King Jarrah, the park's tallest jarrah tree. Thought to be between 300 and 500 years old, this 36m tall majestic tree has survived bushfires, storms and insect attack. Come and see this grand old tree from a purpose-built boardwalk and viewing platform.

Jump on board a fascinating cruise around Shoalwater Marine Park to meet sea lions, stingrays dolphins and more.

Perth to Yalgorup National Park 128km 1 hour 30 min

Kwinana Fwy - Forrest Hwy - Preston Beach Road

Just 60km south of Mandurah, discover Yalgorup National Park. This narrow, coastal, Ramsar-listed lake system is significant for the incredible variety of water birds that live in and visit the area.

On the edge of Lake Clifton are structures built by micro-organisms too small for the human eye to see called thrombolites. You can view this fascinating sight on the purpose-built walkway, imagining the dawn of time 650 million to 3,500 million years ago when thrombolites were one of the only forms of life on Earth. Lakes, beaches and dunes can be seen from several high vantage points in the park and for those wishing to get their toes wet, nearby Preston Beach and Myalup are perfect locations for a spot of fishing. The newly redeveloped Martins Tank campground has excellent facilities and is the ideal place to camp.

Must do:



Pack your binoculars and head off on a walk trail. Late winter and spring are wonderful times for viewing wildflowers in the park and you will be rewarded with fantastic views over Lake Preston. Visit the bird hide on the shores of Lake Pollard and

discover how many species of birds visit this special place.


Short stop

Bunbury to Wellington National Park 46km 40 min

South Western Hwy – Coalfields Hwy – Wellington Dam Road

Wellington National Park is just 40 minutes from Bunbury. The abundant wildflowers in the spring amongst the stands of jarrah, marri and blackbutt make this park idyllic for bushwalking and cycling on the tracks and trails. Laze about the water's edge of Wellington Dam and the Collie River or fish and canoe to your heart's content. Take in the stunning view at Kiosk at the Dam while enjoying morning or afternoon tea or lunch.

Honeymoon Pool

Honeymoon Pool campground is situated on the banks of the Collie River. It has individual campgrounds for tents and small campervans.

Honeymoon Pool – Gelcoat

Accommodating up to three tents, Gelcoat is an open campground fantastic for small groups camping together.
