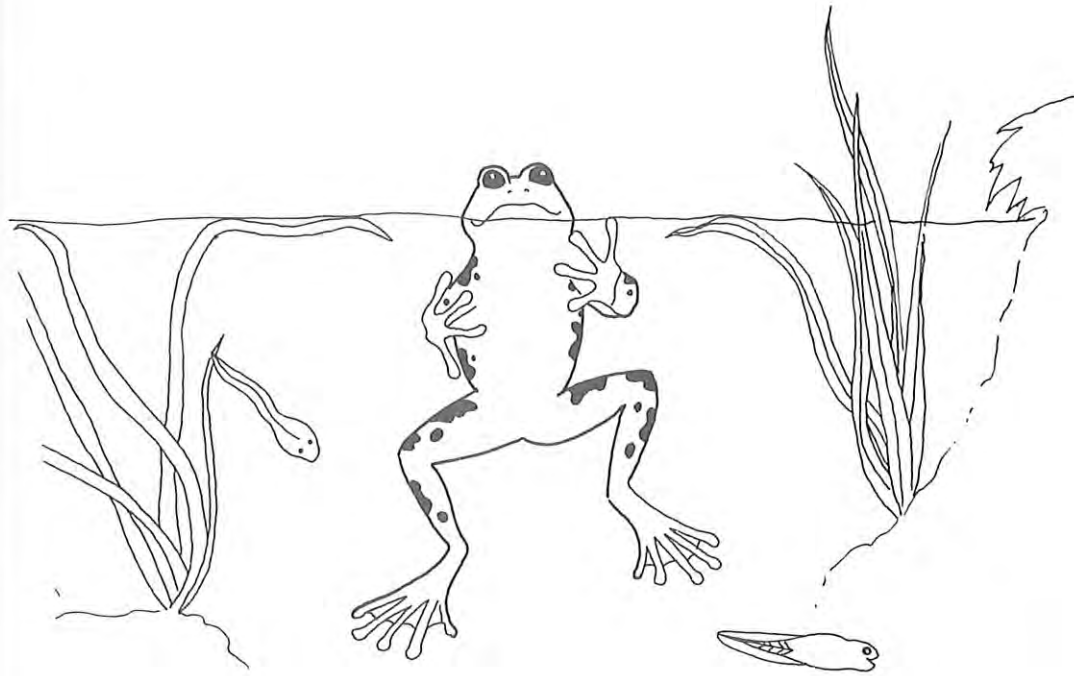

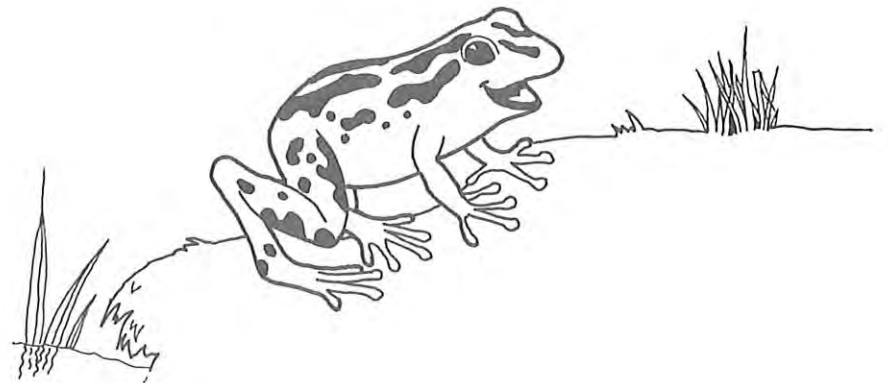
Goldie and the riddles of life

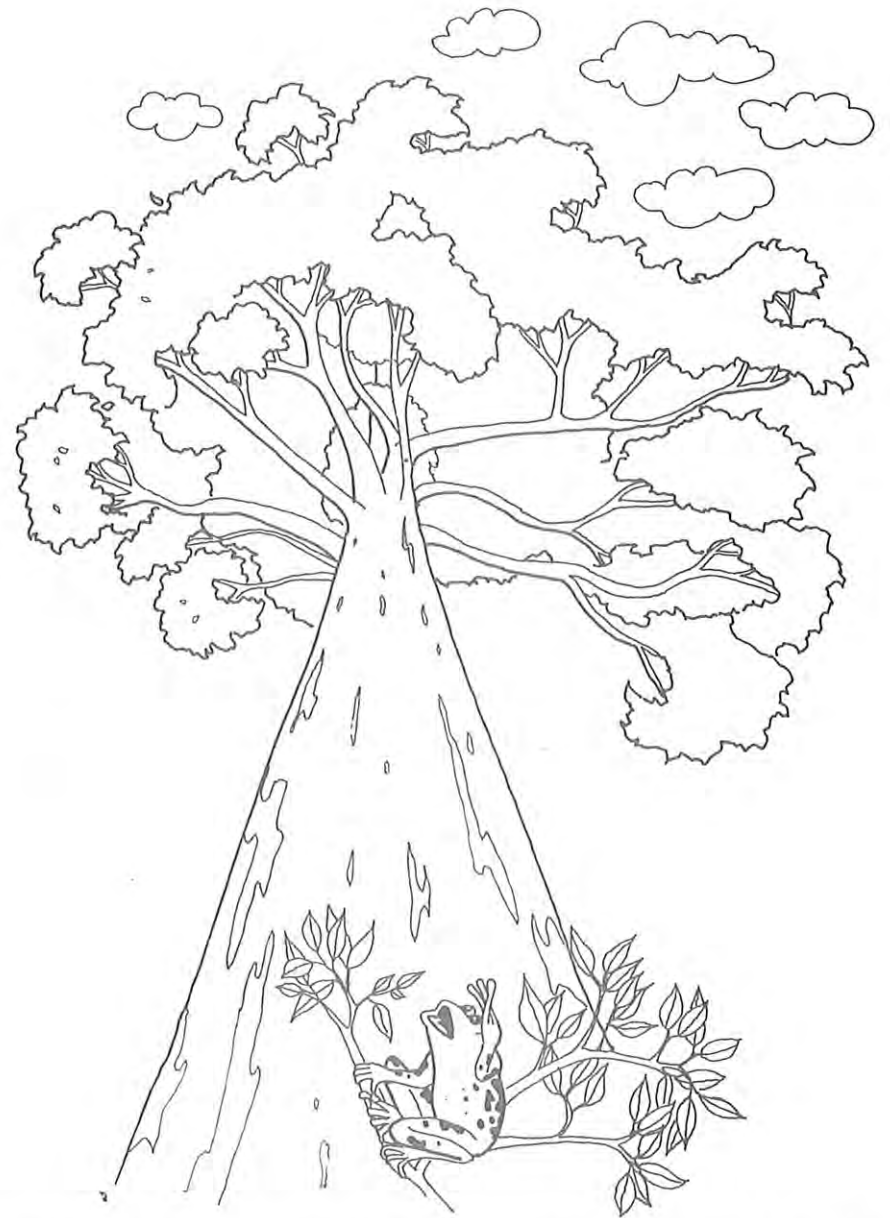


"Silly old toad," thought Goldie, "what would this old wrinkled thing know about happiness?" Just to be polite she asked him, "What may those be, old one?"

