"This role always calls for diplomacy. Pat combined this with efficiency and a pleasantly positive demeanour. As a consequence, he was highly respected.

"Right from a childhood that included evacuation from London during the World War II Blitzes, things turned out well for me," Pat said.

"I'd just completed my basic training in the British Merchant Navy, when I immigrated with my parents to

Australia."

Pat became jack of all trades, breaking in horses up north, serving briefly in the Australian merchant navy, and working as a sheep station

Then he answered a newspaper advertisement for an assistant to refurbish the Harvey Forests Department mill, a sixmonth job that eventually saw him become part of the main

work force.

"My job has allowed me first to develop my timber skills, then to enjoy the responsibility and teamwork that comes with the area co-ordinator's role,"

Pat said.

"In time, my wife (also Pat) and I bought a small irrigation property at Wokalup, where we

still run cattle and rear calves.
"Early on we ran a Palomino stud. (Both Pats are Life Members of the WA Palomino

Association.)

"Now, I'd like to set up a workshop at home and get into some fine furniture making,"
Pat says.

"A trip over east and to Europe and the UK are definitely on the cards.

"But I do know I'll miss the companionship of the guys—and the regular pay cheque!"
