### What is a Management Plan?

A Management Plan sets out clear directions for management of a park to ensure that the natural environment and wildlife are protected, and that services and facilities provided are effective and of an adequate standard. It can establish new directions for the park.

During preparation of the plan information on the resources of the park (geology, flora, fauna etc) is taken into account to determine:

- management objectives
- the best way to achieve those objectives.

## What is the Planning Process?

- A draft plan is produced. Public participation in making the plan is important.
- 2. The draft plan is released for public comment,
- A summary of public submissions and amendments to the draft plan is produced.
- 4. A final plan (suitably amended) is produced, for approval by the Minister for the Environment.