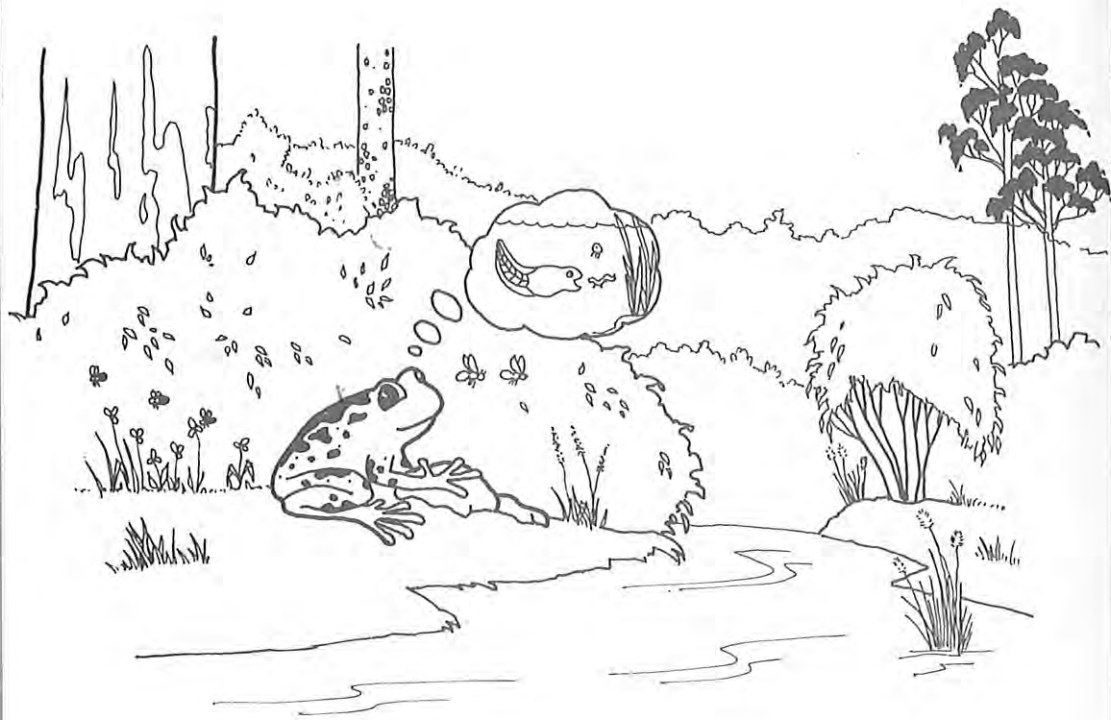
"Find the meaning of these letters and you will find happiness and contentment."

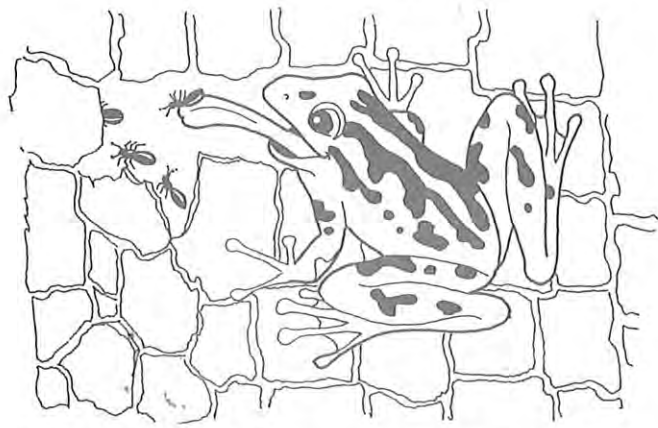


She also found smaller, bushier trees whose branches and leaves hung down like a weeping willow. These leaves, however, filled the air with their peppermint scent.

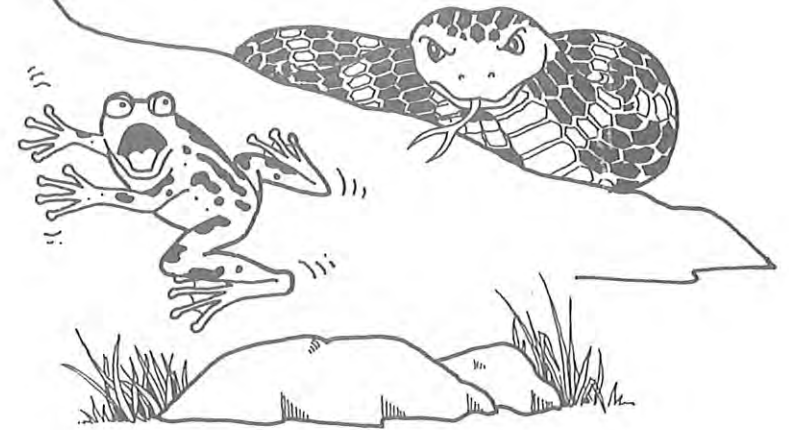

"My tummy's no longer empty like an 'O'," she said happily after her meal as she settled down on a branch to have a sleep.

