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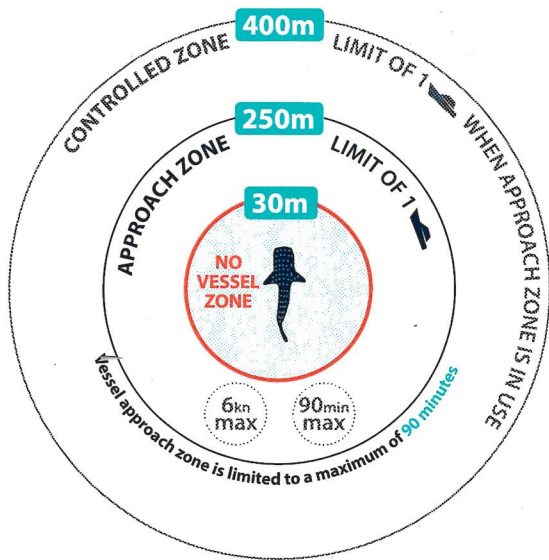
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# Interacting with Gujawari (Whale Sharks)

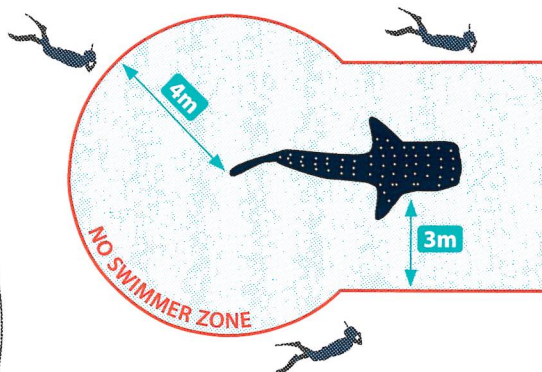
*Gujawari (Goo-ja-wa-ry) is the term used by the Nyinggulu Mob for whale shark*

When on our land and sea Country, the Nyinggulu Mob ask that you respect and care for the Gujawari by following these interaction protocols:

## VESSELS



## SWIMMERS



Swimming with whale sharks is limited to a maximum of 60 minutes

## KNOW YOUR ZONES

Be courteous to others, know the rules, and wait your turn.

## GO SLOW

Reduce your speed and maintain a lookout.

If you see these flags, please **TAKE CARE AND KEEP YOUR DISTANCE.**

Always maintain the required separation from tour vessels as tour guests are likely to be swimming with a whale shark.



Touching, disturbing, interfering with the natural movement of, or breaching separation distances for whale sharks in Western Australia is prohibited under the *Biodiversity Conservation Act 2016*. Penalties of up to \$500,000 may apply.



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
