

Experience the Bush on a Bicycle

The Munda Biddi Trail (which means path through the forest in the Nyoongar Aboriginal language) is the latest addition to Western Australia's growing set of world-class bush trails. Vast areas of majestic forests, rolling hills, and year-round cycling weather ensure an ideal setting for a long distance off-road cycle trail.



Starting in Mundaring in the hills east of Perth, the trail meanders through river valleys and the magnificent eucalypt forests of Australia's South West.

Something for Everyone



The Munda Biddi Trail has been designed for cyclists of all ages and experience levels. Enjoy a peaceful morning ride or challenge yourself to a week-long wilderness adventure. The many vehicle access points allow you to design your own journey.


The trail uses a network of bush tracks, firebreaks and disused railway formations, so most of your trip will be on gentle grades except where you enter and exit the scenic river valleys.

If you're keen on an extended off-road adventure, you can camp in purpose-built Munda Biddi campsites. Situated a comfortable day's ride apart, the camps have roomy sleeping shelters and tent sites. If a hot shower and a comfortable bed tempt you at the end of your ride, the trail passes through a



town at least every second day, ensuring easy re-supply and a range of accommodation choices.

Cycle Through Nature



Further south, the trail will pass through towering karri forests before it ends in the coastal town of Albany on the scenic Southern Ocean. You won't have to worry about car traffic on the unsealed trail, so you can relax and enjoy the

scenery while you cycle through nature in safety.

The Munda Biddi Trail provides an ideal opportunity to keep fit and have fun while refreshing your spirit as you soak up the beauty and peace of the South West forests.



Building the Trail



The Munda Biddi Trail is being built under a partnership between the Department of Conservation and Land Management and a number of other State Government departments, local governments, businesses and the community. The trail will be constructed in three 300 kilometre stages, with completion to Albany expected in 2005.



The Munda Biddi Trail Foundation is a not-for-profit organisation that assists with planning, developing, marketing and maintaining the trail. The organisation enlists paid memberships, enrols and manages volunteers, holds trail and community events, and provides information and resources to enhance the quality of the Munda Biddi experience.
