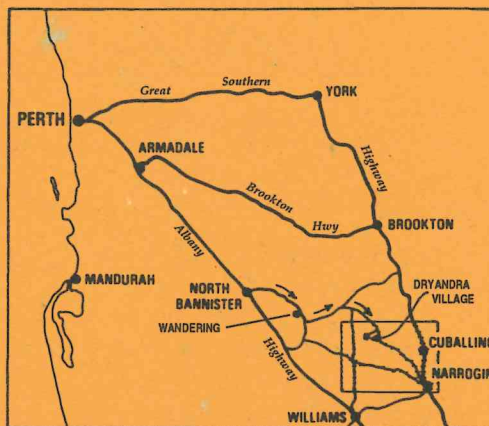
## HOW DO I BOOK?

## LOCALITY MAP

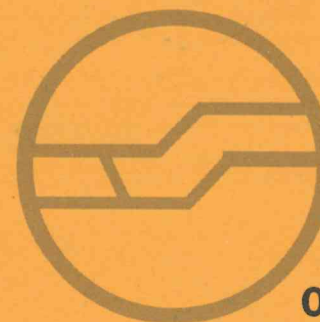

## WONDERS OF THE WOODLAND

The Department of Conservation and Land Management (CALM) has put together a great collection of nature-based and cultural tourism activities to enliven your visit to Dryandra Woodland.

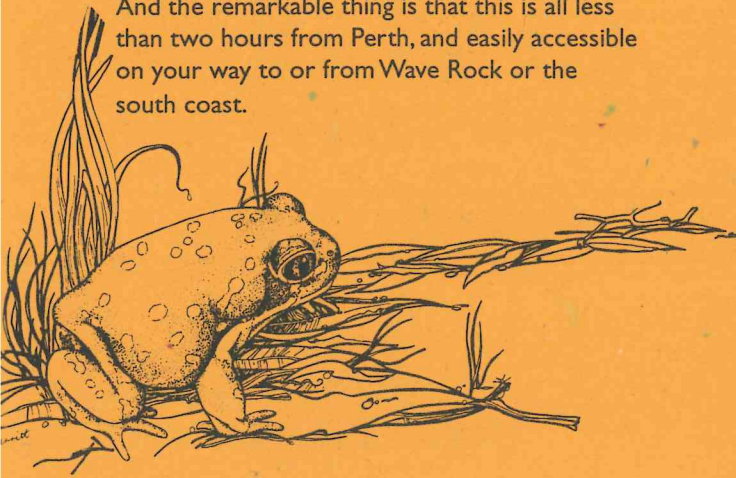
Tour operators, schools, or private groups can choose any of the activities in this brochure to compile their own program. CALM staff can assist in tailoring a program to suit your needs and interests.

## WHAT MAKES DRYANDRA SPECIAL?

Animals! Scenery! History! Not only does the undulating landscape and white-barked wandoo woodland provide a scenic attraction like no other, but the animal life at Dryandra makes it unique. Nowhere else so close to Perth can you see the State's mammal emblem, the numbat, during the day, and woylies, tammars, brushtail possums, brush wallabies, and more at night.

You can also see evidence of Aboriginal use of the area at the ochre pit. Scarred trees and stone arrangements provide further clues about traditional Aboriginal lifestyles.

And the remarkable thing is that this is all less than two hours from Perth, and easily accessible on your way to or from Wave Rock or the south coast.



## WHAT'S IT ALL ABOUT?

*Wonders of the Woodland* is an interpretive program run by CALM's Narrogin District Office. The activities provide visitors with an enriching and memorable experience based on the natural and cultural features of Dryandra.

### ④ 1. Night-time Escapades

Join CALM staff for an evening slide show as they cast some light on the mysteries of the bush. Then it's off to search the woodland for the many nocturnal animals that call Dryandra home. We may even have a few surprises in store! Bring a torch and insect repellent.

### ④ 2. Walk, Talk and Gawk

Local CALM staff will take you on a close encounter with some of the rarely seen inhabitants of the woodland. Check our traps for little beasties, and learn how you can help to save some of our amazing wildlife. A session for the early risers!

### ④ 3. Starry, Starry Night

Join staff from the Perth Observatory for a closer look at the wonders of the night sky. (Available only during school holidays)

Learn traditional bushcraft with local Nyoongars. You will get to taste local bush tucker, try your hand at tool making, and light a fire the Nyoongar way.
