Law Enforement

To ensure that statutory protection under the Wildlife Conservation Act is afforded to Western Australian wildlife, wildlife officers are stationed at centres throughout the State. These officers report regularly to the Chief Wildlife Officer and his staff at Head Office, Perth.

Research

On-site research is carried out within reserves throughout the State by Departmental officers, sometimes working in collaboration with CSIRO, Museum and University staff.

Research undertaken by the scientists and technical officers of the Western Australian Wildlife Research Centre at Woodvale, covers several rare and endangered species together with kangaroos, waterfowl, estuarine birds, plant ecology, reserve management, biological surveys of offshore islands and the mainland, and pesticides.

Game Management

Regulations governing the shooting and trapping of wildlife are strictly enforced. It is the responsibility of would be "hunters" to check these regulations with a Wildlife Officer or Police Officer. The only game which may be taken are ducks and quail in season. The decision as to the opening date of the duck hunting season (if indeed there is a season) is based on sound biological grounds. Game species may only be taken by persons holding an approriate license.

Open Seasons

Subject to specific restrictions, open seasons may be declared for certain species, e.g. wild ducks and quail. BEFORE you go shooting, check all the restrictions—some may have changed since your last trip!

Aviculture

The keeping of birds is strictly controlled. A license is required to keep in captivity any species of fauna whatsoever. There are various categories of license depending on the species to be held. The minimum is a basic license. In addition, aviaries must conform to certain standards set out in the regulations. If you are in any doubt as to the current regulations governing the keeping of birds or other fauna you should contact your local wildlife office.

Import/Export of Fauna

The import and export of fauna is governed by State and Commonwealth legislation. A booklet giving details of the regulations is available from the Department.

License Fees

For current information on license fees and other aspects of licensing procedure, please contact any of the Department's offices listed at the back of this booklet.

HOW YOU CAN HELP

- Know and observe the protection laws.
- Notify your local Wildlife Officer of any breach of the law.
- Join a nature conservation society.
- Encourage the establishment of native fauna in your area or school grounds by creating a suitable environment of native plants.
- Encourage the establishment of reserves for wildlife where their all important habitat can be preserved.

IMPORTANT POINTS TO REMEMBER

- THE SALE OF ALL FAUNA IS PROHIBITED EXCEPT UNDER LICENSE. (THIS INCLUDES THE WHOLE OR ANY PART OF THE SKIN, PLUMAGE, BODY, EGGS AND NESTS.)
- THE KEEPING OF FAUNA IN CAPTIVITY IS PROHIBITED EXCEPT UNDER LICENSE. SICK, INJURED OR DERELICT FAUNA MAY BE CARED FOR BUT MUST BE RELEASED WITHIN THEIR NATURAL RANGE AFTER THEY RECOVER.
- IT IS ILLEGAL TO CAPTURE AND/OR SELL ANY IMMATURE NATIVE FAUNA WHAT-SOEVER.

Kangaroos

IT IS ILLEGAL TO SHOOT KANGAROOS ANYWHERE IN WESTERN AUSTRALIA EX-CEPT UNDER A PROPERTY DAMAGE LIC-ENSE OR PROFESSIONAL LICENSE. THE DEPARTMENT'S KANGAROO MANAGE-MENT PROGRAMME WAS INTRODUCED IN 1971 TO CONSERVE THE ANIMALS IN THIS STATE AND INCORPORATES THE LICENSES MENTIONED ABOVE.

The Sale of Baby Parrots and Other Native Birds

 SOME PEOPLE CLAIM THEY WERE NOT AWARE THAT IT IS ILLEGAL TO TAKE PART IN ANY DEALING IN IMMATURE BIRDS.

THE WILDLIFE CONSERVATION REGULATIONS STATE THAT A PERSON SHALL NOT SELL OR TAKE OR OFFER TO BUY OR SELL OR CONSIGN FOR THE PURPOSES OF AVICULTURE ANY YOUNG FAUNA NOT FULLY FLEDGED OR NOT ABLE TO STAND OR NOT ABLE TO FEED UNAIDED. IN ANY CASE, ALL AUSTRALIAN BIRDS ARE PROTECTED.

"WILDLIFE" includes:-

- (a) flora: all our native Western Australian plants (including any wildflower, palm, shrub, tree, fern, creeper or vine) and any plant which has been declared to be "Flora" within the meaning of the Wildlife Conservation Act; and
- (b) fauna: for the purpose of this booklet "Fauna" means all native Australian and migratory animals—birds, mammals, frogs and reptiles plus others which have been declared to be "Fauna" within the meaning of the Wildlife Conservation Act. It also includes in relation to any such animal the eggs, larvae, semen, carcass, skin, plumage or fur thereof.

NOTE: This leaflet deals only with fauna regulations. A separate leaflet covering flora legislation is available from the Department.

HOW WILDLIFE IS CONSERVED IN W.A.....

W.A. Wildlife Authority

This body controls all of the nature reserves in the State and may advise the Department on any matter relating to wildlife conservation.

Nature Reserves

Islands, lakes, seashores, and areas of bushland large enough to allow plants and animals to live naturally have been set aside in different parts of the State. These nature reserves—and national parks—are the most important means of conserving our wildlife. Advice on the management of nature reserves is the responsibility of a section of scientific officers within the Department of Fisheries and Wildlife.

Protection

All Australian fauna except those mentioned in the unprotected list in this booklet, are fully protected by law. They must not be molested or harmed in any way. Species scheduled in the "Rare and Endangered List" have additional protection.

RARE AND ENDANGERED FAUNA

Severe penalties exist to ensure that the laws governing the protection of our native fauna are observed. Certain species are given additional protection because they are considered to be rare, likely to become extinct or in need of special protection. At December, 1981 these were:—

PROTECTED FAUNA

In Western Australia, all Australian fauna (except for that small schedule of fauna listed under the section "Unprotected Fauna") is fully protected.

Because of the possibility of damage caused by certain species, various open seasons have been declared in different parts of the State. This fauna may only be taken on private land by the owner, occupier or his approved agent after a damage license has been issued by the Department.

Two species of invertebrates have also been declared "Protected Fauna"—jewel beetles of the family Buprestidae and ants of the genus known as Nothomyrmecia.

Non-indigenous fauna also declared protected—white (mute) swan Cygnus olor and Peafowl and pheasants of the genera Pavo and Phasianus respectively on Rottnest Island.
