Talk 4: Successful suppression of feral cats

Prior to initiating any methods of control, the Matuwa Kurrara Kurrara National Park had 25-30 feral cats per 100km of transect. After 22 years of trial and error and learning we now record 3-5 cats per 100 km. The long investment in management is paying dividends – Matuwa now has the strongest bilby population in WA, small dasyurids such as mulgara and kaluta are reappearing, and highly vulnerable species such as boodies are being reintroduced outside fenced refuges.

Dr Cheryl Lohr is a senior research scientist employed in Biodiversity and Conservation Science at the Western Australia Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions (DBCA). Cheryl has a wide array of experience in wildlife ecology and invasive species management with a BSc (2004) and MSc (2007) in Natural and

Agricultural Science from The University of Western Australia (UWA) and a PhD (2012) in Natural Resources and Environmental Management from the University of Hawaii at Manoa. Cheryl has worked to further development of the feral cat ERADICAT® bait, researched the use of wildlife contraceptives, studied the human dimensions, cultural aspects, and cost-benefit analysis of managing introduced animals, and developed habitat maps, island biosecurity models, species-interaction models, and systematic conservation planning software. She is a member and scholarship recipient of The Wildlife Society and the Australasian Wildlife Management Society.
