### Gatekeeper project at Margaret River Eco Discovery Centre (MREDC)

CALM Bush Ranger units are leading a restoration project at the entrance gate of the MREDC and Wharncliffe Mill Forest Camp. The 'Gate Guardians' Geographe unit initiated the project with EcoEducation Project Officer, Janet Date, and National Park Ranger, Clare Forward. Together, they have removed a weed infestation of broom bush (*Genista monspessulana* – look it up on www.naturebase.net/florabase) from the gate area with the assistance of the Gosnells and Rossmoyne Bush Ranger units.

The weed is still in the area and the project is expected to continue in June and then annually until the weed is eradicated. Thank you Bush Rangers for your untiring community work on this project!

### Did you know? Bat fact ...

If landholders provided bat habitat boxes in their orchards they could reduce the amount of insecticides they use every year? There are eight species of bats in the South West. Several of these are insectivores and their calls are audible to humans. These insect-eating beauties can be seen in the evening skies at both WDF and MREDC on our Sense-ational Nightlife excursion.

Most of these bats do not live in caves but roost by day in small colonies in the trees or tree hollows of the forest. Some, however, live fairly solitary lives under peeling bark, beneath the skirts of grasstrees (*Xanthorrhea preissil*) or even in dense clusters of leaves.

If you enjoy exploring caves but don't want to go into a bat cave, see if you can fit in a trip to one of CALM's caves 15 km south-west of Margaret River. Calgardup Cave's self-guided tour (with helmets and torches provided) caters to all ages and has interpretive signage. For more adventurous students, Year 7 and above, book a tour in the Giants Cave where you will have to walk.
