EcoEducation Opportunities 2005

1. Back from the Brink

Recommended for Years 8 and 9

Provides: An excursion as part of our threatened species program supported by PD days and

resources for the classroom. The focus is on the Western Shield recovery program. Students gain hands-on experience in trapping techniques and research methods.

The day includes encounters with unique native fauna.

Cost: \$6.60 per student (this includes free resources for use in the classroom).

2. Geography/Biology

Recommended for Years 11 and 12

Provides: Can include the history and importance of the jarrah forest, forest management issues,

interrelationships between climate, adaptions of flora and fauna, animal encounter

session and human impact on the forest.

Cost: Geography – long transect or navigational observation

\$8.80 (Monday to Friday)

Biology - short transect, or quadrat, and animal encounter

\$11 (Thursday and Friday only)

3. Aboriginal Culture Excursions

Recommended for Years 8 to 10

Provides: Forest walk, exploring traditional use of plants and animals, artefact making, ceremony

and communication, all with an emphasis on student participation. Led by trained

Aboriginal Education Officers.

Cost: \$8.80 per student

4. Forest ecology walks and activities

Provides: Walks and activities to suit your needs (eg. focusing on forest management issues,

human impact, plants, birds of prey, spiders, reptiles, invertebrates etc).

Cost: Varies according to your needs.

5. School camps

Provides: Camping at The Hills Forest, Patens Brook campsite or Youth Hostel

Cost: \$4.40 per student, \$8.80 per adult per night, or \$110 main campground - up to 35

people, or \$165 includes overflow area - up to 65 people (The Hills Forest)

\$5 per person per night (Patens Brook campsite)

\$13 per student per night, \$19 per adult per night (Youth Hostel)

6. PD camp - Be a Nature Conservation Officer for a Night

Cost: \$55 inc accommodation, meals and resources (\$44 for STAWA members)

When: 5pm Friday 20 May to 12.30pm Saturday 21 May

NB: All prices include 10 per cent GST which can be reclaimed from all curriculum-based activities.

Minimum of 25 students per group. Group sizes are limited to the Department of Education and Training's recommended class sizes.
