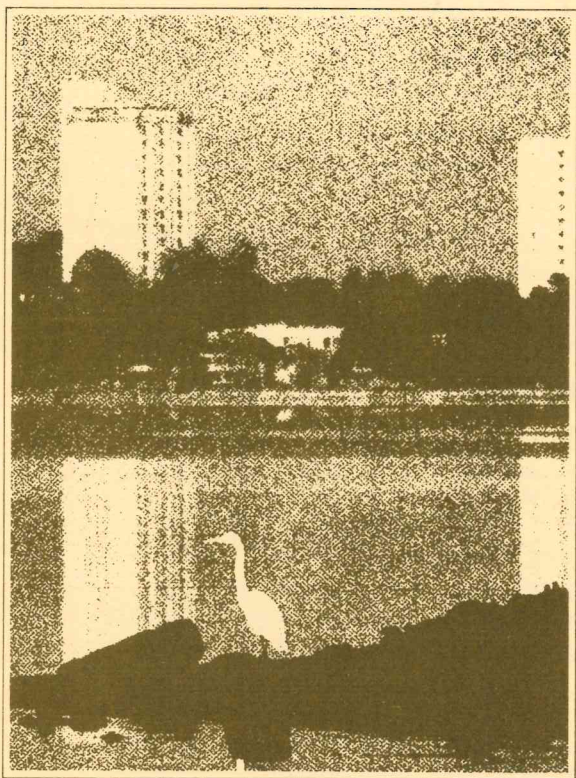

Go snorkelling at Marmion Marine Park - or paddling at Matilda Bay.

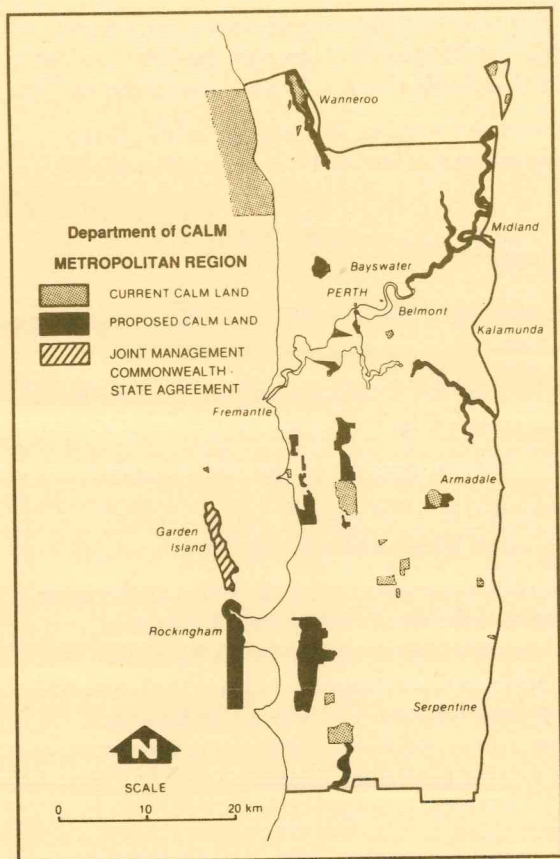
Marvel at primeval forests fringing the Canning River in the proposed Regional Park.

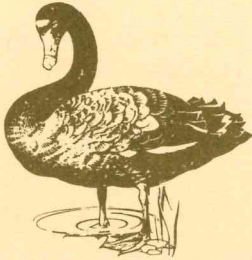

CALM'S major roles in the region are:



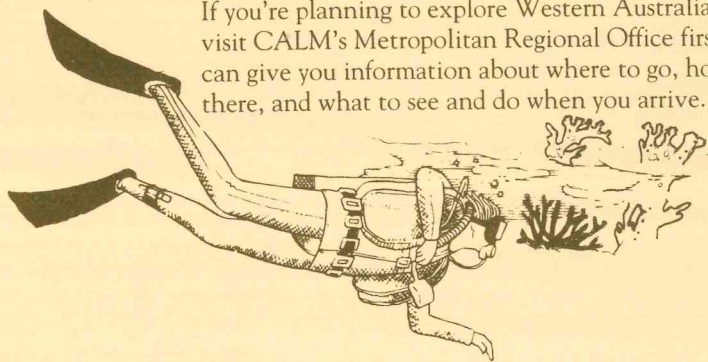
- to manage nature reserves, marine parks and other designated areas for conservation, recreation, natural landscapes and, where appropriate, for commercial activities.
- to promote the educational and recreational experience of people in the region. This includes:
 - (a) promoting the use of CALM lands and waters throughout the State for recreation and nature awareness, appreciation and understanding;
 - (b) developing demonstration areas to show CALM management procedures;
 - (c) involving the public in management decisions; and
 - (d) helping educational and other groups gain knowledge about the natural environment.
