



The idea

Golden Valley Tree Park is designed to be Western Australia's first major arboretum, with a collection of beautiful and interesting trees from all over the world, grown in a landscaped setting.

The aim of the park is to create an inspirational place for all who enjoy the beauty of nature.

In addition, the park is useful for scientists to be able to record local growth performances of different tree species, for botanists to use as a live seed bank and for educationalists to show children a small part of earth's heritage of trees.

The Project

Golden Valley Tree park is a cooperative project between the Department of Conservation and Land Management (CALM) and the Balingup Progress Association, on land held by CALM. The site, one-and-half kilometres south of Balingup, is on two former farming properties.

The 60-hectare park is divided into two sections. The area to the west of Padbury Road (see diagram on back panel) features the Australian collection. On the hilltop above this section a lookout offers fine views of the Park and of the Balingup district.



The exotic tree collection is located to the east of Padbury road. This site was first landscaped by the original settlers and features many mature specimen trees. Here, beautiful or interesting trees from all over the world are growing. Emphasis has been given to deciduous trees which turn spectacular colours in autumn because the frosty Balingup climate particularly favours such a display.



Walk trails throughout the Park help the visitor to make the most of his or her vist. There is a picnic spot and information gazebo centrally placed in the exotic section

Become involved - sponsor a tree

If you would like to support the Tree Park, you can sponsor your own tree - or a tree for someone dear to you.

Rare trees are difficult to obtain and many of our trees are imported from the eastern states or overseas. Each tree is then established, given correct botanical labelling and must be fenced until it has grown, as protection from the sheep kept to eat down the grass in the Park.

This process takes time and money - even though most of the labour is voluntary. We estimate that special tree establishment costs about \$30 per specimen.
