HAMERSLEY RANGE PIOSIO NATIONAL PARK

The Hamersley Range National Park, set in the heart of Western Australia became a reality for the National Parks
Authority in October 1969. The 590176 ha Park consists of spectacular mountains, gorges, water courses and plateaux. It is an area where countless floods have eroded sheer sided gorges one hundred metres or more. These chasms lie hidden in rolling hills dotted with spinifex and white-barked snappy gums. In other areas of the Park lie ranges of hills indispersed with valleys clothed in Mulga, bright flowered shrubs and spinifex.

The Hamersley Range National Park is situated in an ancient area of the earth; rocks in the Dales Gorge are thought to be between 1600 million and 2000 million years old. The Park abounds with both wildflower and wildlife although to see much of this necessitates taking a short walk. Animals and birds are most active during early morning or evening.

Quite good public roads go to all the areas mentioned and it is important to drive off the roads as severe age is done to the vegetation.

Spinifex, even when green, may fire to your vehicle.

protect the wildlife and the joyment of the park by visitors, ts and firearms are not permitted. nember all things are protected d must be left undamaged for the sujoyment of others.

The average rainfall is 250 to 300mm most of which occurs in summer when the days are very hot (up to 49° C). Winter is the best time to visit the Park when the days are dry and warm and the nights are cold, sometimes with temperatures as low as -4° C.

FACILITIES

There are camping areas just above Yampire Gorge near Circular Pool, near Joffre Falls and near Red Gorge. Picnic areas are provided at Circular Pool, Fortesque Falls (Dales Gorge), Joffre Falls, Red Gorge, Knox Gorge, and Kalamina Gorge.

At each of these sites there are -

Barbecues (please - no ground fires), Picnic tables and seats, Bush toilets, and Rubbish bins.

There are easy paths into Dales Gorge at Fortesque Falls into Weano Gorge and into Kalamina Gorge. The Rangers will be happy to advise on walking in other areas. Please exercise caution when walking as rocks on the edges of gorges may be loose. Also wet rocks in the gorges are very slippery. Visitors are reminded that rocks thrown into gorges can kill people below.

WATER

The only water is at the bottom of the gorges where many people swim in the pools, some of which are very cold. Visitors are asked to assist in the conservation of the area by not using saop or detergent in these pools as it will destroy the unique aquatic life.

The area is serviced daily by Rangers and should visitors have any queries they should contact the Ranger on patrol or at his residence in the Park.
