EcoEducation was off to a busy start in 2005. The year began with more than 35 keen teachers, landcare officers and others immersing themselves in the best of environmental education through the Catchments, Corridors and Coasts (CCC) course. Under 'cool' conditions they got a taste of our programs at The Hills Forest Discovery Centre, camped overnight and assisted in CALM's *Western Shield* fauna monitoring program.

The Hills Forest Discovery Centre had a close call earlier this year. Fortunately, the fire in the Perth Hills during the third week of January did not affect the centre in Mundaring, or its surrounding forest so we can all continue to enjoy and learn about this amazing ecosystem. The fire, which burnt 28,000 hectares, caused the evacuation of the centre. However, visiting Geography and Biology students now have an opportunity to help monitor the recovery of the wildfire-affected areas, even though some distance away.

Our team of EcoEducation Officers are ready for action, operating out of our two South West centres—the Margaret River Eco Discovery Centre and the Wellington Discovery Forest—and the two in the metropolitan area—The Hills Forest Discovery Centre and the Henderson Environmental Centre in the City of Stirling.
