### Year highlights - just the short list!

### Marsupial Monitoring in Bramley National Park

EcoEducation once again extended an opportunity for school students to be involved in Western Shield monitoring in Bramley National Park.

Year 6/7 students from Denmark Primary School took part in the monitoring on the morning of Thursday 3 November. But, after the cold night before, they didn't find any animals in the monitoring traps they checked. However, there was a moaning frog and pygmy possum caught in the pit traps on the grid transect.

On the morning of Friday 4 November, after a warmer night, the participants of the Western Shield 'Be a Nature Conservation Officer for a Night' PL caught a Nicholls' toadlet in a pit trap and a brushtail possum in a Sheffield trap.

Over the years, the monitoring on this transect has not proved to be very successful because of impacts of residential development and introduced species. For this reason, the transect is now being considered for closure. If this happens, we will 'tag along' at another less impacted site and the monitoring will possibly occur in October in 2006. ### New Biology excursion for MREDC

Lorraine Ellis and her Newton Moore Senior High School Year 11 Biology students gave valuable feedback after completing the newly developed Biology excursion at MREDC.

The day provided students with the opportunity to gain an overview of the area, the ecological community and the monitoring methods used in representative data collection.

The students worked with commitment, gathering data from their 100-square-metre quadrat including flora communities, canopy density and height, pH of the soil, animal scats, tracks and traces.

Once they had returned to school, they collated the data to give a picture of the jarrah forest over a continuous 400-squaremetre area.

If you are a Biology teacher why not bring your students to either centre during 2006 for a field trip to the jarrah forest?

### Why Wellington Week?

One threatened species that was locally extinct, prompted *Western Shield* 1080 fox baiting to commence in Wellington National Park. After a three-year period of intensive baiting regime, CALM scientists decided to reintroduce the locally extinct species.

In 1999, the woylie or brush-tailed bettong (*Bettongia penicillata*) was successfully reintroduced to the national park. The animals were translocated from Batalling Forest Block, where numbers were not in decline due to the high prevalence of *Gastrolobium sp.* (the 1080 bush).

So, each year since the inception of EcoEducation in CALM's South West region, we have a week of excursion discount prices to celebrate this success story.

The story is much greater than this though. The only Australia-wide removal from the Threatened Species List is the woylie!

They are such interesting creatures. Woylies are small nocturnal rat-like kangaroos, with yellowish grey fur and a black crest on their tail. They build a stick nest to live in on a sheltered area of the forest floor. When they are frightened from their nest, they bound in a crouching position with their head held low, back arched and tail almost straight.

Woylies are small marsupials, weighing up to only 1.6kg. They have many interesting facts about them, which can be found on CALM's NatureBase website (www.naturebase.net) under the 'Fauna Species Profiles' in the Plants and Animals section.
