Welcome to another year of exciting CALM opportunities.

This year began with several Australian states being involved with wildfire. I have recently been working with CALMFire on the wildfire that started south of Dwellingup and spread to just east of Waroona and Harvey. Fortunately, there was no loss of life and no substantial loss of property in this incident.

Unfortunately, there has been serious disruption to the natural environment. Habitat destruction and loss of animal life in wildfire can be catastrophic. The noisy scrub bird, a vulnerable species, was translocated to seven sites in the vicinity of the fire area five years ago. This animal, which has a total population of about 1000, relies on long unburnt habitat for survival. Sadly, three translocation sites were destroyed in this wildfire, severely affecting bird numbers.

All students in WA should be aware of the effects of wildfire and the management practices CALM has in place to reduce the risk of wildfire. After the Perth Hills wildfire of January 2005, which burnt 28,000 ha, EcoEducation developed and implemented a program called *Fire for Life* addressing these issues. Students in Years 9 to 11 can take part in an excursion at The Hills Forest in Mundaring. Teachers have the opportunity to participate in a free Professional Learning (PL) opportunity on Saturday 6 May at The Hills Forest Discovery Centre from 9am time to 3pm time. Through learning about the extreme differences and relationship between wildfire and prescribed burns, teachers, students and the community will hopefully become more vigilant in reporting suspicious behaviour in our State forests and national parks, motivated in stopping deliberate ignitions and more environmentally responsible.

Threatened species relocated

CALM and the Perth Zoo have long worked in partnership to recover threatened species through a captive breeding program. In December 2005, captive bred numbats were released into the Batalling forest block in the Wellington District, as part of this recovery program. The numbats were fitted with radio collars allowing Nature Conservation Officers from the Department of Conservation and Land Management (CALM) to monitor and track their movements following their release during summer.



I will endeavour to update information on the developments in the project in the next newsletter. Students involved with *Monitoring Marsupials (MM)* this May will be presented with the latest information. (*MM* at Wellington Discovery Forest is scheduled for the week 22 to 26 May inclusive.
