Extra monitoring at Dryandra Woodland

Marsupial monitoring in Dryandra Woodland is a favourite of visiting educational groups and recently we have been adding an extra element to the experience. After setting traps, we have also been placing a night-vision motion camera in the area to demonstrate other, less invasive, ways of monitoring animal species in Dryandra Woodland.

Cameras can tell you what species are in an area and give a good indication of health without disturbing the animal, but cannot give you individual data for the animal or the experience of working with them.

The cameras are used extensively throughout reserves in the Wheatbelt. School groups may be able to take advantage of this in booked monitoring sessions.

The aim is to eventually have one or two cameras dedicated to EcoEducation so visiting educational groups can experience another form of monitoring of marsupials in Dryandra Woodland.
