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# **National Park Passes**

# Your ticket to nature

There is no better way to discover the beauty and diversity of Western Australia than to explore the state's national parks. If you are planning to visit a national park, you will need a national park pass. Not only will a park pass save you time and money, but you will be making a valuable contribution to the management of these special areas.

### Which pass do I need?

Visitor fees apply at major national parks in Western Australia. The following passes are required where visitor fees apply.

DAY PASS Provides entry to one or more national parks for a day visit

\$8 per vehicle (up to 8 properly seated people)

\$3 per bus passenger — motor cycle

HOLIDAY PASS\* Entitles unlimited entry to any national park for up to four weeks. Ideal for people on holiday.

\$20 per vehicle (up to 8 properly seated people)

ANNUAL LOCAL PARK PASS Provides unlimited entry to one national park (or group of local parks) for 12 months.

\$15 per vehicle (up to 8 properly seated people)

ALL PARKS ANNUAL PASS\* Allows unlimited entry to any

national park in Western Australia for 12 months.

\$45 per vehicle (up to 8 properly seated people)

GOLD STAR PASS\* Combines an All Parks Annual Pass with an annual subscription to LANDSCOPE, CALM's conservation, forests and wildlife magazine.

564 per vehicle (up to 8 properly seated people)

Park passes are not valid for the Valley of the Giants Tree Top Walk,
Penguin Island or special events (e.g. Avon Descent). Separate fees apply.
Separate fees apply for camping.

### Concessions

\*Only these passes are valid for Monkey Mia Reserve

Seniors' card and aged pension card holders are entitled to a \$3 day pass. Disabled, education and study groups may not be required to pay fees. Requests for free entry can be made in writing to the Park Pass Coordinator, Department of CALM, Locked Bag 104, Bentley Delivery Centre WA 6983.

#### Mid-West

Cape Range, Millstream-Chichester, Karijini

#### **Kimberley**

Purnululu (Bungle Bungle), Mirima

#### South-West

Leeuwin Naturaliste, Gloucester, Warren, Beedelup and Shannon/ D'Entrecasteaux

#### South Coast

Porongurup, Stirling Range, Fitzgerald River, Cape Le Grand, Cape Arid and Stokes

Visitor fees do not apply at other national parks in Western Australia.

## Where are passes available?

Day passes are available at entry points in national parks and from Rangers within parks.

All other passes are available at major park entry points, CALM offices, and selected tourist centres and retail stores. For details of your nearest park pass outlet ph: (08) 9334 0481.

Western Australia is a large state and it is not possible to staff all national park entry points. Please follow the instructions to pay your fees at parks that are not staffed.

# How are funds from park passes used?

All funds collected are invested in the maintenance and improvement of park facilities and services and the protection of park values.
