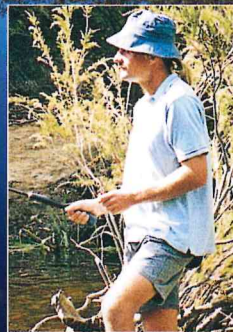
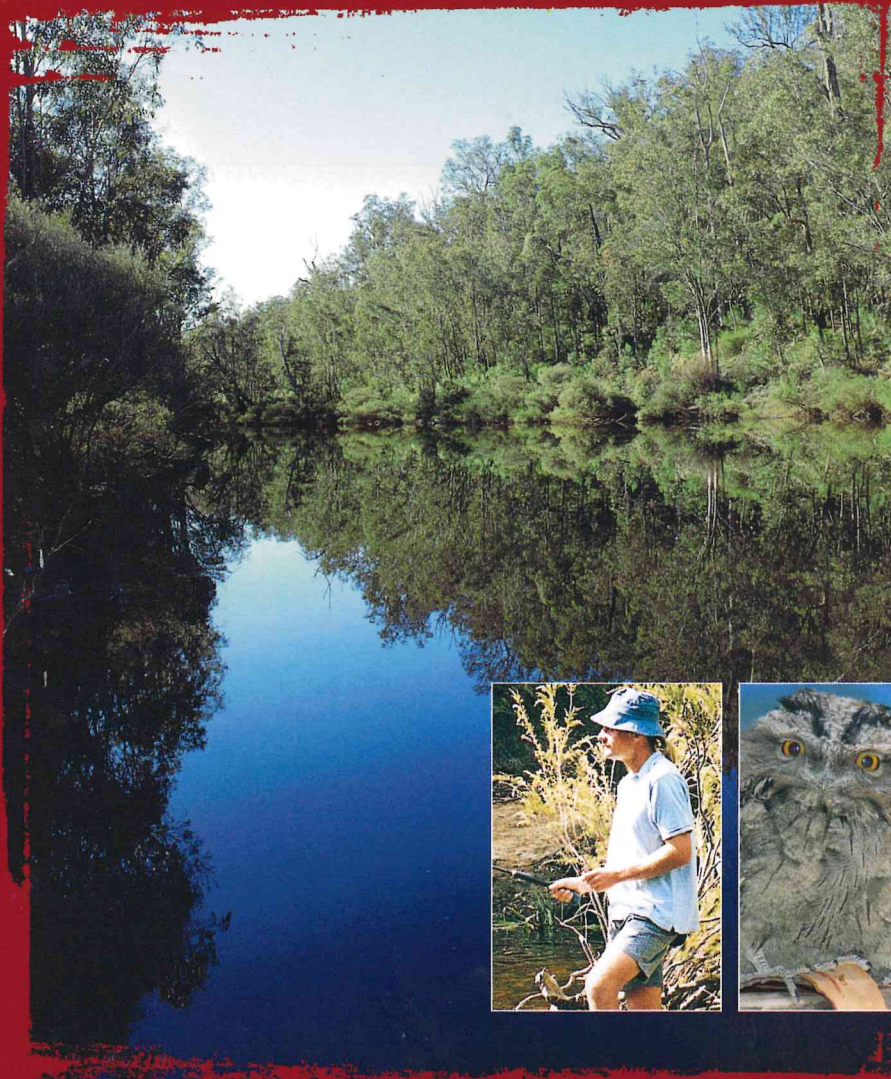

To ensure that you and future generations of Perth residents can enjoy these benefits, the Department of Conservation and Land Management is taking measures to protect Lane Poole's environment and relaxed atmosphere.



The Department's friendly national park rangers are on site at all times and are there to help visitors get the most out of their forest experience. Say G'day to a ranger during your visit at Lane Poole and ask about the best places to camp, swim, walk or bird watch.

The Department has produced excellent brochures that explain the wide variety of ways to enjoy Lane Poole. You will even get to find out who Lane Poole was!

From December 2003 there will be:

- a complete alcohol ban on long weekends to contribute to the safety of visitors and reduce the number of disturbances;
- a requirement to keep dogs on a leash to avoid disturbing other visitors and protected native animals;
- spot fines or eviction for disorderly behaviour because Lane Poole Reserve offers visitors a quiet and peaceful forest experience, particularly in the evening and nights (there are more suitable and safer places if you want to be rowdy); and
- spot fines or eviction if you damage or destroy native flora or fauna, which are legally protected.

Visitors who come to relax and enjoy what the forest has to offer will benefit from these actions.
