of the Region are conducted from four district offices at Wanneroo, Mundaring, Jarrahdale and Dwellingup with a regional headquarters at Kelmscott.

The Perth District (based at Wanneroo) is the most northerly District and its principal responsibilities are the management of a large pine plantation, Yanchep National Park, several smaller Parks and several large Nature Reserves and requirements for protecting the Gnangara and Jandakot underground water supply areas and wetlands of the Swan Coastal Plain. Eight Regional Parks are proposed within Perth District.

Mundaring District extends from the Julimar (Wandoor) Conservation Park in the north to the Brookton Highway. Management is complicated by the interface between urban development and natural lands in the Darling Scarp (proposed Regional Park). Priorities include recreation in "The Hills Forest", protection of water catchments and a number of important national parks (including John Forrest and Walyunga) and numerous nature reserves.

Jarrahdale District extends from Brookton Highway to a boundary south of Serpentine Dam. Protection of water catchment, recreation (Langford Park and Gooralong), supervision of bauxite mining and timber production (especially firewood) are the primary activities. Urban development along the scarp is becoming an increasingly important issue there. On the Swan Coastal Plain there are several important Nature Reserves and proposed Regional Parks. Major developments are occurring at Shoalwater Islands including upgraded facilities at Penguin Island and a major interpretive display at Mersey Point.

Dwellingup District is the most southerly. Likewise it has important commitments to bauxite mining and timber production, with management of recreation at Lane Poole reserve along the Murray River an important additional responsibility. Dwellingup District also includes Nature Reserves at Peel Harvey estuary.

Swan Region Marine Operations are based at Marmion Marine Park, Hillarys. A staff of four patrol this Marine Park, Shoalwater and Swan Estuary Marine Parks and other State waters within Swan Region. Some recreation and interpretive projects have been developed and extensive liaison is conducted with Fisheries Department, Marine and Harbours Department and other agencies to regulate activities with the marine parks. Marine parks account for 16,350 ha.
