

Campground hosting Parks and Wildlife Service













What are Campground Hosts?

Campground hosts are community members who enjoy interacting with a variety of people, enjoy the natural environment and are interested in its conservation.

Hosts are the 'public face' of national park camping in WA. They are often the first point of contact for visitors to the parks and link between rangers and campers. They are required to be physically fit and in good health to carry out a variety of roles associated with the park and visitor management of national park campgrounds throughout WA.

The first record of a volunteer campground host in WA was in 1989, at the Lane Poole Reserve near Dwellingup. It was acknowledged that campground hosts enhanced the department's national park services, while also benefitting campers. By 1997, 15 national parks throughout WA were supported by 29 volunteer campground hosts. Since the program started three decades ago, campground hosts support more than 60 locations throughout WA.

When is hosting available?

Hosting is available for most of the year. In particular, hosts are required during the summer period in the south-west, the dry season above the 26th parallel and especially during peak tourist periods including school holidays.



What duties are required?

Duties can include:

- · Meeting and greeting campers.
- Checking online booking receipts and assisting campers to find their allocated campsite.
- Providing general information on the park and surrounding area.
- Outlining campground rules, facilities, campfire safety and activities.
- Assisting rangers with campground maintenance and presentation – cleaning of ablutions and facilities, distribution of rubbish bags and removal of rubbish to name a few.
- · Duties can vary at each site.