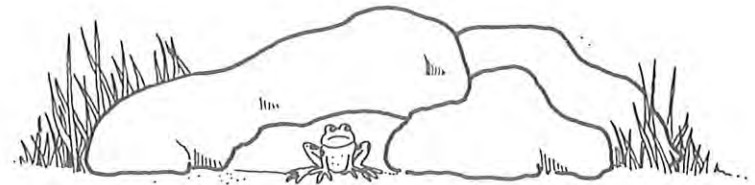

"Well, two of his riddles have certainly been necessary for a happy life," she thought, "I wonder about the others."

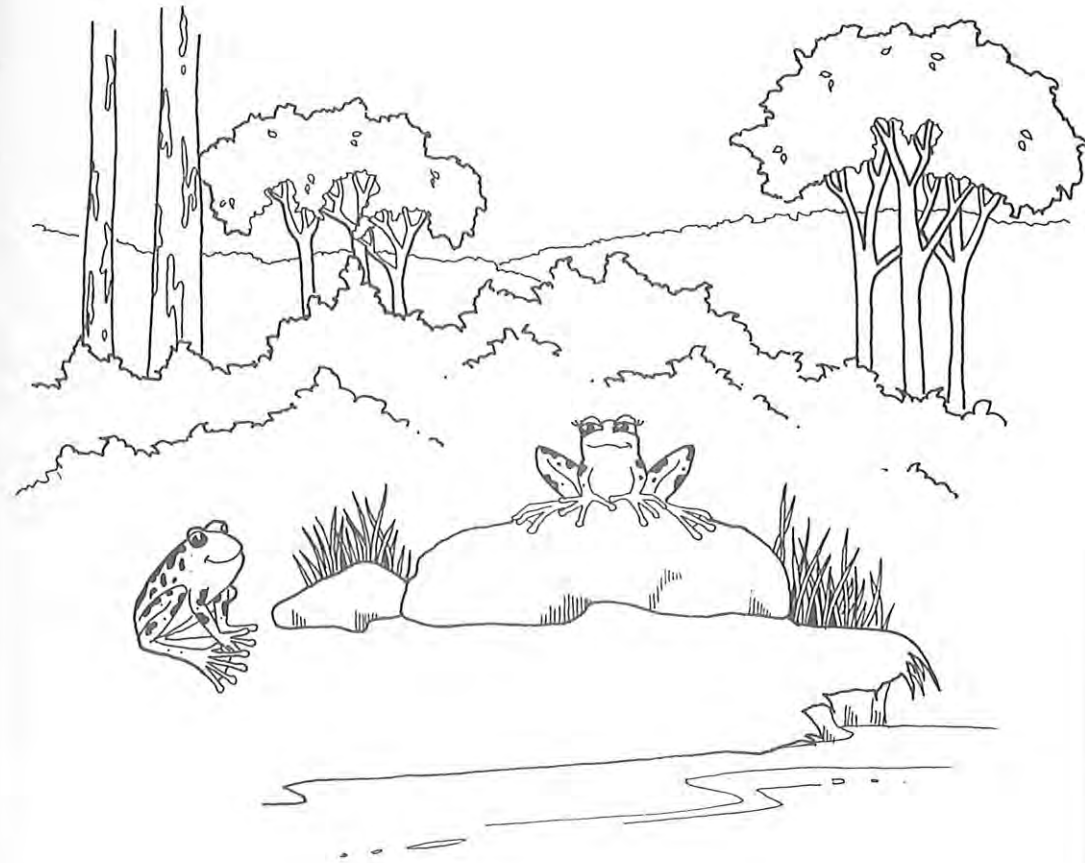

Her loneliness continued until one day she met a handsome frog near the edge of her part of the forest. They could talk for hours, sharing their experiences. They often visited each other.



