

Dolphin Watch

Dolphin Watch is a citizen science project focusing on one of the Swan Canning Riverpark's most iconic species, the Indo-Pacific bottlenose dolphin.

Perth is one of the few capital cities where people can see dolphins on their doorstep. The Department of Parks and Wildlife, together with Murdoch and Curtin universities, is leading research into river dolphin behaviour and the way human activities can affect them. Dolphin Watch offers Perth residents a unique chance to get involved. Volunteers undertake free training from experts before they begin monitoring, and their information adds to our understanding of dolphins.

Junior Dolphin Watch helps school children to connect with the environment and Perth's unique dolphin population in a fun and informative way.

Reel it in

The Reel it in campaign was launched in 2012 to help reduce fishing line entanglements of dolphins, pelicans and other wildlife in the Swan Canning Riverpark. There are now more than 50 bins installed throughout the Riverpark and dedicated volunteers are needed to empty their local fishing line bin on a weekly basis. 


