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Where are passes available?

Day passes are available at entry points in national parks and from Rangers within parks. All other passes are available at major park entry points, Departmental offices, selected tourist centres and retail stores, and from the Bookshop on our NatureBase website.

For details of your nearest park pass outlet, phone (08) 9334 0333.

Western Australia is a large State and it is not possible to staff all national park entry points. Please follow the instructions to pay your fees at parks that are not staffed.

2. CAMPING FEES

Camping fees are payable in addition to national park visitor fees where applicable (please refer to Section 1 for list of national parks where visitor fees apply). In national parks, the day visitor fees are only payable on the first day when camping. Camping fees are payable from the first night. (For example, if two people are camping at Karijini National Park for four nights, you would pay the \$9 entry fee once plus four nights camping at \$5 per adult per night making a total payable of \$49.)

Goldstar, Annual All Park, Holiday and Annual Local Park Passes are not valid for entry to the Reserve.

Fees and Charges A Visitor's Guide



1. NATIONAL PARK ENTRANCE FEES

There is no better way to discover the beauty and diversity of Western Australia than to explore the State's national parks. Visitor fees apply at many of the major national parks in Western Australia. If you are planning to visit one of these parks, you will need a national park pass. If you plan to visit a number of parks, you may opt to purchase one of the passes marked below as (●) which will save you time and money. Either way you will be making a valuable contribution to the management of these special areas.

Which pass do I need?

One of the following passes is required where visitor fees apply. All prices include GST.

- **DAY PASS** Valid for one day. This provides entry to a national park for a day visit. (More than one park may be visited in the day using the same pass). Can be purchased at park entry point.

🚗 \$9 per vehicle (up to 8 legally seated people) or

🏍️ \$3 per motor cycle and Concession Cardholders (See section 'Concessions')

🚌 \$3.40 per passenger on buses

Each of the following passes may be purchased from Department of Conservation and Land Management offices or selected tourist outlets. They are also available in many parks.

- **HOLIDAY PASS** Entitles unlimited entry to all national parks for up to four weeks. Ideal for people on holiday.

🚗 \$22.50 per vehicle (up to 8 legally seated people)

- **ANNUAL LOCAL PARK PASS** Provides unlimited entry to one national park (or group of local parks) for 12 months.

🚗 \$17 per vehicle (up to 8 legally seated people)

- **ALL PARKS ANNUAL PASS** Allows unlimited entry to all national parks in Western Australia for 12 months.

🚗 \$51 per vehicle (up to 8 legally seated people)

- **GOLD STAR PASS** Combines an All Parks Annual Pass with an annual subscription to our conservation, parks and wildlife magazine *LANDSCOPE*.

🚗 \$73 per vehicle (up to 8 legally seated people)

Park passes are not valid for the Valley of the Giants Tree Top Walk, Penguin Island and Monkey Mia Reserve, or special events (e.g. Avon Descent). Separate fees apply.

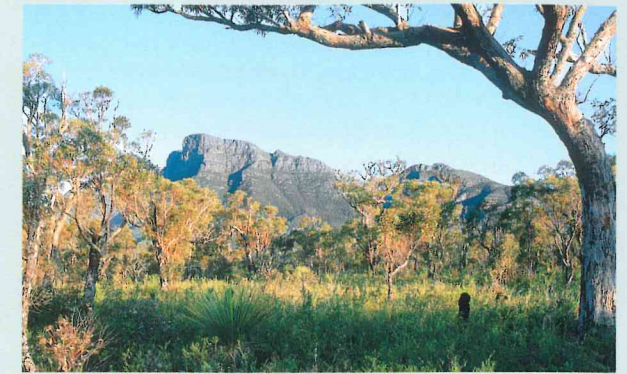
Park passes are for entrance fees only—separate fees apply for camping.

Concessions

Holders of the following cards are entitled to purchase a \$3 day pass: Seniors' Card, Aged Pension, Department Veterans' Affairs (DVA). Community groups travelling on buses may be entitled to a reduction in fees (check with your local Department of Conservation and Land Management office PRIOR TO VISIT).

Disabled, aged and infirm, education and study groups may be eligible for a fee waiver. Requests for consideration of fee waivers can be made in writing to our Parks Pass Co-ordinator, Locked Bag 104, Bentley Delivery Centre, WA 6983.
