Groups galore descend on centre

Despite the brevity of Term 4 there has been plenty of action at the centre with our final event, a PL day for all staff of Our Lady of Mercy School, booked for 11 December. More than 100 groups have headed for the hills this term and there are still more to come.

In October we welcomed 206 students and 31 adults from Beldon Primary School who took part in several excursions. This was a special experience for everyone and a great way to embed the concept of conservation in the school culture.

Healthy Parks, Healthy People special excursion

Notre Dame Primary School students discovered the health benefits of being in a park when



they attended a sponsored excursion this term. Students discovered techniques for safe bushwalking and bushcare, compass navigation and safety and signals, while observing EcoEducation's Forest Code of Conduct.

Keep your eyes open for the Invertebrate of the Month Dryandra moth, *Carthaea saturnioides* (Lepidoptera: Carthaeidae)

This exquisite moth, commonly known as the dryandra moth, is endemic to south-west WA.

The distinctive eye-spots are used in defence (probably against bird predation) and when disturbed the moth shows its hind wings and rhythmically vibrates them. This results in a startling display. Adults come to lights, generally in the later part of the night and early morning and usually fly from October to December.
