Dear Teacher

Western Shield is the name of a program by the Department of Conservation and Land Management to conserve our native wildlife from the ravages of introduced predators such as European foxes and feral acts. The tragedy is that these two animals have been major contributors to the extinction of 10 native mammal species in WA alone. A further 31 mammals are on the brink.

It also is a sad fact that most people in WA are more aware of African or American wildlife than our own. Yet, Western Australia's native wildlife is not only among the most biologically diverse on Earth, many of our species are found nowhere else.

This Western Shield Action Pack has been produced because of our belief that conservation efforts can be greatly enhanced if people understand the nature of our wildlife, including the partnerships - or synergies - our flora and fauna have developed.

This Action Pack aims to raise awareness and understanding of our threatened animal species and to familiarise students with other conservation initiatives to prevent further extinctions.

It has been designed for upper primary teachers and students but can be adapted for other year levels.

The pack covers four or more lessons in the classroom and includes suggestions for extension activities.

The pack links with the primary school curriculum subjects, Society and Environment, Science, Mathematics and Language and supports the aims of the Student Outcome Statements. 'First Steps' and Stepping Out' concepts also have been used within a framework of an integrated curriculum approach that encourages collaborative group work of your students.
