

## Welcome!

This place Ngamoowalem is Miriwoong country. Please respect and look after this land of ours.



Ngamoowalem Conservation Park is one of six conservation parks around Kununurra jointly managed by the Yorrooyang Dawang Regional Park Council and the Department of Parks and Wildlife. At 70,300ha Ngamoowalem is the largest of these parks, which together total 240,000ha.

Ngamoowalem covers the stunning Livistona Range which feeds seasonal waterfalls and permanent pools. Cycads (*Cycas pruinosa*) and fan palms (*Livistona victoriae*) are a special feature of the rocky slopes of the range.

## Park rangers

The Miriwoong Gajerrong park rangers maintain six jointly managed parks. Each ranger represents one of the six parks - Mijing, Darrmalanka, Goomig, Barrbem, Darram and Ngamoowalem. Their work includes caring for cultural sites, fencing, bushfire control, prescribed burns, weed eradication, feral animal control and visitor risk mitigation.

## Caring for Country

The Miriwoong and Gajerrong people are concerned for your wellbeing and safety when you visit their parks and country.

- Places of cultural significance can have a detrimental effect on your health and wellbeing if approached inappropriately. Please respect these places and stay on the established trails.
- Fire in the Kimberley threatens people, wildlife, sensitive plant communities and vulnerable cultural sites. Please do not light any fires.
- Bins are not provided in the park. Please take your rubbish with you to dispose of appropriately in town.
- Do not bring pets into the park.
- Do not feed native animals or pick wildflowers.
- Camping is not permitted in this park.

## Visitor safety

- Be prepared for very hot weather. The park is open all year round, subject to accessibility in the wet season.
- Take appropriate clothing, first aid supplies, vehicle equipment, food and water. These cannot be obtained in the park.
- Please drive slowly and to the road conditions.
- Stay on roads, tracks and trails.
- Your safety in parks is our concern, but your responsibility.



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## Day use sites

## Galjiba (Molly Spring)

Molly Spring is located off Victoria Highway, 30km west of Kununurra. This permanent pool originates from a natural spring in the Livistona Range.

## Barndawooba (Valentine Spring)

Valentine Spring is located 19km from Kununurra, down Valentines Road (turn off Victoria Highway 12km west of Kununurra). This site has a seasonal pool that is part of Valentines Creek, which runs into the Ord River. Local Miriwoong people traditionally used this pool for hunting, fishing, collecting bush food and camping.

### Mayiba (Middle Spring)

Mayiba is located 32km from Kununurra, down Valentines Road. This series of seasonal pools is formed by water cascading down the Livistona Range during the wet season.

## Thegooyeng (Black Rock Falls)

Black Rock Falls is located 32km from Kununurra down Valentines Road, just past the turnoff to Middle Spring. Black Rock Falls gets its name from the cyanobacteria that grow on the rock walls surrounding the pool. In the wet season, water cascades down this black rock into the pool.
