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As the fires and heat of summer cool into our autumn period, the pace of EcoEducation's work hots up! Term 1 has been a time of much action and planning for our team. In the South West, Janet Date has carried out a survey of students' understanding of biodiversity and EcoEducation's role in its conservation. This will provide us with baseline data to help us plan future programs at Wellington Discovery Forest.

In Dryandra woodland a group of keen teachers gathered in March for our Western Shield PD camp and at The Hills Forest Discovery Centre we hosted a full house for our first Fire: Facts, Fiction and Fun Tour. We know that fire has helped to shape the environment and has been a driving force in the evolution of native flora and fauna. But fire is perhaps one of the least understood of the 'natural elements' and is also a valuable land-management tool. As a result of so much interest in the Perth Hills wildfire we are preparing a new program and resources for secondary students that will help take the fiction out of current understanding of fire management.
