What's it all about?

This PD will provide secondary school teachers of Geography, Society & Environment and Science with a wealth of information, guidance and ideas for activities at school or at Star Swamp to enable you to use this woodland for your own excursion activities.

For primary school teachers the PD will provide you with the pre and post visit activities to prepare your students for an excursion led by CALM's EcoEducation Officers. You will also develop your own knowledge and understanding of tuart woodlands and the biodiversity they contain.

- encourages collaborative group work;
- focuses on inquiry as a process of learning;
- explores a variety of learning techniques; and
- provides opportunities for students to reflect on their learning.

Threatened animals and ecosystems excursion

The excursion is part of the *Western Shield* Schools Program which includes professional development, resources, excursions and camps.

This PD is just one of a series being held at the Henderson Environmental Centre as part of the joint initiative between CALM and Stirling City Council; a partnership which aims to encourage the interest and involvement of young people in the conservation of Star Swamp, its animals and plants.

Western Shield is the biggest wildlife conservation program ever undertaken in Australia. It aims to bring native wildlife back from the brink of extinction by controlling introduced predators, the fox and the feral cat.

Star Swamp is an island of serenity and peace, a small wetland forest valued for bush walking and nature study. It includes a tuart woodland, remnants of a much larger area of tuart now in decline. The Henderson Environmental Centre adjacent to Star Swamp is a well-equipped interpretive centre. It is an ideal venue for school group activities and a starting point for woodland walks and exploration.
