Barna Mia is an animal sanctury located in the heart of Dryandra Woodland, located just two hours from Perth. Barna Mia has been constructed to provide visitors with an opportunity to view, at close range, a number of threatened native marsupials.



- Discover the bilby, burrowing bettong, rufous hare-wallaby, western barred bandicoot and banded hare-wallaby during an informative, guided nocturnal walk.
- Learn about other conservation measures being undertaken to preserve our native animals and reintroduce them to their former habitats.





How to get there

Dryandra Woodland is 180 kilometres south-east of Perth. The main entrance is 29 kilometres north-west of Narrogin on the Wandering-Narrogin Road.

Facilities

Disabled access and toilets.

Dryandra offers accommodation, camping, picnicking, walk trails, drive trails, wildlife viewing and wildflowers.


