



LEGEND OF MULKA'S CAVE

The name Mulka comes from an Aboriginal Legend associated with the cave.

Mulka was the illegal son of a woman who fell in love with a man with whom marriage was forbidden.

It was believed that as a result of breaking these rules she bore a son with crossed eyes. Even though he grew to be an outstandingly strong man of colossal height, his crossed eyes prevented him from aiming a spear accurately and becoming a successful hunter.


Out of frustration, Mulka turned to catching and eating human children, and he became the terror of the district. It was said he lived in Mulka's cave, where the imprints of his hands can still be seen, much higher than that of an ordinary man.

His mother became increasingly concerned about Mulka, and, when she scolded him for his anti-social behaviour, he turned on his own mother and killed her. This disgraced him even more and he fled his cave, heading south.

All the Aboriginal people of the district, outraged by Mulka's behaviour, set out to track down the man who had flouted all rules. They finally caught him near Dumbleyung, 156km south-west of Hyden, where they speared him. Because he did not deserve a proper ritual burial, they left his body to the ants; a grim warning to those who break the law.

Camping is not permitted on any reserves or within 16km of town. Rangers patrol regularly. FINE: \$500.00

FORMATION OF THE ROCK

Wave Rock, a granite cliff, is about 15 metres high. Its rounded wave like shape has been caused by weathering and water erosion which has undercut the base and left a rounded overhang. The colour of the rock is caused by water from springs which, as it seeps from above through the granite, dissolves minerals. In 1960, crystals from Hyden were dated as being 2700 million years old, among the oldest in Australia. Wave Rock is 344km east of Perth, Western Australia.

HISTORY OF AREA.

While the aborigines were the first inhabitants to the Hyden area, it is believed that they gave the district a wide berth during the past century and a half. Many stones used by aborigines have been found on their campsites throughout the area and painted hand marks can still be seen on rocks at the Humps and Wave Rock.

The Sandalwooders are believed to be the first white men in the area. The earliest recorded farming was in 1922 and descendents of these settlers still live in Hyden. Wheat production started in 1927 and it was carted to Kondinin until the railway from Lake Grace reached Hyden in 1932.




The Westrail bus departs Perth on Tuesdays and returns on Wednesdays.


The Hyden Air Strip is situated 3kms west of the town. Lifts into town or tours of the area can be arranged through the Information Centre or Hyden Hotel.

WHAT TO SEE

4km east of Hyden in a 160ha bush reserve, is **WAVE ROCK.** This granite formation is 2,700 million years old, and part of the 65ha Hyden Rock.

The Wave is 15 x 110m with vertical bands of colour formed by rain washing chemicals down its face. Other formations to see in the area are HIPPOS YAWN, THE FALLS and THE BREAKERS, all within walking distance of WAVE ROCK. HYDEN DAM was built in 1928 to supply water to the new settlers. West of the caravan park is a **PICNIC AREA**, with electric barbecues and public conveniences. Opposite the park is a 3ha bushland WILDLIFE PARK with a WILDFLOWER SHOP (includes Lace Place). 20km north east of Hyden is THE HUMPS, a large granite rock formation. Using the Humps as a catchment, a reservoir was built in 1983 to supply water to the town. Signs show the way to GNAMMA HOLES. MULKA'S CAVE was the home of "Mulka the Terrible". GUM TREE COTTAGE for Arts and Crafts.
