Lichenomphalia chromacea

Lichenomphalia chromaceae has the common name of Yellow Navel. The whole fruit body is bright yellow and is generally about 15-25mm tall. The cap is grooved with a distinct central depression – features that gave rise to both the Latin and common names. The gills are lighter in colour and extend a short distance down the stem below the cap. Lichenomphalia chromacea is common in all forest and woodlands in the southwest and always grows in association with a green algal mat. Lichenomphalia chromacea belongs to a group of fungi referred to as Basidiolichens, which rely on symbiotic associations with algae. In this case the alga is most likely a species of Coccomyxa.

The Latin name – what it means: *lichen*- refers to its association with algae, *omphal*—: navel (umbilicus), -*ia*: resembling, *chrom*—: bright colour e.g., chrome-yellow, -*acea*: colour of or closely resembling.