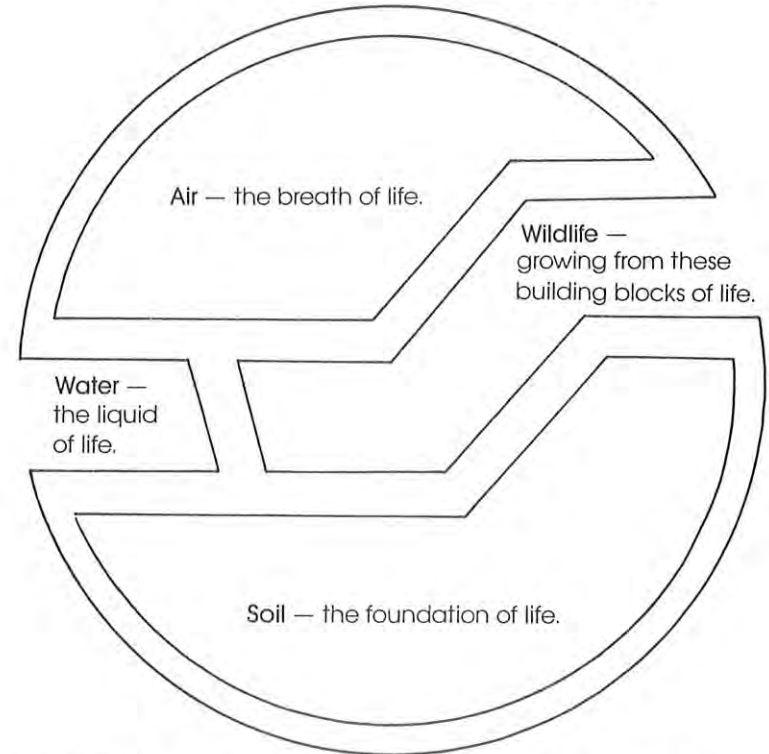
During one of these visits Goldie suddenly remembered the old bullfrog's riddles of long ago.

Sun — the source of all energy for life on Earth.

