Foxes and feral cats are making a meal of our native wildlife. They have contributed to the extinction of 10 native mammal species and threaten a further 31 animal species. The bilby (Macrotis lagotis) is one such species that is fighting for survival.

To bring our native wildlife back from the brink of extinction, CALM has embarked on the world's biggest campaign against feral predators, Western Shield, which aims to control foxes and feral cats on more than 5 million hectares of WA's conservation lands. By controlling the threat of introduced predators we can save our native animals and return them to areas where they once roamed freely.
