

Thomson Lake Nature Reserve contains the largest, undeveloped lake in the Cockburn area.

127 species of birds have been recorded there in recent years.

The Reserve includes magnificent stands of tuarts, flooded gums, jarrahs and other eucalypts and Banksia woodlands among a variety of bushland types.

A number of uncommon plants occur there, including one recently declared rare and in need of special protection.

Thomson Lake is also the home of grey kangaroos, brush wallabies, possums and bandicoots;

Please help prevent fires on this important Nature Reserve:

- Observe all fire bans and restricted burning periods;
- Do not light rubbish fires near the Reserve;
- Do not burn off when the wind is blowing toward the Reserve.

AND please do not ride horses inside the Reserve fence. Even a few horses plough up the firebreaks so badly that fire units are easily bogged.

Riding horses on the Reserve firebreaks endangers men and equipment.
