Calling all Squirrels

Smart people collect their firewood when it's dry and plentiful in summer and autumn and store it ready for winter. At that time it's also more comfortable to collect. The ground is not muddy, the days are warm and sunny and you won't get wet.

To manage the taking of firewood from State Forests and Timber Reserves more efficiently, the Department of Conservation and Land Management (CALM) wants to encourage firewood gathering in summer and autumn. This means more firewood is available throughout the year and allows entry into sites in Disease Risk Areas which must remain closed in winter to protect them from jarrah dieback.

This disastrous forest disease is a microscopic, soil-borne fungus that needs water to survive. It is spread when soil is moved, usually on vehicle tyres. In summer when the soil is dry some sites in the forest that don't have the disease can be opened for firewood collection without the fear of spreading dieback into these areas.

* If however, rain falls in summer or autumn sites on plans 4, 6 and 10 will be closed for this reason.

* **Always allow 3 days after rain, before you try to collect firewood in these areas.**

Can I collect firewood?

Apart from private land, firewood can only be collected in State Forest or Timber Reserves managed by the Department of Conservation and Land Management (CALM).

Firewood from the areas shown on the enclosed plans can only be collected for non-commercial use. **LOADS, THEREFORE, ARE RESTRICTED TO ONE 6'X 4' TRAILER (½ TONNE) PER FAMILY.**

Uncontrolled gathering of firewood can seriously damage the forest environment so precautions and penalties are necessary. Therefore, wood gathering is prohibited in national parks, nature reserves, other conservation reserves and areas of State Forest declared Disease Risk Areas (unless shown on the accompanying plans). Entry into disease risk areas is illegal without a licence. Our roadside vegetation is also precious. Don't collect firewood in these areas.

Where do I go?



To assist you, and manage the forest efficiently, CALM has set aside areas where you can collect wood. (See enclosed plans). All wood is scattered trimmings and will require cutting and collecting. A wheelbarrow will be handy.

Make a day of collecting your firewood and picnic at a site near the firewood area you choose! Contact the nearest CALM office, to locate a picnic site.

What timber is best?

All dry or seasoned wood produces approximately the same quantity of heat per tonne. The major differences between species is density of wood (and hence burning time), ability to burn freely, amount of ash, sparks, smoke and smell produced, and ease with which logs can be split.

The most common firewoods available near Perth are:

- Pinaster Pine** - readily available and burns well with moderate ash production. A fast drying and low density wood, easily split and used extensively for firewood.
- Marri** - medium to high density wood that burns freely. Medium amount of ash produced and is moderately easy to split.
- Wandoo** - high density wood that burns slowly. It produces low to medium amount of ash. It is moderately easy to split when 'green' but is difficult when it has dried out.
- Jarrah** - becoming scarce from long history of firewood use. It is medium to high density wood which burns reasonably freely. It produces some sparks, produces low to medium amount of ash and is moderately easy to split.

How much will collecting my own summer firewood cost?



In most of the areas shown on the plans, you can collect your limit of one 6' x 4' trailer load (½ tonne) for free.

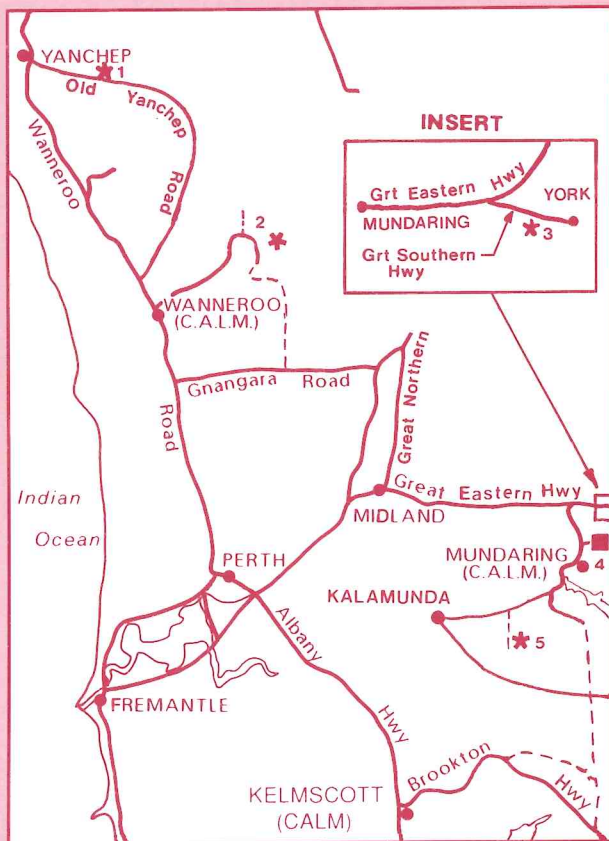
This limit is set so that everyone who needs firewood can have some of this limited resource.

