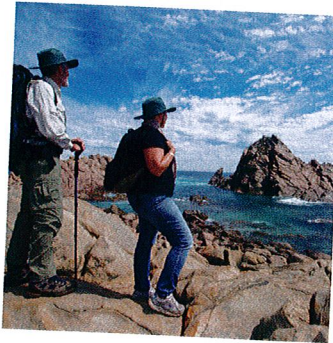
Experience camping in nature

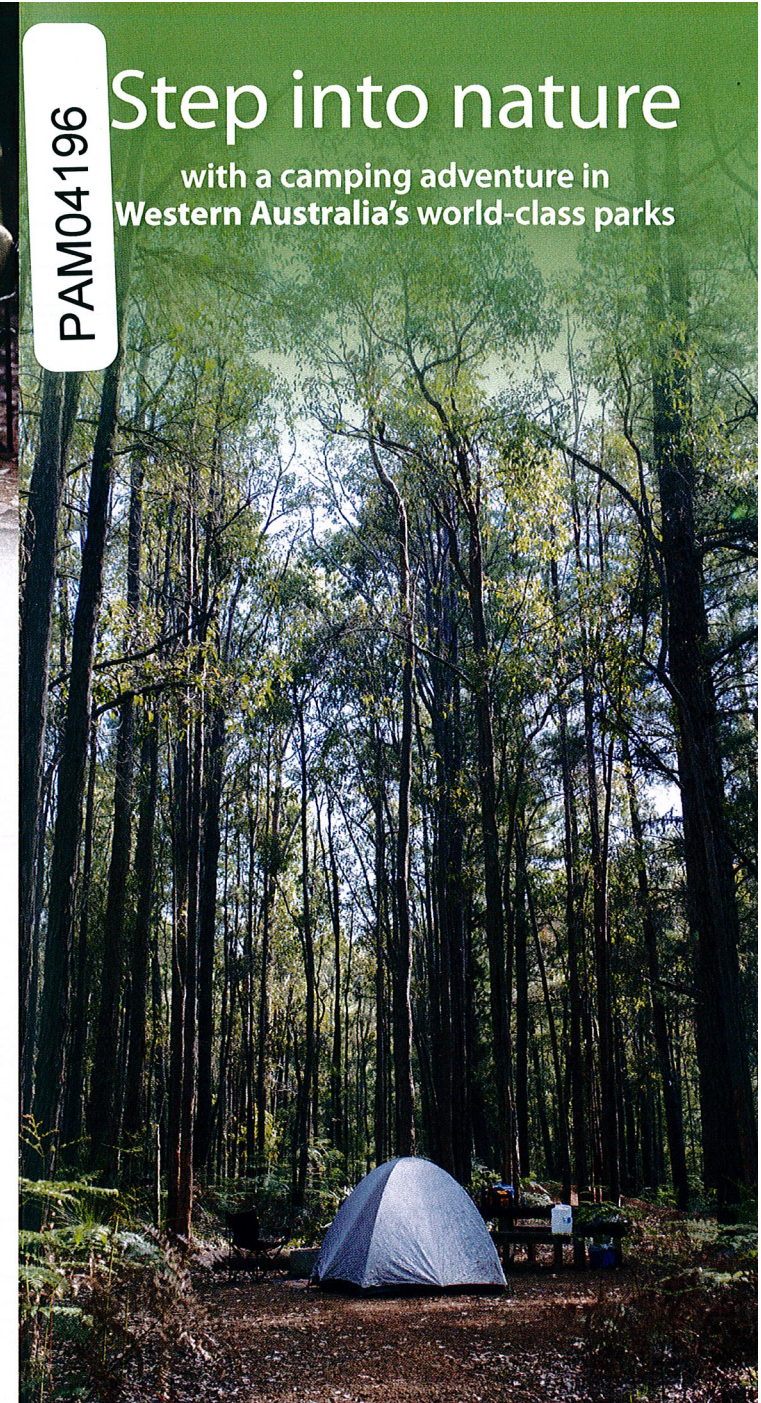

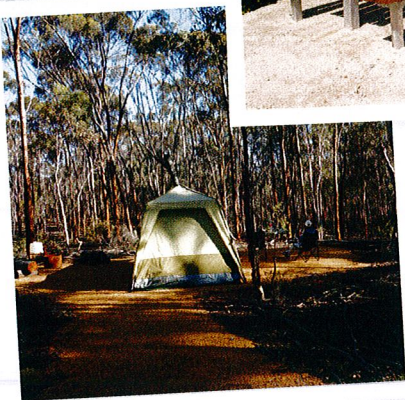

- Camp site designs have been improved to better accommodate the different sizes and needs of caravans, camper trailers and tents.
- Camp sites are separated to create privacy and maintain natural surroundings.
- High quality infrastructure such as barbeque shelters, toilets, interpretation and trails are provided.
- Campgrounds are linked to other recreation opportunities such as walk and cycle trails, and canoe and fishing opportunities.
