The echidna or spiny anteater, is one of only five living species of monotremes. They are mammals that have fur and produce milk for their young, but are unique in that they lay eggs from which

the young hatch. There are five

subspecies of the Australian

echidna found in different

regions.

Length: 35–40 centimetres **Weight:** 4.5–7 kilograms



Habitat: The short-beaked echidna can be found in many different habitats within Australia from regions with tropical grasslands to arid deserts and even snow-covered mountains.

Diet: Ants and termites.