Some areas may be in Disease Risk Areas (ie. free of jarrah dieback) and require supervision by CALM staff. Other areas have firewood available after isolating it from timber thinning operations. Either way the cost of this work needs to be recouped and therefore, some areas will require a \$7.00 fee for each 6' x 4' trailer load. This is half the new winter fee to be introduced next year and payment may be made at:

Mundaring, Kelmscott, Jarrahdale or Como CALM offices.

As fee-payable areas are specially prepared for firewood they will have better quality wood and more of it. The wood in these areas consists of felled trees that you will need to cut to size and carry to your trailer. A wheelbarrow will be handy.

LOCALITY MAP



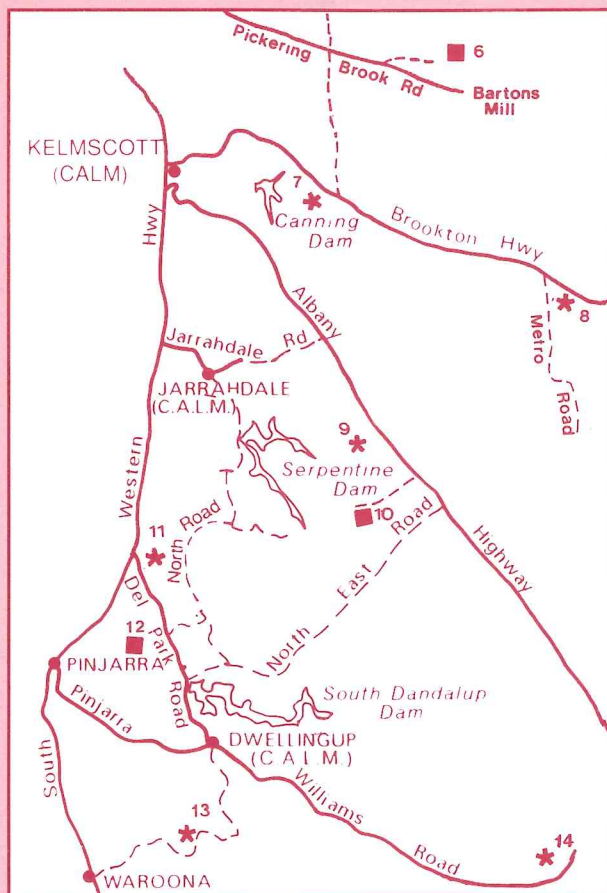

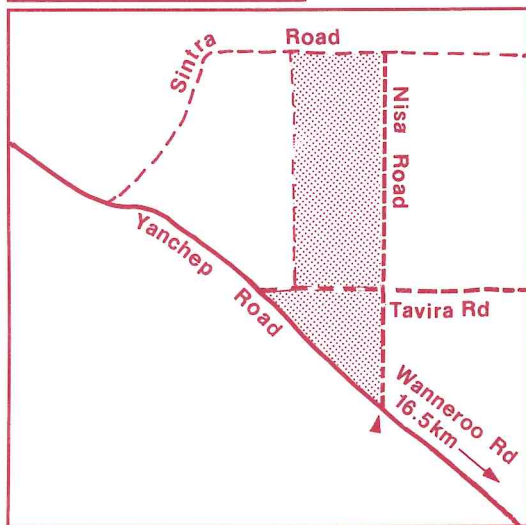

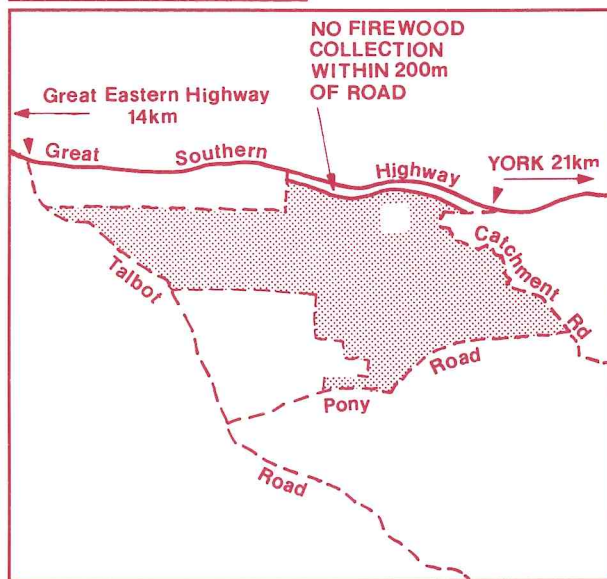

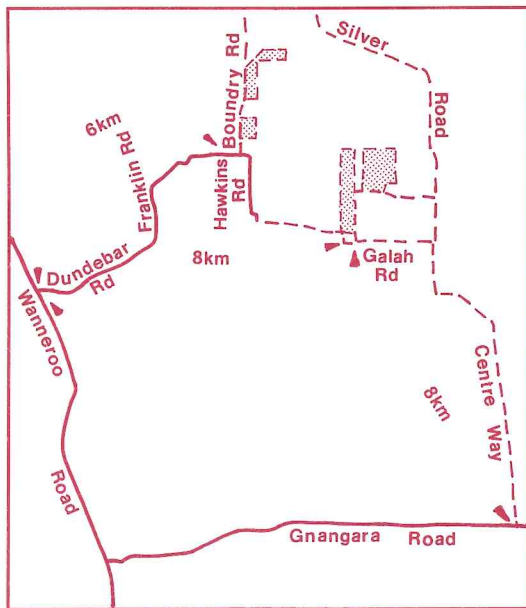

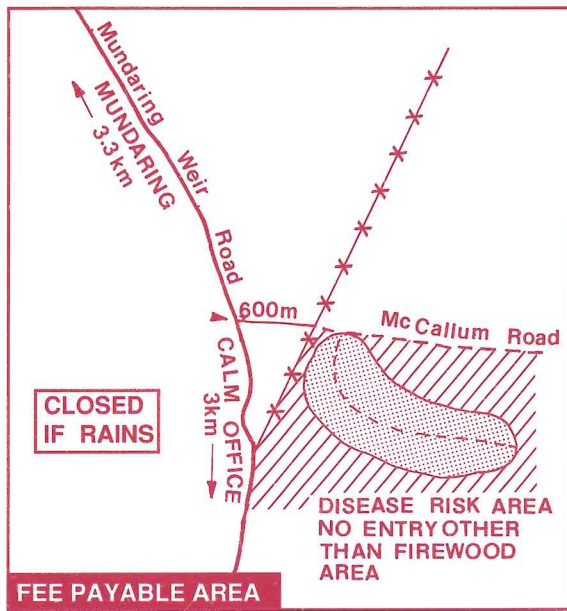

