### Looking forward to 2004

Many new developments are scheduled for 2004, including new excursion options at WDF and the start of EcoEducation excursions at Margaret River Eco Discovery Centre (Wharncliffe Mill).

### Professional Development (PD) 2004

# Special events and prices for excursions:

**Wellington Week (2 - 6 March):** All standard day excursions will be \$5.50 per student.

**World Environment Day (5 June):** All standard day excursions booked for Friday 4 June receive a \$50.00 discount per group.

**Threatened Species Day (7 September):** Back from the Brink excursions booked for 7 September receive a \$50.00 discount per group.

**Biodiversity Month:** All standard day excursions will be \$5.50 per student in September (except *Back from the Brink excursions* for 7 September see above).

#### **Celebration dates:**

22 - 26 March for Wellington Week.

All excursions this week are \$5.50 per student

Wellington Week is held in celebration of the first release of woylies in the Wellington National Park.

Due to fox predation, the woylie was locally extinct until a highly successful fox baiting program and later a translocation program from Batalling to the forest in 1999.

### Working relationships/ partnerships

EcoEducation, through the Wellington Discovery Forest, has forged successful working relationships with two local primary schools: Adam Road and Dardanup.

Adam Road Primary School's Year 7 classes contributed to their Personal Achievement Award by completing community work at WDF. During November 2003, the students removed invasive introduced plant species, built a riffle and pond in the creek system around the centre, cleared the main trail of dead waterbush and planted native flora species in front of the centre. CALM supervised the work, provided the tools and a sausage sizzle lunch for the students.

Dardanup Primary School has a plot in the research section of the forest where they are studying plant communities. In October 2003, the Year 6 class came to the forest to map and identify the plants in their plot. They took the information back to school and compared it with the samples they collected last year and built on their photographic reference of the floral species.
