Australian pelican

(Pelecanus conspicillatus)
The Australian pelican is one of the largest species of pelican and has the longest bill of any bird.
The big bill of a pelican can hold

about 10 litres of water. Pelicans use thermal updrafts to rise to

high altitudes. Flights to 1,000

metres high are common, and flights of up to 3,000 metres have been recorded. **Length:** 1.6–1.8 metres

Weight: 4–6.8 kilograms

Diet: Fish and some crustaceans.



Habitat: Common throughout most of Australia. Small numbers occur in Indonesia, New Guinea and the Western Pacific islands. They inhabit a variety of fresh and salt water environments.