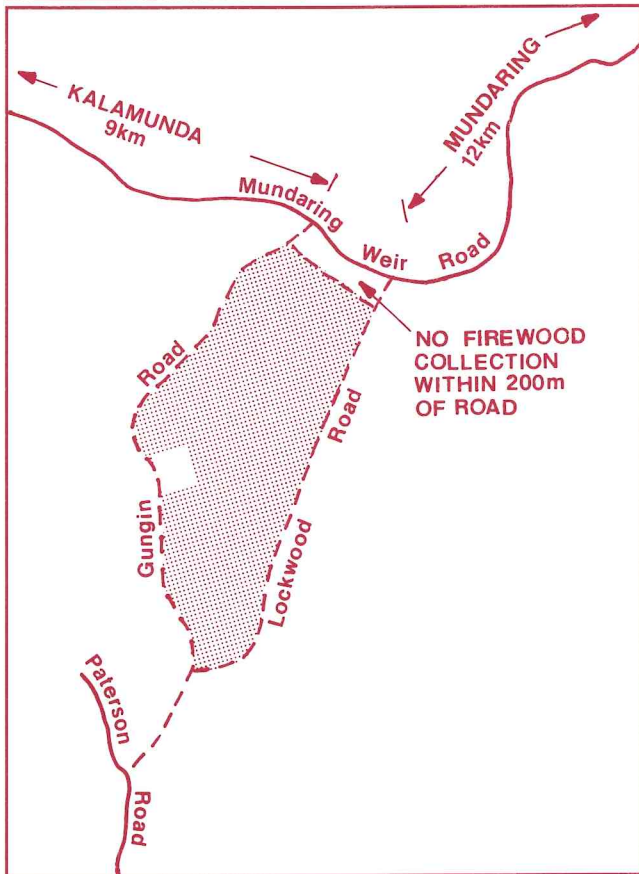

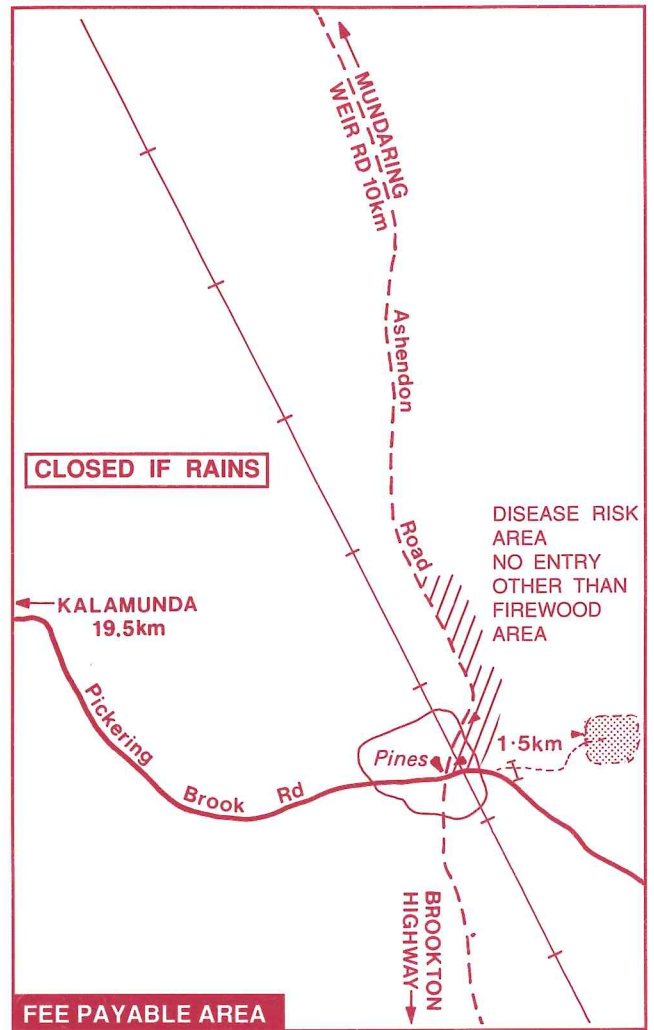

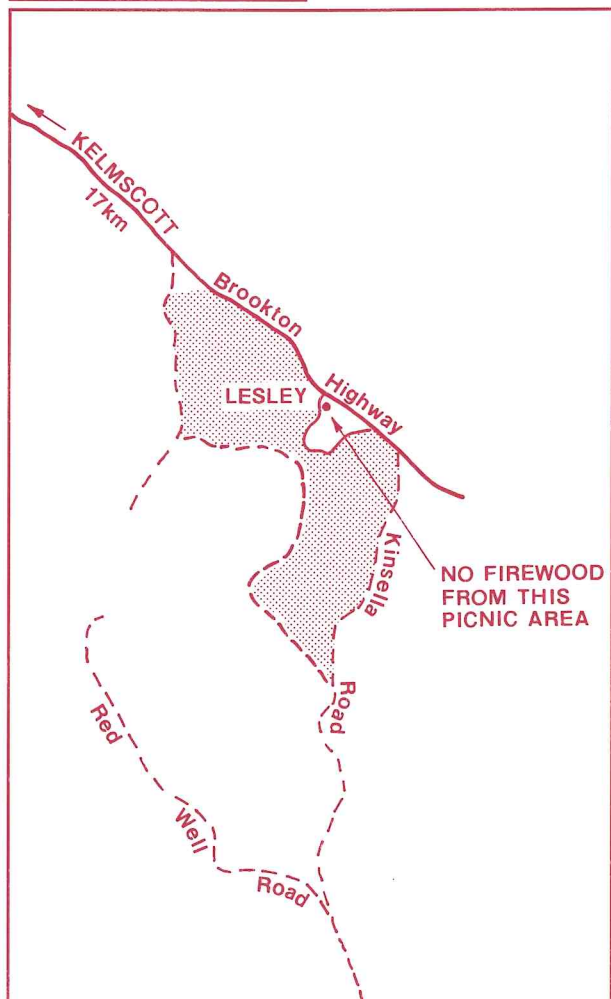

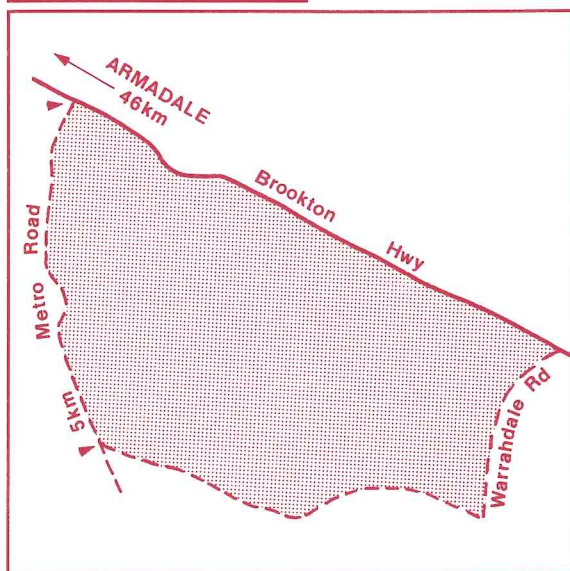

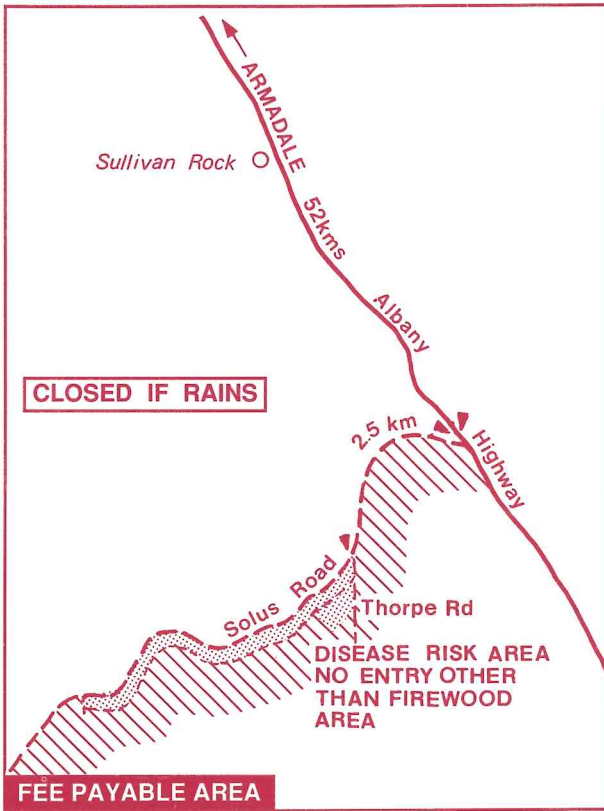

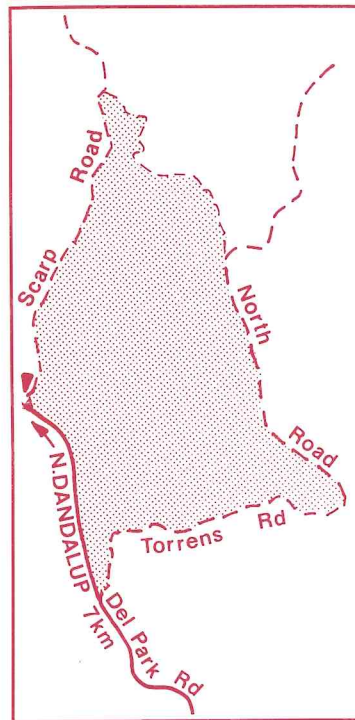

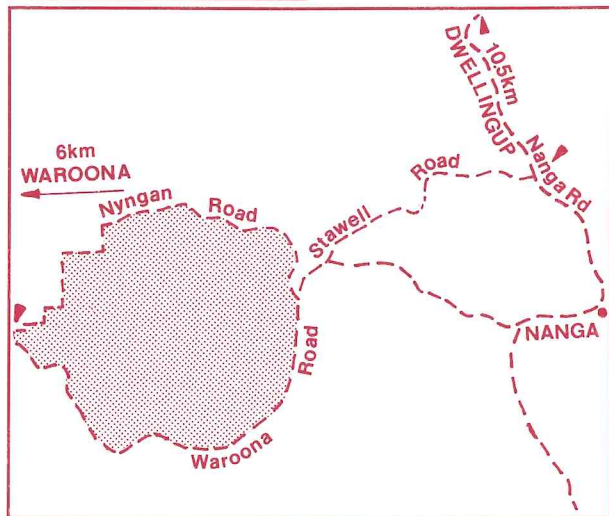

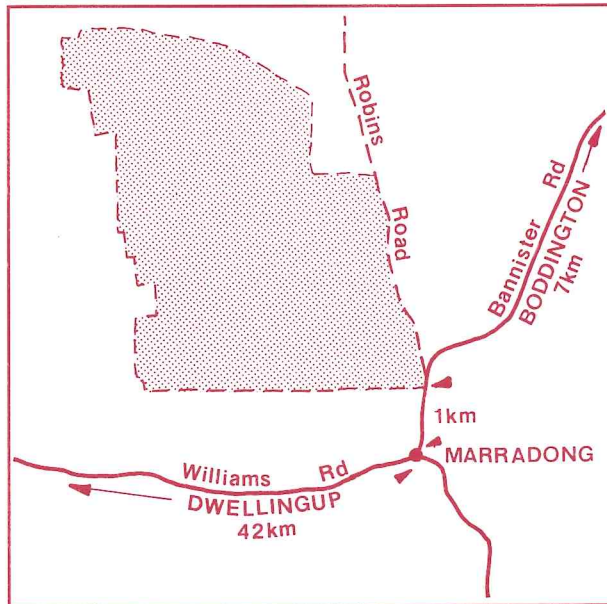

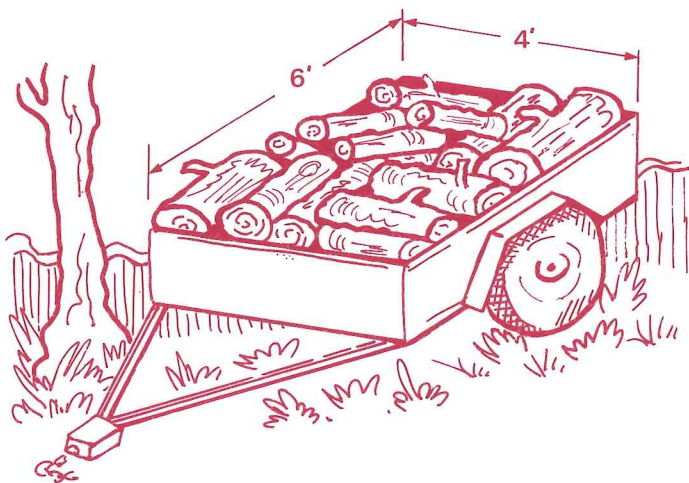

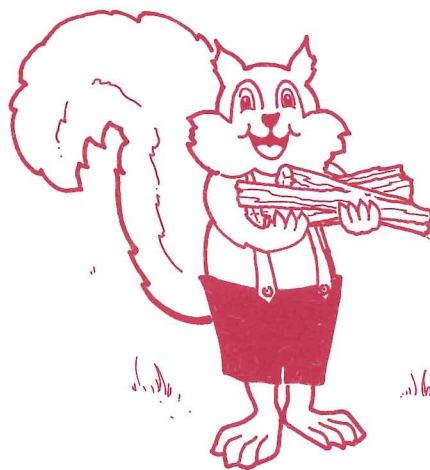

Remember

When you are in State Forests or Timber Reserves:


 Only collect wood that is on the ground. Cutting standing trees is dangerous to yourself and adjacent vegetation and is illegal.


 The limit is one 6' x 4' trailer load (½ tonne).

 Firewood that you collect **CANNOT BE SOLD**. A special licence must be granted to sell firewood.


 Keep your vehicles on graded roads (so that you won't spread dieback and damage vegetation). Take a wheelbarrow to move wood to your trailer or ute.

Allow 3 days after rain to
access the site on plans 4, 6 and 10

 It is illegal to have firearms in State Forest or Timber Reserves.

 If you picnic please don't light fires on the ground and take your rubbish home with you.

 Wildflowers are for all to enjoy so picking is illegal.

 Some Shires have noise abatement regulations including prohibitions on the use of chainsaws on Sunday. Compliance with these regulations is your responsibility.

What do I need?
