Did you know?

By using a book such as Tracks, Scats and Other Traces, (ISBN: 0 19 553643 6) you can identify most Australian mammals by what they've left behind. The Department of Conservation and Land Management's (CALM's) nature conservation officers use this book to aid species identification. You too can do a little detective work by looking at bones or teeth remains; scats; footprints; food leftovers or entrances to homes, nests or hollows.

September is Biodiversity Month

With the advent of spring, our attention is drawn to the new life appearing all around: wildflowers, including orchids, and a new generation of birds and mammals.

For EcoEducation, September focuses on our biodiversity conservation work. At WDF and MREDC there is a particular focus on CALM's *Western Shield* and *Western Everlasting* programs, which emphasise the importance of plants and animals being sustained in their correct

habitats. When you go to the nursery to buy gardening supplies, check that the 'native' plants are not introduced from other Australian States, because even these can turn into weeds in WA! *Genista monspessulana* at the entrance to MREDC is an example.

FloraBase, the authoritative source for information about WA's flora (www.naturebase.net/florabase), has a section dedicated to the weeds of WA. It can be accessed in the 'Theme' section and is well worth checking out.

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Professional Learning (PL) in second semester

Term 3 and 4 offer the opportunity for you and your colleagues to become 'A Nature Conservation Officer for a Night'. This Professional Learning (PL) opportunity is offered at WDF on the afternoon of Friday 9 and all day Saturday



10 September and at MREDC on the afternoon of Thursday 3 November and all day Friday 4 November. Both camps include accommodation and meals and are subsidised by *Western Shield* – CALM's wildlife recovery program, which aims to bring wildlife back from the brink of extinction. The PL costs \$55 per person or \$44 per STAWA member. There is a limited number of places, so book early to avoid disappointment.

Phase 1, *Genista* weed eradication, is almost complete, with some follow-up spraying to be done.