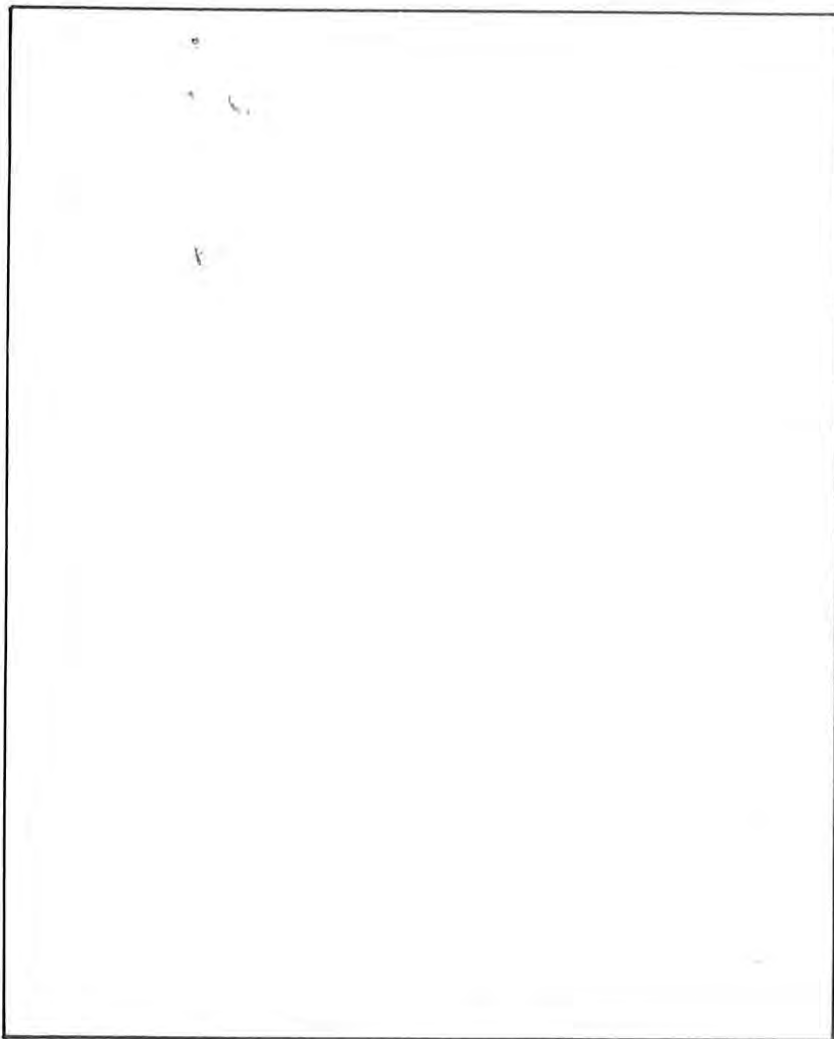


Planet Earth — home to humans, the caretakers of all life on Earth.

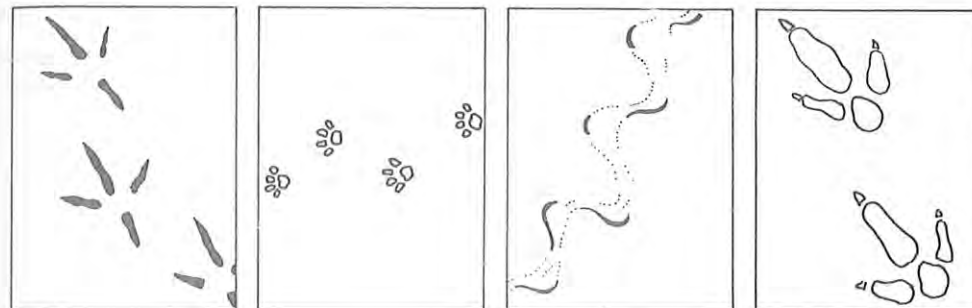
Forest Explorer Activities

Use this space to record the spots where Goldie may have been. You'll first have to mark in a few familiar spots such as your campsite, the picnic area, the toilets, the creek, "You are here" and the direction of the sun to get you started.



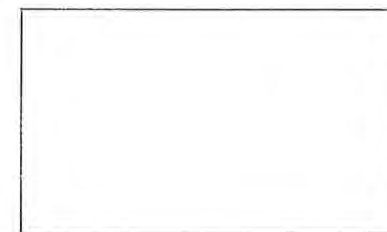
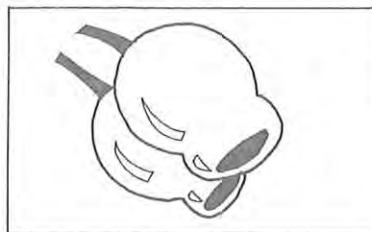
Keep an eye out for Goldie's lunch munch spot. If you find a tree with bugs under the rough bark mark it on your "explorer's map" above.

Look at these tracks and see if you can tell which ones would be frightening to Goldie. If you came across any of these in the forest mark their location on your map as "spooky spot".

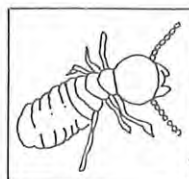


See if you can find Goldie's hiding place. Remember it must be big enough for Goldie to fit into. It must not be too big so that it is easy for a native cat, fox or carpet python to find and enter to Goldie's peril. Mark it on your explorer's map as "hide and seek".

Goldie found some insects on the trunk of a eucalyptus tree. If you want to find them too you'll first have to find a eucalyptus tree. You'll know one when you crush some leaves and smell that refreshing oil. To be sure it's the right tree look for the gum nuts on the ground. If you find any gum nuts you might like to sketch them in this space.



Goldie's insects were both under the bark and amongst the leaves and flowers. See if they are still there. You can mark this place "the supermarket tree" on your map. Perhaps you'd like to sketch in these spaces a drawing of the insects you discover.
