Highlights of 2003

Exploring The Hills Forest

Our programs at The Hills Forest Discovery Centre in Mundaring, continued to grow in 2003 and catered for more than 20,000 visitors who enjoyed a choice of 23 excursions and activities for groups from early childhood to late adolescent stages. The programs were coordinated by Jill Francis and the EcoEducation team led by Louise Austen.

CALM Bush Rangers

With 30 Units around the State, students have spent thousands of volunteer hours studying nature conservation and taking part in community service projects. The Department of Conservation and Land Management (CALM) Bush Ranger program received a number of awards in 2003 and was a finalist in the Education section of the United Nations World Environment Day Awards in June.

Coordinated by Bronwyn Humphreys, Bush Rangers continued to forge partnerships with communities to work together to conserve WA's biodiversity.

In 2003 our inaugural Professional Development (PD) weekend camp for teachers in the World Heritage Area at Shark Bay coincided with Threatened Species Day and was a special experience for all who attended. The teachers had many close encounters with rare native animals, handled a bearded dragon, weighed small mammals, set a pit trap line, met a bilby and had discussions with CALM scientists. Monkey Mia dolphin feeding was part of it too!

Teachers returned to their schools armed with curriculum resources, an understanding of the science behind conservation management decisions and ideas for camp activities in the area. Thanks to the World Wide Fund for Nature who contributed to the cost of the camp.
