

Sandalwood - supplementary to p. 218.

Wood is a light yellow in colour and the heartwood is strongly aromatic.


Wood exported to China & Japan is used to a certain extent for religious purposes, but principally is used for veneers, for trinket boxes, carved woodwork etc.

To make joss sticks the sandalwood is first ground into a fine flour & then mixed with an ignitable fluid. The resulting paste is spread over a bamboo. This is set on fire, blown out, and allowed to smoulder - giving off an aromatic smoke all the time.

Up to the present date over £5,000,000 worth of sandalwood has been exported.

Natural regeneration is scanty. - tree susceptible to fine - foliage palatable to animals.

*Santalum* -

- ① Perianth tube campanulate or ovoid
- ② Disc distinctly lobed between the stamens
- ③ Style elongated.

*Fusca* -

- ① Perianth-tube cerasiform, very shortly and widely subcampanulate or patelliform
- ② Disc sinuately lobed between stamens but not conspicuously so.
- ③ Style short or none.
