More trapping success

On a *Monitoring Marsupials* session in October, students from Corpus Christie made a significant capture – a big male quenda! Suitable habitat for quendas surrounds the Perth Hills National Parks Centre, but none have ever been caught in traps. Now we have evidence of their presence and trapping in this area will continue next year to try to find more individuals.

Not only is *Monitoring Marsupials* a great educational opportunity, it is also a valuable tool for monitoring the fauna of the area. Monitoring results indicate changing populations patterns in a range of native animals. Getting the data is one part of the puzzle, explaining why populations are changing over time is the other part. Senior students who engage in *Monitoring Marsupials* are making a valuable contribution to our understanding of the fauna of this area.

Adjusting our programs

In 2009, several subject areas will be changed to meet Curriculum Council requirements, particularly Biology and Geography. If you want to do an EcoEducation program, but what we offer doesn't match what you need to meet recent changes, please talk to us about amending a program to suit your needs.
