Learning by doing

A wide range of programs are offered across each of our main themes:

Aboriginal culture – walk the forest to explore traditional practices for sustainable resource management. Have a go at making tools or learn to hunt and fish the Noongar way through roleplay.

Threatened species/wildlife recovery – get active, get monitoring and measuring and discover what is involved and at stake for conservation programs like Western Shield in the ongoing fight to manage introduced feral animals and save native animals.

Fire in the landscape— a huge topic and we have a wealth of content packaged into activities and modules for all ages, covering everything from traditional burning practices to using fire hoses on our fire trucks; from investigating the habitat impact of fires of different intensity to responding to a fire in a roleplay exercise.

River and Wetlands – another big topic that we have covered. Our diverse programs, tailored for students from Kindy to Year 12, get students taking samples, identifying, measuring, comparing, analysing, mapping as they explore ecosystems, water quality, macroinvertebrate diversity, birdlife, human impacts, management strategies.

Forest and bush ecosystems – explore connections in our forests or bushland with a focus on the biology of WA's unique native flora; sustainably managing forests for biodiversity and timber; or managing the spread and impact of dieback.

Providing experiences that build understanding and inspire action for conservation.
